

Northwest Nazarene College

Northwest Nazarene College situated at Nampa, Idaho, is a Christian institution which aims to provide educational advantages worthy of the young people of the church and in keeping with its high ideals of manhood and womanhood. The courses of instruction are arranged in harmony with the generally accepted standards: the latest and most approved methods of

instruction are followed, and in all departments a high standard of educational efficiency is maintained. While under the supervision of the Church of the Nazarene, the institution is not narrowly sectarian but receives students of all denominations.

Northwest Nazarene College is the result of a great and pressing need. Thoughtful people realizing the great influence of the schools and colleges were reluctant in en trusting the education of their young people to worldly institutions whose teachings were such as to endanger Christian experience and undermine faith in the Bible as the word of God. The emphasis upon

development in biology, the evolutionary hypothesis in philosophy, the doctrine of man's sinfulness and depravity as a doctrine no longer tenable in theology, these and many others combined to weaken the faith of the student in the fundamental doctrines of grace and to minify the importance of a definite and conscious experience of salvation from sin.

The church will be able to perpetuate her high ideals only as she teaches them.

Besides these there are 16 preachers and preachers' wives and 9 teachers from the graduates of the academy. The great majority of the academy graduates of course continue for higher work.
