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
# DENOMINATIONAL DESTINY

Denominations are not an un-mixed evil. In fact it seems to be the only way that God can preserve the faith of the fathers. He permitted Israel to be divided, when the ten tribes, which touched heathenism more closely than the two tribes did, had become so tainted with sin as to threaten the spirituality of the entire nation. This preserved the two tribes for several hundred years longer. Then they were carried into bondage also.

When Catholicism was triumphant over all Christendom, there never was so deep a lapse of pure spirituality, as then. The only thing that saved the soul of the Christian Church was the Reformation under Luther, and that was the origination of denominations. When the Protestantism of England, as represented by gin their career. He marks out for them a plan, a program, a reason for existence. His blessing is conspicuously on them as long as they adhere to that plan, and follow that program. When they cease, or let down, or cool off, or deflect, He withdraws His blessing.

- Second, every denomination can finally fail of their divine desting. and reach the scrap heap of decadent movements. The path of history is lined and marked with just such defunct efforts. St. Francis in the twelfth century started one, and it flourished for a while, and then decayed. The Waldenses, and the Albigenses were such a movement, and never were there more devout people, than they generated, but they passed. The Quitists, the Pietists, the Covenanters, the Brownists, the Quakers, the

to be very plain, and that is, that it was raised up to emphasize three things: Holiness evangelism; Holiness organized and thus perpetuated; Holiness girdling the globe through Missionary effort. Having been raised up for this purpose, we should bend every energy, and put forth every effort to realize the purpose of our origin. All side lines must bend to the main current. We are not out to build church buildings, except as we need them to house holiness, and give us plants for the transaction of the business to which we are called, that of establishing the cause of holiness in every town, city, community and country in the world. We are not called to build and run schools, except as we are compelled to have them to educate a ministry and a laity that will give us the results that



the Church of England, became corrupt, the Lord caused the rise of Presbyterianism in Scotland, Congregationalism in England proper, later on Quakerism, and finally Methodism, which was followed subsequently by the Salvation Army. Every one of these while they generated hard feelings, and in some degree evidenced presumption, nevertheless were a blessing in retarding the decline of the faith, and in keeping a spiritual people alive for the furtherance of God's cause.

Methodism was especially raised up to propagate the second work of grace, i. e. *holiness of heart and life*. When that great movement began to decline in its emphasis on that precious truth, God raised up the Free Methodists, and the National Holiness Association. When these had ceased to be as evangelistic as He desired he raised up the Church ot the Nazarene.

All this leads to certain and inevitable conclusions: *First*, that every denomination that is raised up, *has a destiny*. God places Providential adjustments around each, so that they are led to bePuritans, the Baptists, the Methodists, (and time would fail us merely to mention their names,) have risen, re-established the old fashioned faith of genuine regeneration, and often of holiness of heart, as well, flourished a while, drifted with the tide, admitted laxity and worldliness, and finally passed into a condition where they had a name to live, but largely speaking were dead.

The third conclusion is that after a church, a denomination, a movement, has lapsed there is never any hope of its restoration. There are always strenuous efforts to do this, and they result favorably for a short time, but the inevitable drift is resumed, the downward tendency is again set in motion, and the lapse into a moribund condition is at last final and complete. Historv speaks, and when it does, any individual opinion to the contrary, merely advertises that individual's ignorance of history.

These conclusions lead us to certain and very obvious observations. The first one is that the Church of the Nazarene is divinely originated. Its purpose seems our destiny demands. If other schools would, or could, do this, we would not need to have a school or a College in all Nazarenedom. But they will not, and cannot, and hence we must have our educational program. We are not called to build and run hospitals, except as we have to have them to give our sick, maimed and worn-out workers the care they must have, and an opportunity to be healed, or to die, under auspices that will not rob them of their faith, or convince them that the church is ungrateful and has forgotten them.

Our chief business as Nazarenes is to spread holiness over these lands. Whatever contributes to that, must be carried through. To have trained ministers to do that, to have trained missionaries to do that, we must have schools, and to have a place to care for the warriors who are invalided home we must have hospitals, and to house the cause after it is generated, we must have buildings. # THE HOLY SPIRIT - THE COMFORTER

While the first three Gospels point to the coming of Jesus as the central hope of Christians, the Gospel of John sug-

gests the coming of the Spirit as the source of comfort and consolation of the disciples. Various thoughts are brought in connection with the coming of the Holy Spirit. First among these and the most prominent in the Gospel is that He will be a Comforter. Jesus had plainly told the disciples that He was going away, and sorrow had filled their hearts, for He had been their hope and joy and comfort in their earthly pilgrimage. To console them He tells them He will pray the Father and He would give them another Comforter. They would not be left orphans. Jesus in the person of the Comforter would come to them. He would be near them.

After speaking of the Holy Spirit as the Comforter, He continues by bringing out other characteristics of the Spirit and His work. First He designates Him as the Spirit of truth. Among the Greeks there was considerable speculation on such abstract subjects, and the questions might arise what indeed after all is truth. Here we find that truth is not simply an abstraction, but is embodied in a personality. Jesus had said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life"; now He calls the Spirit, the Spirit of truth; truth in its most real form is found in the divine personalities of Jesus Christ the Saviour and the Holy Spirit. The secret of the great riddles of this universe of ours is found in the deity and person of Jesus Christ and in the Holy Spirit, the Comforter, who will guide us into all truth. We need not wander in darkness about the essential issues of life, but through the Holy Spirit we may have knowledge of all.

Regarding these most important facts of our human life, the Gospel is very explicit as to the active agency of the Spirit in making all clear. We are told that He will convict the world of sin. The presence and turpitude of sin is one of the most vital issues in the history of mankind. This then is one of the functions of the Holy Spirit to ever bring home to the attention of men the fact that they are sinners. If the Holy Spirit did not convict men of sin, we would have no background to work against; the truth of the word preached would not take hold of the hearts of men. Then not only does the Holy Spirit convince of sin, but He also sets before men an ideal of righteousness: His work is not only negative, it is also positive. There is present in the heart of every being some ideal of what is right and good as well as a knowledge of sin. All this is through the convincing power of the Holy Spirit. Finally among the great essential issues, the Holy Spirit convicts of judgment to come. There is in man a certain "fearful looking forward" to something they know not what when they must give account of the sins of this life. These great fundamentals of truth the Spirit is ever bringing to the remembrance of man.

Not onl  $\checkmark$  does the Spirit reveal truth and quicken our consciences to the great fundamental truths of human life, but He also reveals Jesus. He teaches the great facts of the person of Christ; He directs all truth seekers not to Himself, but to Christ. He takes the truth that Christ gave and opens up its inner meaning to disciples and ever reveals to them the hidden and inner teaching of Christ's words. He always glorifies Christ. Thus we have the office work of the Comforter who was to come unto the disciples and ever is present and active in the Church today.

literature, by testimony, by song, by sermon; at home, abroad, and all the time. To that we are called. Woe are we if we fail to do it!

Our second observation is, that as other denominations and movements have failed, so we can fail. As the pathway of history is strewn with the bones of other movements that were in their day wondrously alive, so unless we are tremendously alert, will our whitened bones be bleaching beside them in the days to come; and future historians, if our Lord tarries, will painfully write of our pathetic decline from the high destiny to which God has called us. The only great advantage that we have over those movements which have perished in the past, is that we have the poignant warning of their terrible lapse ever before us. If we will but heed their downfall, note the rocks on which they crashed, be warned by their failure, be admonished by their whitened bones, have our hearts stirred by the fact that not one denomination or movement in all the "ast was able, apparently, successfully to carry out the program that God handed to them when He called them into existence-then, then we possibly may thrust from us every weight, and the sin that will so easily beset us, and run with patience the race that is set before us. and be the one solitary exception of a denomination that has actually carried out the program that God has placed in our hands, and was running true to form, when the Head of the Church came back to earth again!

The denominational destiny of the Church of the Nazarene is "to girdle the globe with salvation, with holiness unto the Lord." If we will but be true to our Providential origin, and follow our divine program, we can do this in the next fifty years! ON WITH THE REVIVAL!


Miss Helen Nutt, one of our College Freshmen, has just recovered from an operation for appendicitis.



#### A VISIT TO THE STATE PENITENTIARY

On Sunday afternoon, January 30th, a group of young people attended the services given at the state penitentiary. It being "rally day" in Boise, there was quite a large number of students attending the various services.

The meeting was to be held at 2:30. A little while before that hour, about twenty students got into the truck, and Mr. Miller drove us over. A few students came in separate cars. Everyone had arrived at the appointed hour and we were all ushered into the chapel building. It was a fairly large building, capable of seating about 250 people. We students were seated on three rows of benches, which were placed in the front of the room. The prisoners, perhaps ons hundred and fifty in number, filed into the large room and took their seats on the long benches which were arranged in rows. We all eagerly watched the different expressions on the faces of the prisoners. Most of them seemed to be between the ages of eighteen and thirtyfive. It was very sad to think of the fact that they were some mother's boy.

The service started on time. Several songs were sung, many of which were selected by the prisoners. Professor De Long asked them to call out the number of the song they preferred to sing, and there was a quick response from all sides. It was interesting to note the eager response of these men throughout the entire service. One little fellow asked that we sing, "Let the Lower Lights be Burning". It was really soulgripping to watch the expression on the face of that man as he softly sang, along with the rest of us. After these numerous songs had been sung, Mrs. De Long rendered a special song, which was listened to very attentively by the congregation. Several ringing testimonies were given by several of the students, after which Professor De Long delivered the message. The topic of his sermon was, "Which Direction Are You Headed For?" The congregation was greatly touched by his message.

Upon closing, several of the prisoners shook hands with Professor De Long, which showed their appreciation of the service. We all filed out of the chapel with a more serious, sad feeling than we had when we entered.
