Out-of-Debt Campaign

We wish to take this opportunity of thanking all those who have cooperated with us in the effort to free Northwest Nazarene College from debt. So far you have stood by the institution loyally.

While the plan was to take subscriptions payable on or before December 1, 1927, so far we have not stressed the cash payments, yet already there have been thousands of dollars paid in to the Treasurer. We think this is a fine omen. But you understand according to the plan no money can be applied on the debts of the institution until all has been received. Then remember that the interest is accruing at the rate of \$400 per month and from June 1 to December 1 there has been \$2400 accrued interest added to the debt. You can see from this how imperative it is that these subscriptions be paid *as soon as possible*.

We are working very, very hard to cover the territory before January 1, and the amount of cash paid in *immediately* will greatly determine whether we *win* or *lose* in the Campaign. Therefore, we wish to encourage all those who have made subscriptions payable on or before December 1 to make a special effort to pay them immediately.

Make all checks payable to A. E. Sanner, Treasurer, Nampa, Idaho, who will send you a trust receipt for the same. *Do it today! Delay may mean defeat.*
