Commencement

The fifteenth annual commencement has come and gone. So quickly has the year slipped by! The goal long striven for by some of our students has at last been reached, and the end desired has been obtained.

The first of the programs of commencement week was on Saturday evening, May 26th, when the three literary societies held a contest program. The work done by all was commendable, but the Olympians succeeded in carrying away the honors of the

occasion and thereby gained sufficient points to win the loving cup which was to be given by the faculty to the society making the best record for the semester.

On Sunday morning came the regular baccalaureate service. The students led by the Board of Directors, faculty, and graduating classes formed in ranks and entered the church in procession, filling the entire center of the building. An inspiring sermon was giv-

en by Professor DeLong followed by a charge to the graduating class. There was a general feeling that it was a gracious season. Sunday evening the annual sermon was preached by Rev. A. E. Sanner, District Superintendent of the Idaho-Oregon District; this was a practical message and at the close a large group of students gathered around the altar signifying that they had surrendered their lives for service.

Following Sunday came the program given by the departments of music and expression on Monday night. All of the numbers were good and indicated that very

Harold W. Gretzinger, Dean of the School of Music comes to us well equipped to build up a great musical organization at Northwest Nazarene College. He first studied piano under William VanGemerts, a graduate of Berlin, Paris, Vienna, and the Hague Conservatories. After studying the various Band Orchestral instruments under various teachers, he took up the study of conducting and instrumentation under Prof. P. Marinus Paulsen, well known composer and conductor of the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra at that time. He studied violin under Karl Wecker of Cincinnati Conservatory and Director of the Grand Rapids Symphony Orchestra.

Coming to Chicago in 1926 to take charge of the music in First Church, Chicago, he entered Sherwood Music School taking advanced work with Prof. Paulsen. In 1927 he entered the Paris Institute of Music, American branch, and completed his studies in Harmony, Counterpoint, and Solfege.

In 1928, under the celebrated conductor, Richard Czerwonky, of Bush Conservatory of Music, he took a special course in a Survey of Symphonic Literature.

During this period he organized and directed the first college orchestra of Calvin College, Grand Rapids, Michigan, and also the largest boys' band of Grand Rapids, The Grand Rapids Press Roy's Junior Band, an organization of 105 members.

The White Cloud High School Orchestra he organized and directed won second place in the class C district contest within a year of the time it was organized.

His work at Chicago First Church has been of a high order and he comes to us with the good will of the entire church.
