Revival Meetings

Our Spring Revival Campaign was opened on Sunday, March 17, with Rev. Chas. Stalker, the famous Quaker evangelist. Brother Stalker is a striking character, possessing a strong personality, and is a deeply spiritual man. He is an evangelist of wide experience and extensive travel. He has traveled around the world at least twice, has made a score of trips to England, and in all has traversed nearly a million miles since God called him to Evangelism.

of Prof. Harold W. Gretzinger, Dean of the School of Music. The College Male Quartet is furnishing special vocal numbers each evening; the Lord is blessing them as they sing. Northwest Nazarene College Wins Debating Cup

Our debators have brought distinct credit to Northwest Nazarene College in the past few weeks. Their victories have caught the attention of hundreds of people and have created respect for the institution. The question being debated by Colleges this year is: Resolved, That a substitute for trial by jury should be adopted. Our first debate was with Weber College of Ogden, Utah. Our debators took the negative side of the question and won a 2 to 1 decision from the Judges.

The big night on the debate calendar was March 1, which was Conference Night. This night was significant because of the fact that the institution securing the greatest number of judge's votes is awarded the Conference Debating Cup. Members of this Conference are: College of Idaho, (Presbyterian), Gooding College (Methodist), Ricks College, University of Idaho (Southern Branch), Albion Normal, and Northwest Nazarene College. The College of Idaho and Gooding College together with our institution form what is known as the Western division of the Conference, while the other three schools form the Eastern division.

Our Forensic Club this year has had one object in mind, namely, to win the Cup. Our debators had worked hard and long securing material and formulating their briefs. The eventful day arrived, President DeLong and the negative team composed of Donald Harper, Bertrand Peterson, and Raymond Harrison departed for the College of Idaho. The board of judges at Caldwell was composed of two attorneys and a Judge from Boise, so that we were assured of expert opinion and decision. The debate was interesting and instructive. When the Judges had cast their ballots it was revealed that Northwest Nazarene College had been given all three votes.

Our affirmative team which remained at home to debate with Gooding College was composed of Frank True, George Taylorson, and Paul Spencer. Three competent attorneys from Boise had been secured as Judges, who gave a 2 to 1 decision to our team. The debate was close and lively,

Endowment

No institution of learning is self-supporting. Leading educational authorities estimate that a college should receive a dollar from outside sources for every dollar received from students for tuition. These outside sources include donations, interest from endowments, gifts from church budgets, etc. If a school receives \$10,000.00 per year from tuition then it must look for \$10, 000.00 from some or all of these sources if that institution is to do accredited work.

The most common source for educational funds is the permanent endowment. When a gift is made to an institution for an endowment that institution is permitted to use only the interest that the gift earns and in no case is the school permitted to use the principal. If a college had an endowment of \$300,000.00 and could so invest that money to earn 6 per cent interest there would be an income of \$18,000.00 to be used for current expences, maintenance, etc. Following is a table giving the total endowment of the leading colleges and universities in America and in the Northwest with the number of students enrolled and the average endowment per student:

Now that Northwest Nazarene College is out of debt our next concern should be that of securing endowment. Until we are able to secure permanent endowment we must rely upon the District Budgets and upon the Temporary Endowment Plan. If we could secure 100 per cent of the educational budget this year we would receive about \$7,000.00 which would be the equivalent of a \$200,000.00 endowment at a 31 per cent interest rate.

The Temporary Endowment Plan is simply this: You are unable to give outright \$1,000.00 but you could give the interest on \$1,000.00 at 6 per cent which would be \$5.00 per month. To us this would be just as good as though you had actually given us the \$1,000.00 as far as return is concerned. Sunday Schools, Sun-day School Classes, Young People's Socie-tics and individuals acould do this 16 me ties and individuals could do this. If we could secure 100 of these it would mean a \$100,000.00 temporary endowment and we would realize \$6,000.00 to be used for current expenses, supplies, maintenance, etc. Will you not pray about the matter and drop us a line for more information? Possibly someone reading these lines could make us a gift for permanent endowment. Let us proceed to do the work as an institution that God wants us to accomplish.

The total enrollment in the College Department last year was 105 as compared with 135 this year which shows an increase of 29 per cent.

The total enrollment in the Academy last year was 98 as compared with 132 this year which shows an increase of 35 per cent.

The total enrollment in all departments last year was 317 as compared with 389 this year which shows an increase of 23 percent.

The largest single class in school is the College Freshman Class which has enrolled nearly 70 members this year.

Our students come from 23 different States and 4 Canadian provinces. Also 13 different religious denominations are represented.

We thank God for this excellent increase in the Student Body this year and trust that the coming year we may go well over, the 400 mark. We are uot only thankful for this quantitative increase but we are more thankful for the quality of the Student Body.
