



Two Reasons for Building



Our Overcrowded College Buildings

THE encouraging increase in the student body of Northwest Nazarene College within the past three years has overcrowded all the buildings now on the campus and caused an emergency which demands immediate enlargement of our capacity. It has been the delight of all our people throughout the Northwest Zone that the College has made such excellent progress in clearing up the old debts, in improving the Campus, in the employment of a most competent faculty, and in securing accredited standing. This has contributed toward making the College an attractive place for young people who are seeking their education. So, if we are to meet the demands of our enlarging student body and maintain a high standard of Christian education, we are compelled to enlarge our building capacity. Our survey of the buildings during the meeting of the Board of Regents impressed every member of the Board with the necessity of making immediate provision for larger quarters to get our excellent student body out of such cramped conditions, and continue the wonderful work the College is doing.—A. M. BOWES

A Real Need

WHILE visiting Northwest Nazarene College last week, in the meeting of the Board of Regents, I took a tour of the buildings, for I wanted to see what provision had been made for the caring for the great body of students who had come there from all parts of the educational zone and some from outside. I visited class rooms, library, lecture rooms and dormitories, and in every case I found a crowded condition, which I am sure if every member of this educational zone could see, would stir him to quick action. Building programs may have been launched by some of our institutions when it was not a question of real need, but in the case of Northwest Nazarene College, we simply must build to make room for the students God is sending to us. One room in which one of Professor DeLong's classes meet, is supposed to seat about thirty people and his class numbers around sixty, and this is only one incident; the Dining Room is full and running over; the Chapel is so crowded that some must stand along the wall and some sit out in the hall; the Library is crowded until the students must be accommodated in shifts; the class rooms are so crowded that it seems impossible to give the students what they justly deserve. Then, when I remember that these students had come here from high schools and colleges where every equipment is offered for the demonstration of courses, I really felt ashamed that we should ask them to come to our schools that are so poorly equipped. The student body is the finest I think I have ever seen. God has sent them to us, so let's arise and build buildings and properly furnish them so as not to disappoint this great body of young men and women, who are the Nazarene leaders of tomorrow.
