A definite policy regarding future apportionments to student body organizations was the goal of a committee composed of three faculty members and four representatives from the Student Council which met late last month. Their recommendations were as follows:

- 1. One club to be sponsored by each college department, membership being open to all students interested.
- All organizations to be defined as follows:
- Major: Any organization which functions independently of any department.
- Minor: All organizations sponsored by a department.
- Inter-collegiate forensics to be classed as a major organization and the Speech Club to be classed as a minor organization.

Out of the present student- body fee of seven dollars, major organizations will receive \$5.70; minor organizations and general fund will receive the remaining \$1.30.

Each Athletic-Literary Society will contribute \$7.25 of its individual allotment of which \$6.00 will go into a common property fund, and the remaining \$1.25 toward the salary of the secretary of the Athletic-Literary Council.

The budget will be presented to the student body in the near future for ratification.

Analyze your life and you will find that it is composed of trifles: food, clothing, books, reports, roommates. Sometimes their very mundaneness causes them to seem unimportant and yet they are the warp and woof of our lives.


Trifles make perfection but perfection is no trifle," said Michelangelo. "Who hath despised the day of small things?" query the Scriptures.

A recent poll conducted in a high school class revealed some interesting facts concerning their conception of an ideal person. Such small items as friendliness, neatness, and good humor far outranked musical ability, good looks, etc.. (Incidentally, gossiping and egotism headed the list of undesirable traits!)

What am I saying? Simply this: that we reveal our true character in the trifles of life. The broken promise, the unkind word, the disgruntled attitude, the frowning face-these will never plead our own cause (much less Hisl) effectively. Public Law 239 sets July 25, 1947, as the official end of World War II for this purpose of computing eligibility for veterans' benefits under the G.I. Bill and Public Law 16. As a result, education and training under both laws must be completed by most veterans by July 24, 1956. Think we can all make it that soon, fellows?

The Veterans Administration has received reports that many veterans who would like to attend larger colleges, but who have been prevented from doing so by heavy enrollments, plan to take two years work in smaller schools where there are vacancies and transfer to larger schools for their last two years of study. Surely no student would want to transfer after spending two years at N.N.C., but just in case some do, let them remember that V.A. must approve any change of institution, and a trainee's advance declaration of intent to transfer will facilitate V. A. permission when such transfer is requested.



The most important item in the news of the world is still the Russian bloc

Last week Russia paraded her military might through Moscow's Red Square in commeoration of the Bolshevik revolution's thirtieth anniversary amid renewed cries that "warmongers' are calling for a campaign against the Soviet Union and 'making plans for a new imperialist war.'

REDS WANT PEACE

On the eve of the revolution's celebration, Molotov stated that Russia is intent upon "a durable and lasting peace," and that "We live in a period when all roads lead to Communism."

From the holler the Reds put up over the possibility of their having the Atomic Secret, and the charges they have placed against Great Britian and the United States for "Building Bases For Agression" it would appear that Russia is seeking that 'durable and lasting peace" by threat of aggression herself. It is certain from the recent developments, that she intends to win it even if it means the subjugation of Britian and the United States to the "Supreme Soviet rule"

It would appear that our lend-lease aid to Russia during the war is coming back in the form of a taunt bristling with military might ..

LONDON CONFERENCE SOON

In Washington it was announced that mounting American demands for an early peace settlement in Europe seem certain today to force a United States-Russian showdown in the Big Four ministers' meeting at London later this month.

Some authorities believe that if the London conference fails to make definite progress on a German peace treaty and to complete an Austrian settlement, the last vestige of great wither and die. Consequently, we power unity as symbolized in the conferences of the foreign ministers may be destroyed.


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
