Shifting Beukelman To Forward Spot Pays-off As NNC Breaks Even On Road

Northwest Nazarene College's star of destiny will either shine brightly or be permanently dimmed after tonight's cage struggle with the sharp-shooting Falcons of Seattle Pacific College.

The fourth renewal of Tip-off night, NNC's traditional climax to each basketball season will bring together two of the coasts top small college quintets. The Falcons boast one of the most impressive records ever to be brought to this vicinity having acquired victories over such highly touted clubs as Lewis and Clark, UBC, Pasadena and others.

Coach Monty Lee will probably open with his usual starting five of Merl Iles and Whitey Johnson at forwards, John Cramer at center and Millard Reynolds and Fred Fowler at guards.

Although the orange and black cagers dropped their first game of the year in their recent road trip the squad continued to improve.

The shifting of guard Woody Beukelman to forward has begun to pay off for Lee as the dimutive but speedy junior bucketed 17 points against Lower Columbia Junior College and gave indication that he will strengthen the Crusader reserve forces immeasurably.

NNC took their fourth straight victory by defeating College of Idaho 57-48 immediately preceding the holiday season. On their first road trip of the year the Crusaders dropped a 70-51 decision to highly-rated Pacific Lutheran and trimmed Lower Columbia JC of Longview, Wash. 70-45.

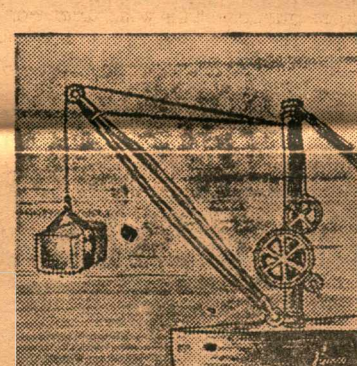

For Cramer, it will signal the beginning of the end of a brilliant four year basketball career which has resulted in his gaining recognition as one of the best college cagers in the Northwest.

In his freshman and sophomore seasons the lanky center gained

national ranking for his scoring feats as well as his great rebounding and defensive play. This, his final season gives every indication of being his best.

The Crusaders under his superb leadership have rolled up an impressive record and have finally begun to show the promise that was expected of them.

Freddie, a stellar guard for two seasons has been experiencing difficulty in getting back in the groove after a lay-off last year, but he still rates as a rough and tough man on the backboard and a leech on defense. 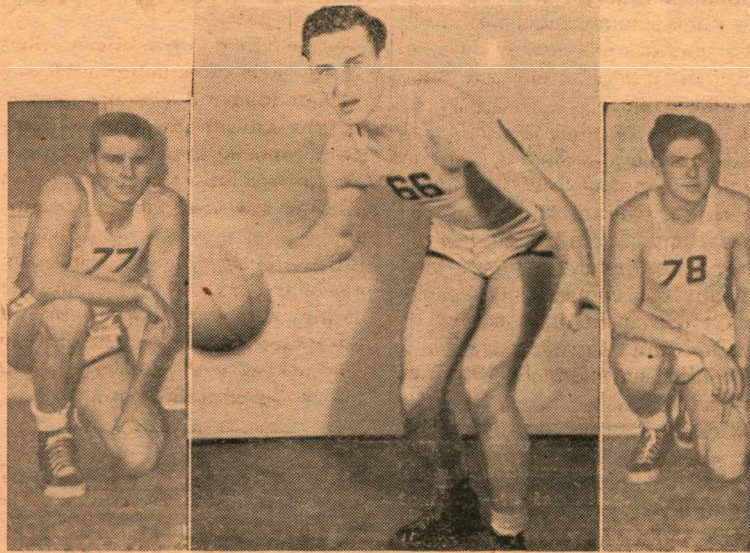

"Methods of Evangelism" is a two-hour survey course to better acquaint students with Evangelism.

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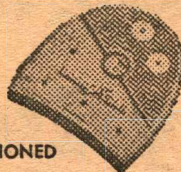
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
