Selected were Mary Alyce Galloway, Merilu Jensen and Connie Jo Nelson. One will be the queen and the other two will serve as her attendants along with Betty Beuge and Naomi Williamson, who were chosen as princesses from the lower division.

### Only Two Know Identity

Only the two persons who counted the ballots know the identity of the queen. She will not know until the other four have marched in and she is handed a bouquet of roses to indicate her queenly status.

Committees for the tip-off game have been appointed. The N Club is in charge of coronation; the Gamma Nu Gamma will handle decorations and the throne and the AWS is in charge of the after-game reception which will be held in Morrison Hall in honor of the queen.

## Thots O' Gold

The problem of Christian young people should not be primarily what is right or what is wrong, but rather, what is good and what is better.

There are many relationships in life that are legitimate, but are not always the best. We notice as in the text that sacrifice was certainly a legitimate gesture. Sacrifice was commanded by the law and certainly it would be a commendable thing to do. However, if we examine the relationship carefully we find that Samuel was right when he said to Saul, "To obey is better than sacrifice".

You remember the story of Saul's command to destroy all of Amalek; however, he demonstrated disobedience by bringing back the King, and reserving the fat lambs and cattle for sacrifice. Sacrifice was legitimate, but not in this relationship. Obedience is ranked higher on the scale of values than sacrifice. "Obedience is better than sacrifice". Saul tried to substitute sacrifice for obedience. As a result of his distorted evaluation, he was condemned.

Bringing it down to practical living, obedience to the divine will of God is always highest on the scale of religious values. Any substitution for obedience regardless of its legitimacy in its own relationship is nothing more than a repetition of Saul's mistaken evaluation of Christian values. The good (sacrifice) can be achieved by our own decisions, but the better (obedience) is always achieved by divine aid.

## Over 35 Students Now Major in Music; Department Offers Nineteen Courses

Approximately 35 students are majoring in music this year, 22 of whom are for B. Mus. degrees.

This year 19 theory courses are being offered in music under the direction of Mrs. Alline Swann, dean of the School of Music. Mrs. Swann obtained two B. Mus. degrees in music, including one from Texas Wesleyan college and Southern Methodist. Her Master of Music degree was obtained at the American Conservatory of Music at Chicago, where she was a student of Heniot Levy. Mrs. Swann has served on the N. N. C. staff since 1943.

Other full time instructors of music include Double E. Hill, Charles Ross, Warren Franklin, Ivalee Bolerjack, Elaine Carlson, Maraget Wilkes, and Clara Christensen. Several teachers serving part-time are Ruby Sanner, Carol Allen, James DeCoursey, Archie

Jessie and Lucille Wilson. The Music Department sponsors the Messiah every Christmas as well as various Fine Arts programs. It is a policy to bring at least two outstanding soloists to the campus each year. During this semester the department has provided musical numbers for 25 programs for civic organizations and clubs.

Among other equipment, the Music Department boasts a record library of 400 records ranging from early music to music of today. These records are used for Music History classes.

A. B. Music degree in organ, piano, voice, music theory, or instrumental music or an A. B. degree in music theory may be obtained at N. N. C. Vocations in the music field are always excellent, either in the teaching field, private instructor, or professionally.

A new record of points scored against collegiate competition was set last Friday evening by a rejuvenated Crusader basketball five as they ran up a fabulous 92-51 win over a heretofore high scoring Southern Idaho club.

A lightning-fast break plus back-board control permitted the home team to shoot 98 times from the field. They connected 35 times for a 35% shooting average.

With Carlyle Dean and Ralph Unger playing their best games of the season, the Crusaders rolled to a 43-17 half-time margin. The potent reserves took over in the second half to help run the score to near the century mark. Reynolds and Dean topped the scorers with 17 and 14 points.

The Trojans have been paced this season by Darrell Reisch, junior center, who has averaged better than 18 points per game in five tilts to date.

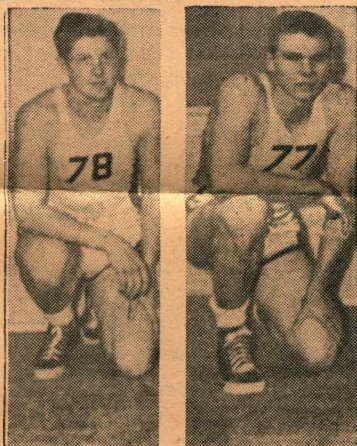

The first game was a three overtime thriller that left fans limp. After trailing throughout the entire game, Iles hooked in the tying basket with ten seconds left. In the first overtime, Finkbiener tied the score at 51-all with five seconds remaining.

Then in the second overtime, Iles again came through with five seconds left to knot the score at 55-all. With two and a half minutes left in the third overtime, Finkbiener put NNC ahead for the first time in the game 57-55 but two tip ins by Pasadena's Rollie Dean (no relation to Carlyle Dean) sewed up the contest.

The second tilt found the Crusaders tangling with a red hot home five that couldn't miss. Led by Ed Davis who racked up 17 points, the California team rolled to a 33-25 margin at half time. High for the Nampans was Wilcox with ten points.

### FTA Members Talk On Class Discipline

Proper classroom discipline was the theme of the January meeting of the Future Teachers of America. Members of the organization viewed a film which depicted the right and wrong approaches in handling problems which may arise in the classroom.

Following the film, Mr. J. W. Richardson, principal of Roosevelt grade school, talked briefly on various difficulties he had encountered during his 30 years experience in the teaching field.

Mr. Richardson cited these problems as examples of what might be encountered but added that almost every type of situation could arise and that it is impossible to set a pattern for child behavior.

He placed special emphasis on using the words social adjustment in place of discipline when discussing corrective measures. Following his talk the floor was opened for discussion.
