## Movies of Trip Behind Iron Curtain To Be Shown By Distler Monday Night

Pictures and stories of a trip behind the iron curtain will be part of the program to be brought to the International Relations club by Dr. E. K. Distler, M. D., of Caldwell.

Dr. Distler will speak to the group next Monday night in Morrison dining hall and will tell of his trip taken last August. The trip started out as a medical one but wound up political as Dr. Distler, posing as a news commentator, journeyed in communist-controlled country from Munich to Vienna, where he stayed for five days. The trip behind the iron curtain cost him several cartons of cigarettes and cash, Dr. Distler asserted.

When discovered in Vienna, he was escorted out of the country at the expense of the communists, who took him to Switzerland. Although several of his films were confiscated, he managed to retain some pictures of his fracas with the Reds.

Dr. Distler, who speaks German fluently, began his tour in Ireland, and went through Scotland, England, the Netherlands, Belgium, Scandinavia and Germany before embarking on his trip through the suppressed countries.

After leaving Switzerland he journeyed to Italy, around the Mediterranean and through Egypt and Algiers before returning to the U. S. He traveled a total of 21,000 miles.

A graduate of Bethany-Peniel College in Bethany, Okla., Dr. Taylor received his M. A. and Ph. D. degrees at the University of Oklahoma. He has also done specialty work at the University of Chicago in the field of church history.

Author of the book, "Nazarene Youth in Conquest for Christ," Dr. Taylor is now serving as professor of Church History at the Nazarene Theological Seminary at Kansas City, in addition to his duties as NYPS president.

Dr. Taylor held the position of Dean of Liberal Arts at Bethany-Peniel before accepting his present position. He was elected to the NYPS post at the quadrennial convention of the society in June, 1948.

The Miller Lectures was established in 1943 by Dr. and Mrs. H. V. Miller for the purpose of giving practical aid and advice to young people going out to special Christian service. Following the death of Dr. Miller, College church took over the sponsorship of the lectures.

Spring cleaning will take place on NNC's campus when Tuesday, April 10 arrives. This is the date set for the annual "Campus Day".

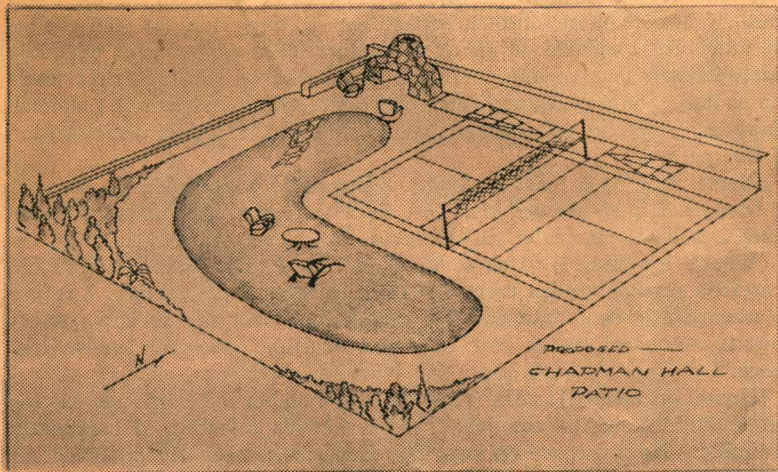
"Cleaning up the United States" has been chosen for this year's theme, with Paul Sutherland and Marilyn McGraw as co-presidents.

- Lunch—1:00.

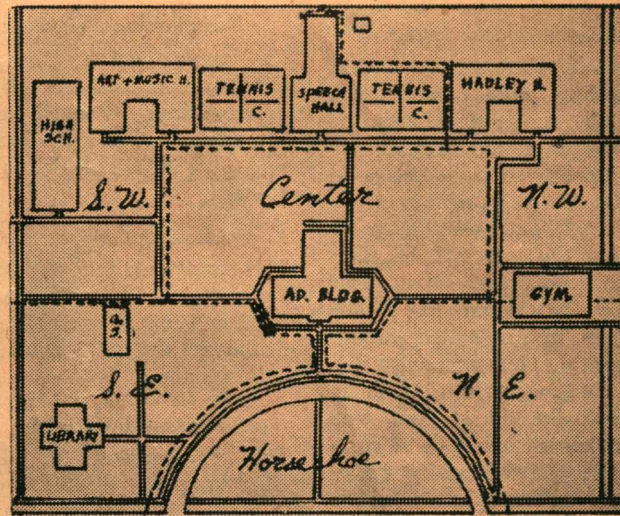
- Baseball game (NNC - C.of I.)—3:00.

### School Sociology Department Recent; 144 Students, 7 Majors Now Enrolled

The Department of Sociology at Northwest Nazarene College is one of the most recent of the college. Under the leadership of Professor Guy E. Sharp, the department began its expansion last year and has gradually increased to its present size. At the present time 144 students are enrolled in the various courses with seven students majoring in the field. Majors are Pat Goodman, Marvin Eppes, James Hurd, Don Jackson, Tom Nyhus, Roy Jones and Earlene Tapley.

Courses offered by NNC include two lower division courses, Introduction to Sociology and Modern Social Problems. Upper division courses are Delinquency, Rural So-

ciology, Negro and the U. S., Urban Sociology, Minority Groups, Social Philosophy, Populations, Social Problems of the Family; and Criminology. One new course on Human Migration will be offered next year.

Professor Sharp received his A. B. degree from NNC and his A. M. from the University of Idaho. He has been on the NNC staff since 1935.

According to Professor Sharp the field of Sociology is wide open to young people interested in phases of social work and is gradually winning an honorable place in our schemes of education and our programs of research.

"Wisdom," says Webster, "is the quality of being wise; ability to judge soundly and deal sagaciously with facts as they relate to life and conduct; discernment and judgement". In short, wisdom is the application of knowledge.

"Whoever of you is defective in wisdom, let him ask God who gives to all men without question or reproach, and the gift will be his." James 1:5 (Moffatt). What does James mean by wisdom? He means that peculiar insight which enables a Christian to understand and practice the religious life that is in keeping with the law of God. One who seeks knowledge is to be commended, but one who seeks knowledge at the exclusion of wisdom is one to be helped.

A pitiful situation, indeed, is that in which, day after day, a student crams his mind with knowledge but pays little attention to the wisdom needed to live a Christian life. In this age of complexity and uncertainty, we need Christian young people who have the right mixture of knowledge and spiritual wisdom. The lack of wisdom in spiritual things is shown by the seeming habitual back-sliding which is prevalent in our midst. Friends, we can't live a Christian life in our own innate wisdom. It takes wisdom from God; it takes that "peculiar" insight which enables us to stand firmly unmovable, in this, our day.

God does not reserve this wisdom for some and hold it back from others. It may be obtained by every Christian by asking God in unwavering faith. God gives it without questioning you or making fun of you. He gladly bestows it upon all who ask.

## Regents Name Dates For Opening School; Raise Fees for '51-'52

Raising of fees for the coming year, approval of plans for re-finishing some of the floors in Chapman and Morrison Halls and approval of an Easter vacation beginning next year were among the decisions reached by the Board of Regents at their recent meeting.

In order to help offset rising costs, tuition fees were raised \$15 per semester and board was upped \$20 per term. In addition, fees for part-time students were raised to \$10.50 per semester, which would include all fees except medical and student body.

Students taking over 17 hours per semester will also be required to pay \$10.50 for each additional semester hour taken. The new prices become effective Sept. 1.

Refinishing and improving the floors in the two resident dorms was approved by the Board. The improvements will be made during the summer vacation.

Beginning next year an Easter vacation will be included in the school year. The vacation will begin on the Wednesday afternoon before Easter and will end the following Tuesday morning.

Dates for the opening of school were announced. Summer school will open June 4 and will run through July 28. Registration for the regular fall semester will be held Friday and Saturday, Sept. 13 and 14, with Freshmen day slated for Thursday, Sept. 12.

"Furthermore, the records show that, of the outstanding leaders in this country serving in the major professions and heads of leading business organizations, the majority have come from the church-supported college or university.

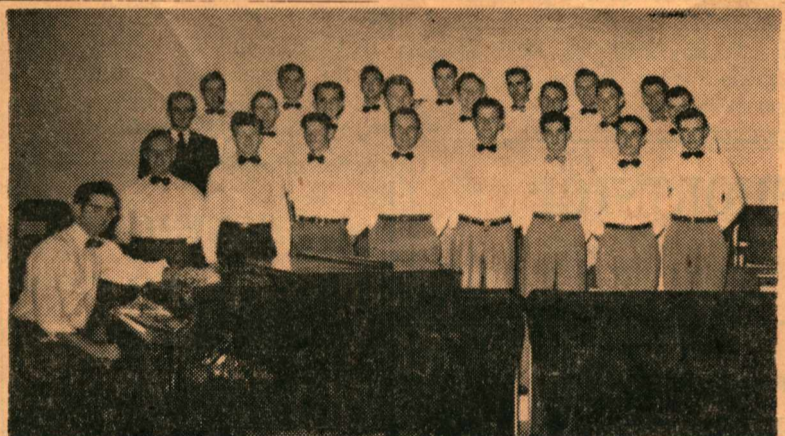
