Combination Senior Recital Tonight Features Carol Sharp, Pat Bolerjack

A combination senior recital, presented by two music majors, will be given by Patricia Bolerjack, pianist, and Carol Sharp, soprano, on Friday evening, May 11 at 8:15 in the N. N. C. chapel.

Patricia Bolerjack, a pupil of Aline Swann, Dean of the NNC Music School, has brought many music honors to the college. Two years ago, in competing against six other students from the state of Idaho, she won the state piano contest given by the student musicians group of Federated Music Clubs of America.

Ties for First

Then, again in Salt Lake City, in the district contest, a tri-state affair involving Montana, Idaho and Utah, she tied for first place. Last year, in addition to receiving one of the highest grades in the piano guild festival held on NNC campus, she won first place rating in the Guild's national recording contest.

She has studied formerly in Oklahoma City, part of which time was spent in study with Mrs. Swann at Oklahoma City University. Mrs. Bolerjack has spent two years at NNC and will receive her Bachelor of Music degree in June.

Soloist for Messiah

Miss Sharp, student of Charles Ross, has been the soprano soloist for "The Messiah" for the past two years. In 1949 she placed second in the state vocal contest given by the student musicians group of Federated Music Clubs at Idaho Falls.

She is a member of NNC's Karoleers (women's trio) and she has sung at numerous civic affairs in the Boise valley. She will be accompanied by Ruby Sanner, piano instructor of NNC.

Miss Sharp will sing numbers by Schubert, Wolfe, Wagner and Carpenter. Mrs. Bolerjack's numbers will include compositions by Bach, Beethoven, Schumann and Arensky. The final number on the program will be the first movement of the Tschakowsky Concerto in B Flat Minor. Orchestral accompaniment will be played by Aline Swann.

Benner To Deliver Commencement Address; Corlett, Hess To Speak Baccalaureate Sunday

Dr. Hugh C. Benner, president of the Nazarene Theological Seminary at Kansas City, Mo., will be the speaker at the spring commencement services on May 30. He is a graduate of Olivet Nazarene College, Kankakee, Ill., and received the M. A. degree from the University of Southern California and the honorary D. D. degree from N. N. C. In addition, he has done graduate work at Vanderbilt University and at Boston University.

Is Seminary President

Dr. Benner has served since 1945 as the first president of the Seminary, a three-year graduate school which offers the degree of Bachelor of Divinity and is the only graduate institution for the training of ministers and missionaries in the Church of the Nazarene.

Corlett to Speak

Dr. Corlett will be the speaker at the baccalaureate services which will be held Sunday, May 27. He will speak in accordance with NNC tradition by which the president of the college brings the baccalaureate address.

Dr. Weaver W. Hess of Clackamas, Oregon, and district superintendent of the Oregon-Pacific district will deliver the annual sermon Sunday night, May 27. Dr. Hess is a member of the NNC Board of Regents.

Investiture Held

The first of a scheduled round of pre-commencement activities began last Monday night with an investiture service at College Church where 92 seniors donned their caps and gowns. Rev. Elwood Sanner, professor of religion at NNC, presented the investiture address. His theme was "Where To—Futility or Fulfillment?"

The Associated Collegiate Press of Minneapolis has announced that the Crusader has received a first-class rating for the first semester of the current school year.

In addition, last year's yearbook, the Oasis, has been awarded first class honors. It is the first time in history that the Crusader has received such a high rating. It is equivalent to excellent.

Four ratings are issued by the Press: All-American or superior, first class, second class or good, third class or average and fourth class or below average.

General Revision Of Catalog Requirements Start Next Yr.

A general revision of the catalog numbers and group of requirements will go into effect with the beginning of the next school year.

Among the changes will be the four-point system of GPA rating, a major in nursing, provisions for a law major in connection with the U. of I. Law School, and a Religious Education Certificate.

The new catalog states: "For purposes of educational advantage and administrative convenience the college has adopted the divisional system, wherein departments whose subject matter is in related fields are grouped together."

There are five main divisions: (I) Arts and Letters, (II) Mathematics and Natural Science, (III) Philosophy and Religion, (IV) Social Sciences, and (V) Applied Studies.

The University of Idaho and N. N. C. have entered into combined liberal arts and law curriculum leading to the degrees A. B. and LL. B. in six years. The Religious Education Certificate is designed to benefit students majoring in other fields but who wish to gain college level training for volunteer religious educational work in the local churches.

R. N. Offered

The administration will cooperate with Samaritan Hospital in offering a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in nursing and registration in nursing (R. N.).

A new system of requirements will also be offered to those who wish a lighter upper division load.

The new plan will require the usual 128 hours for graduation but only 40 upper division hours. The other general requirements are unchanged.

Group Requirements Listed

Group requirement changes include Science and Math, 11 hours (but must include one lab course). Foreign Language, one year for most majors, none for some. Social Studies, 15 hours in the same courses excluding Philosophy; Humanities—12 hours in Literature courses offered by the English, Speech, Philosophy, and Foreign Languages Department.

Under this revised system the student must accept either the new or old plan and follow it through completely.

In Memoriam

Herbert Stanley, who died on April 18, was a junior here, majoring in Religion. He transferred to NNC from Chicago Evangelical Institute which he attended for two years and where he received the award of outstanding male student.

He was born in Ann Arbor, Michigan on June 29, 1929. He came to NNC last fall and is survived by his wife, Edith Supernois Stanley, of Nampa.

The locals have tasted defeat only once this season. That was in the recent St. Martin's relays held at Olympia, Wash. in which the Nampans placed sixth. Twenty four of the outstanding small college teams in the Northwest and Canada were entered in the meet.

The Crusaders finished behind Eastern Washington, Northern Idaho, Portland University, Whitworth and St. Martin's, who placed in that order.

N. N. C. Racquetters Bounce Coyotes 4-1

NNC's tennis team evened up their season's record of one win and one loss by trimming College of Idaho 4-1 last Tuesday.

The Crusader racquetters battle BJC in Boise this afternoon in their next encounter. Howard Titterington and Mervyn Gale, NNC doubles combination, remained in the undefeated class as they won their match with the Coyotes.

NNC's entries in the spring medley were Sullivan in the 440, Reynolds and Frazier in the 220s and Lais in the 880.

Whitman provided NNC's thinclads with stiff competition in a rain-soaked invitational meet at Caldwell recently but the Crusaders came out on top with a 72-point total.

Whitman chalked up 53 points for second place, BJC garnered 18 for third and C. of I. came in last with 13 tallies.

Despite the water, which was ankle deep in parts of the track, and a steady downpour, several good times were recorded.

NNC turned in two of their best games of the year last week but lost both times as powerful Northern Idaho trimmed them 4-2 and 6-5 in a day-night doubleheader.

All Tallies Unearned
