



Budget Passed 180-12

Wednesday the Associated Student Body passed the first semester budget for this year. The budget had previously been passed by the student council and the administrative council before being presented to the students.

The budget for this semester is similar to last year's first semester

budget. Only minor changes were made. The changes included an additional sixty dollars for the athletic department and an additional fifteen dollars for the high school.

The Speech Club was not allotted any funds for this semester. Forensics received one hundred dollars above that which they received first semester of last year.

Although the budget is four hundred dollars more than that of last year, a deficit of over three hundred dollars makes the effective budget only one hundred dollars over the first semester of last year.

One hundred and ninety eight students voted in the election Tuesday. Freshmen, in college, and College High School students were not allowed to vote for Who's Who.

All College Students and the 10th, 11th and 12th grades in the high school were allowed to vote in the budget election which was held in connection with the Who's Who election.

The budget was passed by a vote of 180 to 12. Six students who voted did not mark the budget ballot.

The results of the Who's Who election will not be released until they have been approved by the national Who's Who association.

A Letter to FMB

I would like to express my appreciations for your prayer and sacrifices for the cause of the foreign missions of our church. It was during the school year of 1951-1952, your FMB took a project to give 30 gospel records to my father's church: Sapporo Church of the Nazarene, Hokkaido Island, Japan.

The project was suggested by Mr. D. A. Jackson of Spokane, Washington. The records cost approximately \$85.00. And the package was mailed in the later 1951.

Upon receiving the records, my

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father raised money from the local congregation to put a loud speaker system at the top of the church tower. The speaker was loud enough to reach five blocks from the church and the music was sent out into the air fifteen minutes before every service. Within six months after this gospel music broadcast begun at the church, five people, among many others, testified that they came to the church and found Christ as their personal saviour because they were led to the church by the gospel music.

I thank you for your help and taking a part of His kingdom in Japan, but don't you think it is cheap to spend only \$18.00 to gain one soul into the kingdom of God? The records are now being used at Kumamoto Church of the Nazarene, the oldest Nazarene church in Japan (organized in 1913), where my father is now the pastor.

May His rich and abundant blessings be upon you and your missionary group for years to come.

society editor. She is a senior and a LSP.


