



'Handel's Messiah' To Be Presented December 11th

Season's greetings will be extended in the 21st annual presentation of Handel's "Messiah" by the NNC Philharmonic Choral Society in College Church, December 11, 1955 at 8:00 p.m.

Approximately 150 singers will participate, according to Warnie Tippitt, professor of voice and director of the Crusader Choir. A 25 piece orchestra including both students and community musicians will be directed by Prof. John Eby, a member of the music faculty and director of the college band and orchestra. The accompanists will be Double E. Hill at the piano and Mrs. Alline Swann, organist.

The soloists, all of whom have been featured in previous years, are: Darlene Gentry Emerson, soprano; Lois Barton Chaffee, contralto; Richard Lindbloom, tenor; and James Carkhuff, bass; Mrs. Emerson, now of Moscow, Idaho, is a 1954 graduate with an A. B. in music. This is her third consecutive appearance as soprano soloist. Mrs. Chaffee, wife of the president of Boise Junior College, will sing the contralto solos for the third time at NNC.

For Mr. Lindbloom, a 1948 graduate, this year will mark his fourth appearance as tenor soloist at NNC. Living in Boise, Mr. Lindbloom is active as music director at Boise First Church of the Nazarene.

Mr. Carkhuff, a 1952 graduate and now professor of voice, will sing the bass solos for the second time at NNC. He has also taken solo parts in "Messiah" presentations at the College of Idaho and the University of Oregon. Mr. Carkhuff directed last year's presentation.

This Yuletide event is sponsored by the Nampa Ministerial Association.

Represents Idaho

Joe Michel was chosen, Wednesday, as Idaho's candidate for a Rhodes scholarship.

He will be in Spokane, Washington tomorrow where he will compete with students from five other states for one of the coveted scholarships. Four students from the six-state area—Idaho, Washington, Montana, North Dakota, Oregon and Wyoming—will become Rhodes scholars.

Thirty-two American students in all—four from each of eight six-state districts—will go to Oxford University, England, for three years of study under the Rhodes scholarship program.



Michel and William Dale Olson, Idaho State College, were examined Thursday morning at Boise. Michel, NNC senior, planning a teaching career, was chosen to go to Spokane. He is believed to be the first NNC student to represent Idaho in the Rhodes scholarship competition.

Members of the Idaho examining committee were Dr. Donald R. Theophilus, University of Idaho president, chairman; Dr. Robert S. Smith, secretary, and J. L. Gibson, Jr., Salt Lake City.

Michel's home is in Monrovia, Calif.

At graduation from high school at Monrovia, he was given a \$1000 scholarship to Pomona College. He gained leadership at both Pomona College and NNC.

Debate Team Rated Excellent

Professor M. A. Wilson, head of the department of speech, revealed Thursday that NNC debaters and speakers have received their ratings from the Columbia Valley tournament at Pullman, Washington and the Western Speech association at Tacoma, Wash.

A number of NNC students participated in the two events but ratings were not made known until this week.

A debate team composed of Jim Ridgeway, junior from Roseburg, Ore., and Jim Martin, junior from Hammond, Indiana, received a rating of Excellent at the Tacoma tournament. Two other NNC debate teams rated average. Prof. Wilson said that the debate teams are coached by Rev. Eugene Stowe.

Carol Russell, Nampa freshman, received a first in poetry reading and a third in dramatic reading. Norma Phillips, sophomore from Lewiston, won first in extemporaneous speaking. Jim Martin placed third in his section of extemporaneous speaking. Martin and Ridgeway each received a second in impromptu and George Dillon, junior from Nyssa, Ore., rated a third in impromptu.

Prof. Wilson accompanied the teams to the tournaments.

College Degrees Pay Off

During his lifetime a college graduate can expect to receive about \$100,000 more income than the average high school graduate, according to a recent report by the Bureau of Census based on the 1950 male population. The direct and indirect costs of a college ed-

ucation were roughly estimated at \$9000.

Census data indicates that an investment in an additional year of schooling of each additional level is accompanied, on the average, by an annual increment rise from \$150 a year at the elementary level to about \$500 a year at the college level.

Coyotes Roll to 70-63 Win Over Crusaders

The basketball encounter between NNC and the College of Idaho "Coyotes", Tuesday evening, put the first blemish on the record of Coach Orrin Hills' quintet by a score of 70-63.

The Coyotes, tall and scrappy, grabbed a four-point lead before NNC forward Jay Dean found the range. Midway in the first half Darrel Reisch and Duane Peppley tossed in three and two buckets, respectively to threaten the Coyotes with an 18-20 score. But soon afterward the visitors took a 10-point lead and raised it three for a total of 40-27 as the first half ended.

In the second half, the Crusaders, paced by the shooting of Jay Dean and rebounding of his brother Mickey, trimmed the lead to 57-59 but the late NNC rally fell short of overtaking the visitors.

Snappy ball-handling sparked a last minute College of Idaho stall which produced two points for Coach Yandle's quintet. Crusader Harold Weber scored on a fast break as time ran out. Both teams hit 26 field goals but the Coyotes had the edge in free throws, 18-11.



Crusader, Jay Dean, drives between Coyotes' Chuck Jenkins, No. 11, and Gary Moore, No. 10, to score with a left-handed hook shot. Dean was leading scorer for Tuesday night's encounter with 10 out of 19 field goals and 3 out of 5 free throws for a total of 23.

(9) Both fellows and girls can break down prejudice by getting to know others better.

(10) Perhaps mixed groups and mixed group parties would help get kids acquainted and make them feel more at ease around the opposite sex.

(11) If occasions where everyone is expected to have a date were stressed now and then, more might date.

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
