There will be a special drawing at the church for off-campus students, and students who do not eat in the dining hall.

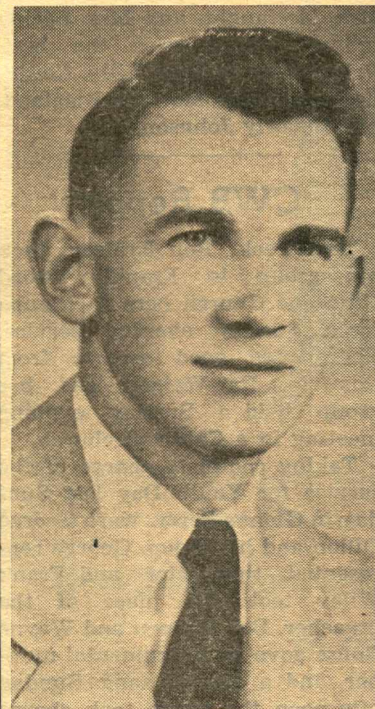
must have completed at least two semesters of college work by the time of departure. Those wishing to make the trip should contact Dr. Aller as soon as possible.

Last Sunday afternoon, Jim Martin, Captain for the Beat Olivet contest at College Church, made a tally of students, to find out how many were in Sunday School and how many were not accounted for.

Crusaders Split Southern Utah Tour

The Crusaders returned to the NNC campus Wednesday from their four-game basketball tour of southern Utah which saw them win two and lose two with Intermountain Conference foes.

Friday night playing at St. George, the Crusaders started things off by edging the Dixie Rebels 55-54. Saturday night, playing at Cedar City, Coach Orrin Hill's boys dropped a double overtime tilt to College of Southern Utah, 63-60.

Monday night in Price, the NNC lads lost another close one, this time to Carbon College 60-59 on a last-second jump shot by DelPonte. They ended up on a winning note, though, downing Snow at Ephriam by a 68-54 margin.

Contributing to the defeats was the temporary loss to the team of Duane Stueckle, ball-hawking first string guard, who injured his leg in the first encounter. A bright note, however, was the performance of newcomer Tom Tracy who stepped into Stueckle's position and showed up well. In the final game Tracy scored 19 points, second only to Mickey Dean's 23.

The entire team was hampered by difficulty in hitting the basket on the tour. Both from the field and the foul line their shooting averages were far below par.

Next week the Crusaders go out of the conference for a pair of games with Seattle Pacific. Monday night NNC hosts SPC in Central Gym and Tuesday night's game will be played in the Boise High School Gymnasium.
