Dr. Antonio Brico Speaks in Chapel

Dr. Antonia Brico, eminent American conductor and lecturer, was the chapel speaker at Northwest Nazarene College Tuesday at 9:35 a.m.

Dr. Brico lectured on the life and music of Albert Schweitzer.

She had slides and displays to accompany the lecture.

Dr. Brico's appearance was arranged by the division of fine arts with Double E. Hill as chairman. In commenting upon Dr. Brico's lecture, Hill said:

"We are extremely fortunate to be able to have Dr. Brico as our lecturer. She is well known as a choral director, a magnetic lecturer and a forceful and inspiring teacher."

Dr. Brico was born in Holland and is of Dutch and Italian ancestry. She entered the Master School of Conducting at the Berlin State Academy of Music in 1927 and was graduated in 1929, the only American man or woman ever to have been admitted.

In 1934 she founded the New York Women's Symphony Orchestra and has been a pioneer in securing equality of opportunity for women musicians. In 1938 Mills College conferred upon her the Degree of Music in recognition of her outstanding contribution to the progress of women in music.

A personal friend of the great Schweitzer, she has traveled to Africa twice to study with him in his jungle hospital.

The Crusader nine picked up their first wins of the season last Saturday when they swept both ends of a double-header dumping the College of Idaho squad 8-2, 4-3.

In the first game the Crusaders belabored four C of I pitchers for a total of 11 hits, three of them home runs. Peppley, Morgan, and Brooks all wielded the big bat for NNC. Cecil Campbell hurled the pitches for the Frazier men with Don Crawford behind the plate.

Campbell had a shut-out going until the last inning when one of his pitches careened off the edge of the plate and let in the first Coyote run. Crawford retrieved the unlucky pitch and rifled the ball to second in an attempt to pick off a C of I runner. The returning throw hit the rubber pitcher's mound and bounced back into the infield to allow the second Coyote runner to come in. Making the final score 8-2.

The second contest went into an extra inning. Boyd doubled down the left-field foul line with none away in NNC's last turn at bat. Mickey Dean then drove in with a long fly to center. Peppley then pounded a single to bring Brooks in making the score 3-2, NNC leading.

The Coyotes retaliated in their final-at-bat when Ryan blistered a drive off pitcher Kinyon's mitt for an infield single that brought Perkins in with the tying run.
