The concluding event in a memorable day will be the concert by the NNC Treble Choir at 8:30 p.m. in the college auditorium. Deloris Blomquist Waller directs the choir. Tonight's concert will be the final choir appearance at NNC for Joyce Wheeler, graduating senior.

5:30 p.m. The attire will be semi-formal. The tickets will be sold for off-campus students on Friday afternoon for \$1.00.

Dr. A. F. Harper Visits NNC

We are honored today in having Dr. Albert F. Harper, Executive Secretary of the Department of Church Schools, on our campus.

Dr. Harper has been called a "triple alumnus" of NNC. He graduated from the grade school in 1921, the high school in 1924 and the college in 1928. And in 1945 his alma mater conferred upon him the honorary degree of doctor of divinity.

Following his graduation from NNC, Dr. Harper went to the University of North Dakota where he obtained an M.A. He continued graduate work at the University of Washington where in 1934 he obtained his Ph.D. He was elected to membership in Phi Beta Kappa, national honor society, at this time.

In 1929 Dr. Harper returned to NNC where he spent 12 years as a member of the faculty. In 1935 he was appointed dean of the col-

leg. In 1945 he was nominated for his present post of service by the Board of General Superintendents and elected by the General Assembly. He was re-elected in 1948 and again in 1952.

Student-side, Dr. Harper was prominent in academic, social and literary life at NNC. He served on the Oasis staff for three years and edited the book in his senior year. Dr. Harper has done much writing since then. Included among his writings is a history of NNC written at the time of the Silver Jubilee of the college.

In his present position Dr. Harper supervises the general promotion of religious education activity and is editor-in-chief of church school periodicals including over 30 separate publications ranging from weeklies to annuals. His book, "The Nazarene Sunday School" is now in its sixth printing and has sold over 12,000 copies.

(Incidentally, Dr. Harper has two sons. One of them is preparing to enter college. We understand that he is a top basketball player. Coach Hills . . . !

The NNC boys tennis team has met with stiff competition this last week and has gone down to defeat by both C of I and BJC.


Playing Friday at C of I the fellows were downed 5-0. In a meet Tuesday afternoon here the Crusaders were defeated 3-2 by BJC.


