

This Award Program, now in its second year, offers a unique "onthe-job" training fellowship to an outstanding home economics major who will graduate from college this June. Former "Tip-Off" **Now Homecoming**

Thanksgiving weekend, this year, marks a new era in NNC activities. "Tip Off" has found its rightful place at the beginning of the basketball season. It has been combined with Alumni Day and what we now think of as Homecoming under the new title of NNC Home-

Tip Off itself isn't something new at NNC. The crowning of Dolores Bone in 1946 as the first queen marked the beginning of our Tip Off activities. When no queen was crowned in the next year it looked as though Tip Off would be as short-lived as the "Day of the Great Pumpkin."

This fear quickly passed though, and 1948 found Alice Schmidt reigning over the Tip Off festivities. Tradition was now fairly well established, and the next few years found Tip Off running like clockwork. Joanne Burkhart was Tip Off Queen in 1949, Carol Sharp in 1950, and Merilu Anderson in 1951.

1952 saw Mary Alice Galloway starting the Tip Off activities. Although Estelle Schroeder Wright and Lois Tracy reigned as the Tip Off Queens in 1953 and 1954, tradition was about to grind to a halt on "Tip Off."

Either the logic of Tip Off in the middle of the basketball season, the fact that more and more alumni were coming back for the Tip Off game, or both, caused a sharp change in 1955. That year Ardis Manley Quick was crowned as Homecoming Queen. So began the era of what we have known for the past five years as Homecoming.

Mary Wing Finkbeiner was chosen as our Homecoming Queen in 1956. The next year again saw a change in our proceedings.

Up to this time the president of the "N" Club had crowned the queen. But the year 1957 saw the crowning of Rosemary Aman Martin as Queen of Homecoming by the captain of the basketball team. But the idea of a huffing-puffingperspiring basketball player trying to crown the Queen didn't seem to mix with the elegance of the occa-

Back to tradition in 1958 with Marva Lund Yeend being crowned by the president of the "N" Club.

Even as our 1959 Queen, Jan Kellom, reigned over Homecoming, plans were being made to change it to the Thanksgiving season.

This was done primarily by the Associated Student Body Council. A big reason for the change was the number of students who had to miss Homecoming because of CWB and the between-semester holiday. This idea of joining Alumni Day and Homecoming at a more convenient time stuck and the new date was set. So this year we will have more than just a Thanksgiving holiday.
