The winners

(HPI) Tim Bunn, a sophomore Educ/Soc. Sci. major edged out junior Les Back for the position of Exec. Vice Pres. in Thursday's elections for the 1979-80 academic year. Bunn, who hails from Lafayette, Oregon beat out Back, who currently serves as a junior class senator by a mere 63 votes.

Out of a total of 717 votes cast, Bunn, also

a senator in the legislative body of ASNNC, earned 384 votes. Back, on the other hand, managed to capture 321 ballots marked with his name under the selection for Executive Vice President. There were also 12 "no" votes cast.

Other voting results showed Jana Bryson, a junior business major from Portland, Oregon winning the position of Business Manager. Beating out this year's Senate parliamentarian, John Osborne, also a junior and a business major, Miss Bryson won 392 votes to his 312. She has served for two years as the business manager for the CRUSADER.

As anticipated, unopposed candidates Susan Sieloff and Karen Taylor were selected to fill the offices of Social Vice President and Secretary respectively.

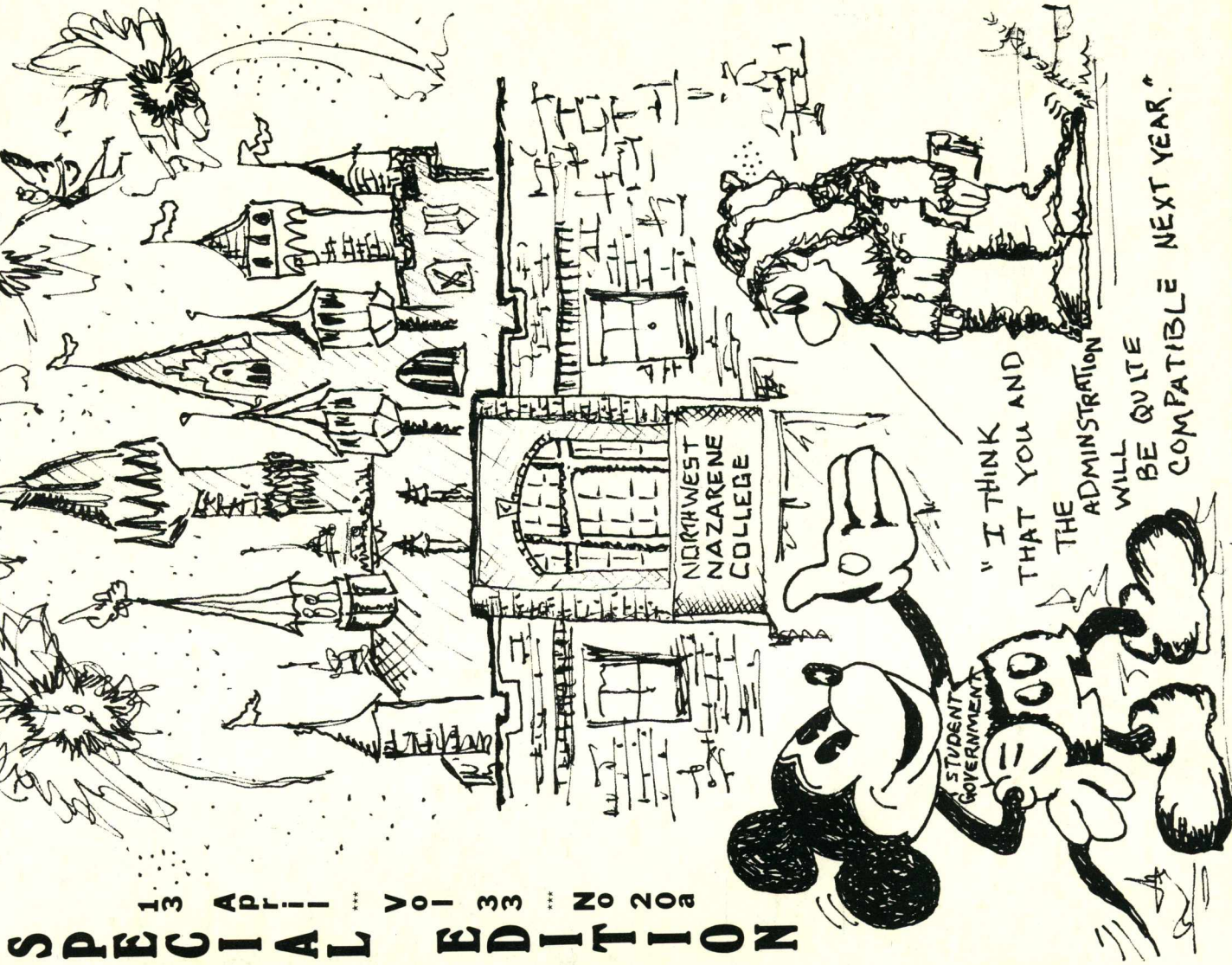

ASNNC Pres. run-off

"Isn't life strange? A turn of a page" ASNNC turns a page in its history this week with the election of a new Executive President. Out of a field of five candidates, yesterday's elections saw Dean Cowles and Doug Ries emerge as run-off selections.

A total of 64% of the entire student body turned out to voice their favorite selection from the five who had been running since last Friday, which included Mike Robinson, Doug Lamm, Perry Underwood, and the two run-off winners. Of the 717 students who voted, 266 or 37% voted for Doug Ries, a junior mathematics major from Albany, Oregon. Ries, who has served for two years as an associate justice beat out his next closest opponent Dean Cowles by just over 100 votes. Cowles, who has been re-elected twice as a class senator managed to earn 22% of the total votes cast, or 160 student ballots.

Surprisingly, Doug Lamm pulled in 16% or 117 votes, and was followed closely by Mike Robinson with 88 (12%), and Perry Underwood right on the heels of Robinson with 83 ballots (11%). Combined, the three losers gathered 39% of the entire student vote.

Following the posting of the election results, Cowles, a junior English major from Nampa, Idaho, reflected, "There was a good turnout, which split the vote many ways. It will be interesting to find out how the supporters of the other candidates will vote. I feel the direct experience I have from the Senate plus the initiative to express my specific ideas are probably my two most important qualities. I would appreciate careful consideration on the part of all voters as to what qualities they want in their ASNNC president."

Cowles has served in other areas of the campus besides student government including the tennis team, Model United Nations, N Club, soccer, and the Oasis staff. He has also been involved in various committees, among them the SLP, and the Coordinating Council for Planning.

Ries, who spoke during the campaign of the fact that none of the five candidates was actually "unique" has been involved with the Judicial Board and like Cowles is a member of N Club. Also a junior, Ries hails from Albany, Oregon and is an engineering physics major. Commenting after learning he had gained more support than any other candidate, the soft-spoken "winner" noted, "I'm not in office yet. But it does look good. There's still a
