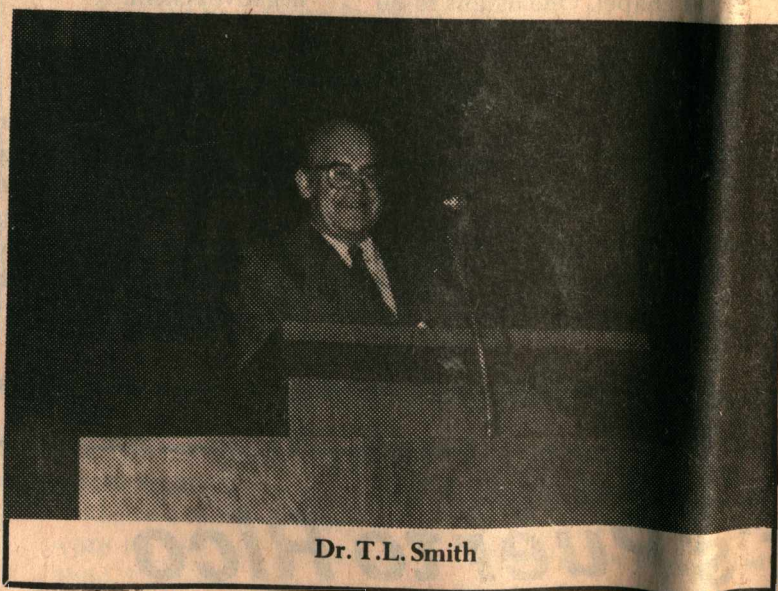

"Christians Need To Care"

"Our Father, which art in heaven..." These familiar words sounded through College Church as Dr. Timothy Smith went beyond the ritualism of the Lord's Prayer and brought out its central truths during the opening convention of spring term. Smith, Professor of History at John Hopkins University in Maryland, visited NNC's campus for three days before going on to another speaking engagement in Japan.

In addition to his role as Professor of History, Smith is Director of American Religious History at John Hopkins, a graduate program which he designed eighteen years ago. As he is primarily a research professor, Smith is free to go wherever his research leads him, and although he says he is "not a world

Wesley he has spent much time in Eastern Europe, and also recently studied American Black missionaries in the Caribbean Islands.

Prior to his work at John Hopkins, Dr. Smith served as a professor at ENC, Eastern Texas State, and at the University of Minnesota. The

went on to Harvard where he received a degree in American Social History.

During his chapel messages, Smith stressed the need to see one's personal gospel and social gospel as one and the same. "Christianity is against all cruelty, selfishness, op-

When asked about the specific tactics of doing this, especially in the Third World, Smith advocated "advancement of essential civilized values." He feels that people must be taught to set aside the "childishness of violence" and be instructed in ways of attaining health and longevity. Since he views the Third World as emulating Western society, he does not think that bringing Christianity to it should be separate from "civilizing" it. Smith himself however, has never been personally involved in working to bring these "essential values" to the Third World.

Over the last ten years, Smith has worked for better mutual understanding between evangelicals. He has concentrated on the pattern of sanctity found in Scripture. As a student of American

Regents Set Policy for 86-87

Near the conclusion of second term, NNC's Board of Regents met for several days of intense study and decision making pertaining to the school.

Two main areas of the Spring Session concerned teacher contracts and student affairs.

According to Jerry Hull, Chairman of the Student Life Committee, three major topics were discussed in the area of student life. The school has set an enrollment goal of 1,500 students for the year 1995. In order to keep in line with this goal, several things must be done in preparation.

First of all, the committee has requested a review of the college master plan in order to devise a better plan for the student center. As far as our current student center

posite. The task of the committee is to compare current student life with the expectations of local churches to find a medium. This will establish a range of the anticipations of the community and the district NNC can work with to revise ethical expectations.

Ethical standards must be maintained in order to please constituents without whom potential for campus growth would be nil.

The second area covered by Student Life Committee was an evaluation of student housing plans in general. If there are to be 1,500 students, housing facilities will have to be created for over 200 more people.

The addition of these facilities is not anticipated to bring any additional cost to future students as the buildings will be constructed through capital funds. Capital funding is obtained through various NNC supporters throughout the district.

The final area Hull is concerned with is the devising of a study committee to research behavioral expectations. The task to the committee will be to devise an "...interplay between the college and local churches."

Complaints come into the school saying NNC is too lax in its standards while others come in saying just the op-

increase is expected, but this will keep costs level with the CPI estimated cost of living increase. In general, no major tuition increases are anticipated.

A second major issue of the regents meeting was the contracts of NNC professors. Dr. Ken Watson pointed out that right away, the standard three year contracts for those who qualified were renewed.

After this formality was taken care of, Dr. Watson proposed the establishment of a Faculty Policy Council. The council would be made up for regents, NNC administrators and faculty members.

The task of this committee would be a total "re-visitation" of the faculty policy manual. The idea is to improve feelings of faculty members in general. Dr. Watson pointed out that, "There is nothing wrong with basic attitudes now, we just want to make it better for them."

Watson plans to "enhance" current faculty relationships. One of the ideas the committee will look into is that of a rank system among the faculty. He believes that some sort of incentive program could be very beneficial. He sees a possibility for merit and promotions in order to improve upon current attitudes.

Quite a bit was accomplished at this spring board meeting and some new ideas were introduced on NNC's drawing board of potential.

Republican Candidate Addresses NNC

On April 2, at 10:15 a.m. David Leroy, the Lieutenant Governor of Idaho addressed the students and faculty of Northwest Nazarene College in a convocation service.

In the convocation held in the Montgomery Fieldhouse, Governor Leroy gave his views of the wall of separation between church and state. Leroy said he believed the analogy that a wall of separation existed between the church and state was, "wrong and the metaphor was imperfect and the analogy improper."

Governor Leroy countered the analogy by saying that the First Amendment to the Constitution limits not the Church nor its members, but as an integral part of the Bill of Rights, it limits only the government. After he had sufficiently established that Christians are free and in fact should be encouraged to be involved in the political process, Leroy offered reasons why it might be to the advantage of Christians to participate in that process.

Leroy said that the economic situation is something with which Christians and more specifically college-educated Christians ought to be especially concerned. Leroy remin-

ded students that they would soon be seeking jobs in an economic system that is regulated and protected by the political process.

"Calvin Coolidge said that the business of America is business, and if that is so, then the business of Idaho is small business," Leroy claimed. And it was his contention that for that reason all Americans, including Christians ought to be involved in their government. Leroy commented that 80% of business in Idaho is small business, and that therefore citizens should watch, influence, and participate in the legislative process.

Perhaps the focal point of Governor Leroy's remarks was the point at which he said, "The involvement of Christians in the political process will not narrow the debate, but will broaden its horizons.... Idaho can learn something from NNC."

Many of the remarks made by Lt. Governor David Leroy were typical of those that might be made by a politician on the campaign trail. Leroy is indeed on that trail this year running against former Governor and Secretary of the Interior, Mr. Cecil Andrus.

NNC To Hear World Christian

On Monday, May 5, Dr. R. Eugene Rice, Professor of Sociology, University of the Pacific, Stockton, California, will present the John E. Riley Intellectual Life Lecture for this academic year.

Dr. Rice, a graduate of Pasadena College, earned a Ph.D. degree in Sociology from Harvard University. In addition to his task at the University of the Pacific he is frequently used as a consultant to the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching in the area of professionalization of faculty. He is a consultant to the Northwest Area Foundation. The Northwest Area Foundation report entitled *Faculty Lives: Vitality in Change*, 1979-1984, was authored by Dr. Rice.

Dr. Rice will address current social dimensions in American culture with some reference to the issues dealt with in the recent book, *Habits of the Heart*, Robert Bellah, et al.

In addition to speaking in the extended chapel on May 5, he will speak to the faculty on the afternoon of May 5.

The John E. Riley Intellectual Life Lecture series was established by Dr. John E. Riley and is designed to bring to the campus of Northwest Nazarene College eminent scholars whose offerings could enrich the intellectual experience and stimulate the pursuit of academic excellence in our campus community.

Dr. Riley served as President of Northwest Nazarene College from 1952 through 1973. The John E. Riley Library is named in his honor. Dr. and Mrs. Riley make their home in Nampa.



Chapels Good, Could be Better

The NNC chapel/convocation service is an exceptional part of campus life. The chapel concept unites the student body, facilitates corporate worship, and allows for collective learning experiences. It is an invaluable part of this "Christian liberal arts education" NNC is striving to provide.

However there are two problems with the current chapel/convocation framework. Chapels and convocations are supposed to be

"induced". The "force" or "coercion" is the process of financially damaging the individual with fines if they fail to attend 25 chapels. Many students are fined who are excellent academic students, active campus members, and exemplary Christians. Do these students really deserve to be punished? Students already experience 'money problems', the threat of a fine is one additional pressure students could do without.

What should be established is a positive means of encouraging student attendance at chapel. One means to do this is to offer chapel credits for attendance. These "credits" would be non-transferable institutional credits. The student would be required to have 9 chapel credits to graduate. One credit a term and the student could exercise choice for three terms, this could allow for

student teaching or internships. The current system of chapel excuses would be maintained. The student would be fulfilling an institutional requirement...part of the NNC experience. A final idea to add to this credit

A system would be a \$5 reduction in a student's bill for every chapel attended over 30. This suggestion could be tried for a year on a trial basis. It would eliminate the current negative system.

The second problem in the chapel/convocation system is the use of Montgomery Fieldhouse for major events that are "non-religious." Students tend to be more noisy and less attentive when convocations are held in the

P.E. Building. This term, Idaho's two major governor candidates, ASNNC Nominating Speeches, and a major historian will confront a rowdy audience in Montgomery Fieldhouse while NNC Forensics, a Boise Piano Quintet, and the NNC promotional film will be presented in College Church. College Church, as an auditorium tends to cause students to show their best side...that is good for NNC. All of the forementioned suggestions are meant to strengthen the chapel/convocation concept. Chapel will always be a pillar of the NNC experience.

Thillet's Puerto Rico

In meditation, I reclined over the years of an old tree and saw like an old movie seen many times, of which I know every detail, the history of my beloved Puerto Rico. From the grandeur of a Spanish conquest to a power of its own. This island located between Dominican Republic and St. John resting on the warm waters of the Caribbean is my home, and I want to share it with you. Imagine about 8 months of Spring with Summer the rest of the year. A year long picture of warm weather with beaches all around.

The capital, San Juan, has a subdivision called "Old San Juan" where the Spanish castles have displayed their majesty for five centuries. The metropolitan area, including the capital, has a population of over 1 million. There are large urban areas with continuous lines of concrete houses that are homes for a large amount of people. The total Puerto Rican population numbers nearly 3.5 million, averaging over a thousand persons per square mile. Although these are high

numbers, the over-population problem is only felt in the city since most of the people live there.

Many products are produced in factories by Puerto Ricans. For example, Tylenol analgesic, Converse tennis shoes, Howell and Atari computer systems, and even the earphones used in commercial airplanes are made in Puerto Rico. The government is one of the largest employers, followed by the private sector and small business. Though the Island is only 100 miles long and 45 miles wide, Puerto Rico is of vital commercial importance to the United States because it serves as a bridge between North and South America.

The issue of the Island's political status has raised the interest of Americans. Does Puerto Rico want to be a state or independent? At the moment Puerto Rico has a unique political situation called the "free-state". In other words, Puerto Ricans pay income tax, and also eat in McDonald's after using their American Express Card to buy the latest Euro-

American fashion at "The Gap," or "J.C. Penney." The U.S.A. form of government is used, but we do not vote for the President of the U.S.

Education is very important to Puerto Ricans. The average worker has a Bachelor's degree because only highly educated persons will be able to find jobs. The literacy rate is in the high 90's, and there are no Native Indians living at the present; the Spaniards took care of them in the 1500's. The Island was under Spanish dominion until the Hispanic-American War in 1898, when it was annexed by the U.S. As a consequence, Spanish is the predominant language, but English is taught in school from the first grade, which means that most of the people are bilingual.

Hopefully you have a better idea of what Puerto Rico really is like. There is no other place in the world like it. Puerto Rico, the Shining Star of the Caribbean. And now back to my dreams...

So now, we bid farewell to Doc Gallup, Don Peavey, Daryl Hinton, Robb Warwick, and Rick Young.

It is our great misfortune to have only been able to witness Gallup's abilities for one full season. Gallup transferred to NNC for the 1984-85 season, from Umpqua Community College in Roseburg, OR, where he also went to high school. Unfortunately, before fans could really begin to enjoy his talents, he went down in January of '85 with torn cartilage in his knee. He was lost for the rest of the season. "I kind of asked God what I needed to be learning," explained Gallup in reaction to his injury. "There's more to life than basketball. Maybe it took a season out of basketball to get that through to me. I give God the glory for what's come my way."

Gallup recovered to come on strong in a reserve role for the Crusaders this season. "My role was to provide strong bench play that didn't break the flow of the team," said Gallup. "Whenever I entered the game, I wanted to keep the continuity of the five guys on the floor going." Gallup accomplished his objectives to the tune of 4.8 ppg and 4.4 rpg. He may be remembered most though for gathering in Chuck Blackhurst's missed shot with five seconds to go to enable NNC to down C of I 170-69.

Gallup graduates this spring with a degree in General Studies. He has an emphasis in both business and education. Unlike the other seniors, he is not married or even planning it at this time. He does have a good friend, though, by his own admission, in senior Becky Hill, who will graduate this spring with a degree in Business and Office Administration. "I'm not ready to get married yet," Gallup admitted, "but if I were, I'd put my money on Becky. she's great."

Peavey accomplished through a lot of gut, hard work, and determination, what many guys only dream about doing. Peavey spent his first two basketball seasons in Nampa terrorizing the intramural league. "I don't have any regrets," commented Peavey on his college career, "I'd do it all over again. I'm glad I can say I played college ball."

The Crusaders other man in the middle, Hinton, ended his career by pacing NNC on the boards with a 6.8 rpg while adding 11 ppg. His play late in the season helped propel the Crusaders to their 15-3 after January first run. "It took a while for me to decide I could play with any other center in the league," reflected the 6'8" Mt. Home product. "Matlock helped bring that out. It felt good to make a visible difference."

Unfortunately for the Crusader faithful, Hinton's season ended a few games shy of even his teammates. Hinton went down with a knee injury in preparation for the

playoffs. Surgery was performed and Hinton saw only very limited action in the

With the doubleheader sweep of TVCC, NNC appears to be headed, slowly but surely, back to respectability as far as its baseball program is concerned, and the overall record has improved to 5-6. A few things may be pointed out where the Crusaders are doing well, and some where improvement can still be made.

Defense -- This area has made a strong improvement over last year's club. This is partly due to the individual's ability to understand their assigned position. Last year's lineup was often shifted around because of injuries and a lack of depth, but this year's team knows basically where they play and what is expected of them. Evidences in the TVCC doubleheader of good individual defense were shown particularly by Chris Davis in the first game and Steve Metcalfe in the second. Davis, the junior first baseman who is a BSU transfer, showed very good range and quickness in successfully playing some tough grounders. In the first part of the second game, Metcalfe made some remarkable catches to keep the Crusaders within shouting distance until their bats got warmed up in later innings. The center-fielder helps to provide stability to the Crusaders' defensive outfield. Not to be forgotten are some newcomers, including sophomore catcher Greg

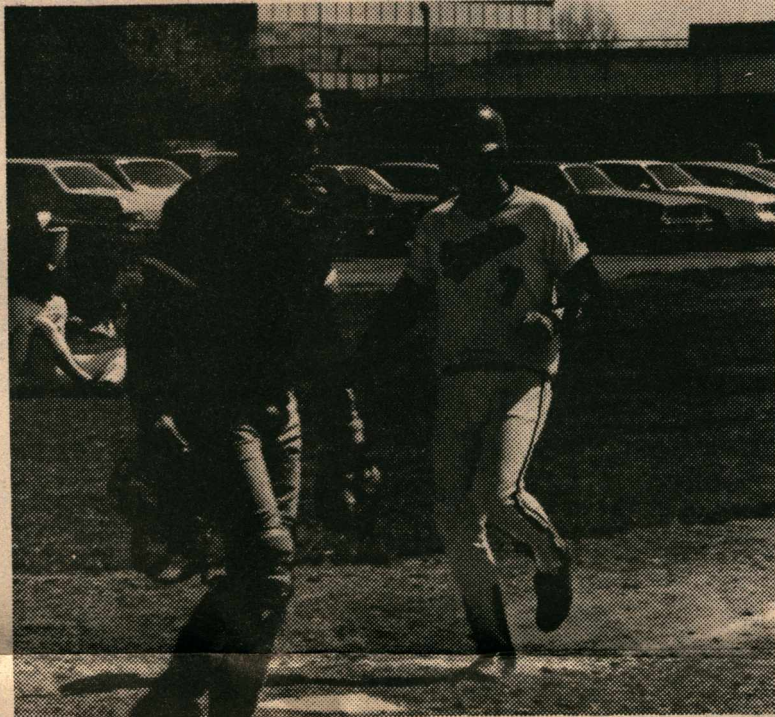
only senior on this year's squad, second baseman Mike Hurley, has become a maturing and stabilizing influence to the other players, and others who have had

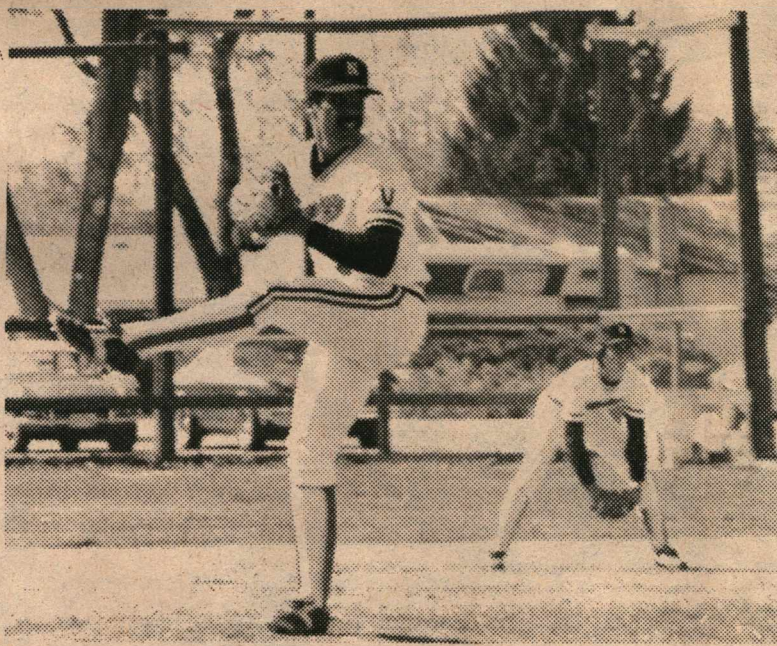
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Experience -- Even though this is a very young team, it has a good blend of poise and what one might almost call youthful exuberance. The



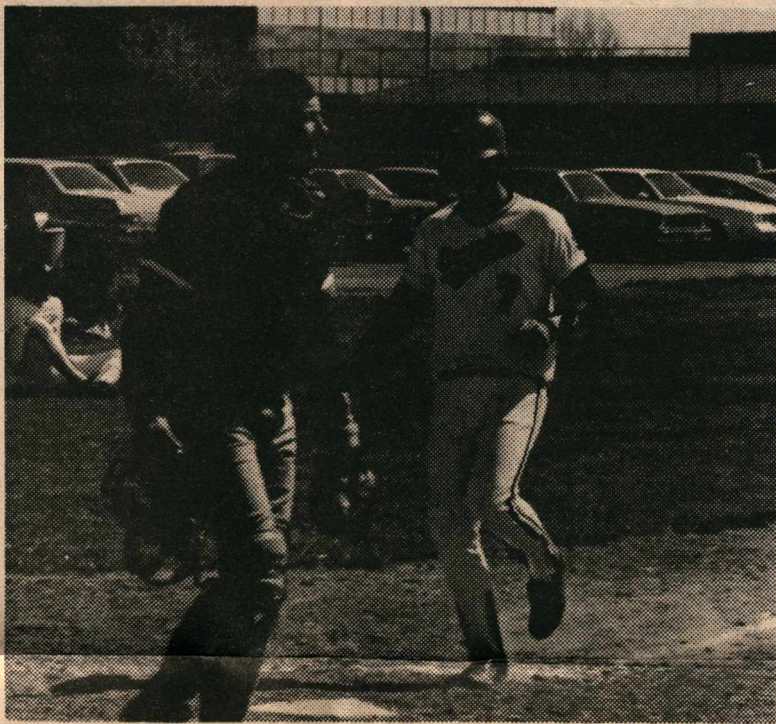
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all homered in one or more of the five home games this year. And Matt Garringer, Davis, Hurley and Tim Fulwood are hitting quite well for average this year.
