Campolo will be speaking in chapel Thursday and Friday, September 20 and 21, as well as speaking in various sociology classes on campus throughout his two day stay. He is also the author of several books, including A Reasonable Faith, Who Switched the Price Tags?, 20 Hot Potatoes Christians are Afraid to Touch, and The Kingdom of God is a Party. At one time, Campolo had his own T.V. show, and he has also

appeared on Good Morning America.

Campolo's primary goal for this week is to encourage youth ministry and the Christian faith in Treasure Valley. "I learned how we could all work as a team," said Culver RA Christie Mitchell, "and how much support is out there."



Mary Curran is a new


Social Work professor here and has a masters from Howard University. She has just completed ten year ministry at the Community of Hope in urban Washington D.C.

At the end of last weekend's NNC Invitational Soccer Tournament, the Crusaders found themselves in an encouraging second place. College of Idaho swept the tournament with three victories, while Whitman and Simpson finished third and fourth.

Thursday's game against C of I found the Crusaders stuck on defense, especially in the first half. C of I won the contest 2-1.

On Friday, NNC rose to conquer Whitman 3-2. The Crusaders played more offensively in their second

game of the tourney than against C of I, but defense was still the controlling factor in the match. It should be mentioned that both of Whitman's goals were scored as results of questionable calls by game officials.

The Crusaders successfully overcame Simpson College 4-2 on Saturday in a match that was, at times, too close for comfort. The score would have been 3-2, were it not for a Crusader goal kicked in by a Simpson player.

After last weekend's tournament and a road trip to Salt Lake City in earlier this month, the Crusaders are 4 and 2 in pre-league action. Already the team has

playing time and experience and they possess a lot of individual, and team talent. The middle hitters (Terea Josephson, and Stephanie Arland) did a great job!"



In their last meeting of the 1989-90 school year, ASNNC senators debated long and hard before finally appropriating \$1200.00 to publish the Access, a new and improved student handbook. Questions were raised about the necessity of such a publication, but the finished product speaks for itself in the matter.

The Access is a twenty-page publication containing information about student life,

student development, campus offices and services, and the Nampa community.

In past years, the student handbook (formerly called the Outlet) was something that students looked at once and then tossed in the garbage. In creating the Access, ASNNC Community Relations Coordinator wanted to include information that is frequently sought after but very difficult to find, thus making the student handbook more of an NNC reference guide.

ASNNC President Leanne McKillip, who worked closely

with McKenzie on the project, explained that the Access was created "in order to inform students about the services that are available to them, the people who are working for them, and the opportunities they have to become involved."

Some of the Access's most helpful features include an explanation of NNC's student government system, a diagram showing due process at NNC, a directory of campus offices, a list of clubs and campus ministries, and a church and community guide.


