Counting butterflies for summer research

Erin Chamberlain, Biology major, researches butterflies in Idaho's Sublett Mountain range

Do camping trips and counting butterflies sound like real summer jobs? Taken together, it's one really fun job at least, says senior biology major, Erin Chamberlain. She spent this past summer working with Dr. Powers, researching butterflies in the Sublett Mountain Range, in southeastern Idaho.

"My project was estimating the number of butterflies in Idaho. No one's ever really studied butterflies in Idaho. No one knows much about them," said

up to the Sublett range for two to three days at a time, with the help of senior biology majors Julia Paz and Cody Schneider.

"I didn't know anything about butterflies," Erin said, "it was a cool way to do my senior research. And I got paid for it!"

The process for counting

the butterflies involved walking along a line one kilometer in length, called a transect, and counting every butterfly that is seen close to or far away from the transect. Erin walked transects in three different canyons, counting anywhere between 100 to 300 butterflies each time. Once she counted up to 500.

"It was interesting to see the different species come and go," Erin said. "Some weeks you won't see any [of one species] and another week, a hundred."

This was the easy part. Erin also had to build a butterfly trap that was 12 feet tall and just as wide. Formed of metal poles and a lightweight netting, the trap is 4 sided at the base, with an opening at ground level on one side. According to Erin, butterflies tend to fly mostly upward and avoid flying

> down. So they would enter the opening and then fly up into the trap and be unable to escape. The trap was collapseable and rolled up for easy transport.

> In any project, there are bound to be unforeseen difficulties, as Erin discovered.

> "There are a lot of cows up there," Erin

said, "we put [the trap] up over the road and we had to watch it sometimes because of the cows. One time I was there by myself and this big, black angus bull was slobbering and being scarey and was coming right to the trap!" She was afraid the cow would try to go through the trap and tear a hole in it, in the



"I was throwing rocks at it and I was yelling. I was getting ready to lower the trap and finally, he decided to go around it. Another time, a herd of cows did go through our trap--it was all fallen down and had two small holes in it." Then she added, "Julia stepped in our trap once."

Marking butterflies was another important part of Erin's research. She chose to mark and study the Weidemeyer's Admiral, which is black with white stripes. First she had to catch the butterfly with a butterfly net.

"You had to learn how-there are certain tricks of the trade that I learned from Dr. Powers. If you see a butterfly laying on the ground, you have to set the net over it, or tap the ground right behind it and it'll start to fly, so you can whip your net around and catch it," she explained.

Because butterflies are somewhat fragile, Erin had to be careful with them. "When I first started," she said, "I thought I was going to . . . kill them all. You're supposed to reach in and grab their abdomens and pull them out--never touch their wings."

While she or another researcher held the butterflies on the top of their abdomens, one would make a tiny dot with a felt tip pen on one of the white stripes; this actually did not hurt the butterfly at all, as the wings are really made up of tiny scales. "The goal was to catch them again and see how far they moved from the first time we caught them. Out of 200 [we marked] we only recaptured 8."

Erin is currently working on a poster to take to the Murdock meeting, which is a gathering of students from various colleges who have researched under grants from the Murdock foundation.



Born on March 21, 1977, in Seattle, Washington, Christa Klosterman has lived with her parents and two sisters most of her life. Though raised her whole life in a church, Christa still has a testimony that will encourage the strong, the weak, and hopefully you.

"When I was only a few weeks old, I started attending a Presbyterian Church with my family. I attended there until I was in junior high, then our family started attending a Christian Missionary Alliance church. In '92, we moved to Boise and I started attending Valley Shepherd Church of the Nazarene in Meridian," Christa said. "I constantly was learning something new that needed to be applied in my life

and lived out and this didn't matter what church I was in."

Christa accepted the Lord at age five. "While my Mom was at a Friday morning Bible study, the babysitter mentioned having to ask Jesus into your heart to be saved. I said to the babysitter, 'Why didn't you tell me this before?' and it was then that for the first time I asked Jesus into my heart and asked for forgiveness of my sins."

"It was one of the hardest things that I have had to constantly work with. When I first found out, I

was always praying that God would heal me . . . I never was totally healed, but in tenth grade, the arthritics was said to be in remission, which meant that it was still there, but not active and so not as much pain, if any." It was that day that she learned to be thankful about everything.

"I had to learn to trust in God more and more. There are some things that I can't physically do and I have to have faith in God, that he will help through all these areas of my life."

Through this, her faith has been strengthened. She still believes in a God of unconditional love, and is continually growing in him. "This experience or struggle has brought out more than a stronger faith, but it also, I believe, brought out the characteristic of determination, the desire to give

everything my all. This has been evident even in my Christian walk among all the other things that I do."

Teen Bible quizzing had an

important role in strengthening her faith. "When you saturate your mind with God's word, God uses this whenever you need it. God also spoke to me through this, sometimes by

popping whole verses into my mind or part and each time that happened, it was specific for what I needed at that time."

When Christa was in high school, the saying 'What would Jesus do (WWJD)?' became popular, and she remembers a friend and leader who really lived that out. "Debbie Weaver, our youth pastor's wife and quiz coach... gave me an example of what I should be doing. My mom also helped out spiritually and in other areas, she knew what I was going through and was able to be an encouragement, especially with some of my harder struggles."

Christa is now in her third year here at NNC, and, as she puts it, "God's not finished with me yet." May her testimony be an encouragement to all.

Be Here Now is the name of the latest effort put forth by the English band Oasis. Unfortunately, effort wasn't the biggest factor involved with the making of this CD.

Be Here Now (Oasis' third album) starts off with the first single from the album entitled, "D'you Know What I Mean?" The song isn't too shabby, but you have to put up with over a minute of helicopter noises, distortion, and other sound effects before the music even starts. Then once it starts, you keep wait-

ing for it to stop. The first song alone is almost eight minutes. "D'you Know What I Mean" is actually a decent song, but they could've very easily shaved a minute or two off the beginning and end. Instead, they keep playing and playing and playing and playing...you get the picture.

Oasis, headed by the Gallagher brothers, Noel and Liam, are the front-runners of the band. Liam sings and Noel writes all of the songs and plays guitar. Noel is obviously struggling with the stress of having to write 12 songs to fill the quota of a standard album. Songs like "My Big Mouth" and "It's Gettin' Better (Man!!)" should've been left on the cutting room floor. It's almost like they needed two more songs for the album so Noel sat down and hit a few random chords on his guitar while his producer accidentally hit the record button. Then they added the unnecessary feedback and whiny lyrics later.

Be Here Now does have some bright moments, however. "Stand By Me" (not the song from the 50s) is a somewhat slow ballad they do, it's pretty good stuff.

that is a surprisingly cool song about a troubled relationship. "The Girl in the Dirty Shirt" is also a track definitely worth a listen. "All Around the World" is a very catchy song that you can't help but singing along with. It has horns and strings thrown into the mix; pretty good stuff.

Unfortunately, there are a few more weak links. For every "All Around the World" there is a "My Big Mouth." The entire CD is about seventy minutes long, which makes each song about six minutes in

length. This takes a lot of effort on the listeners part to stay interested Songs used on the radio will most likely be edited down to three or four minutes.

Oasis has also had some trouble broadening their horizons. A lot of are falling to the

Green Day Syndrome, which basically means that their songs are starting to sound the same or at least very similar. The second single on the CD "Don't Go Away" echoes the big hit on their last CD "Don't Look Back in Anger." Not only are the lyrics similar but the actual song is almost a mirrored image. Even the guitar solo is almost the same note for note. Did they actually think we wouldn't notice? Well, it didn't work.

Overall, Be Here Now is a fairly average CD. If you're a die hard Oasis fan, I'd recommend it, but otherwise you may want to pick up their last CD called (What's the Story) Morning Glory? instead. Be Here Now is more of an acquired taste. It's going to take a few listens before the songs start to click, but when

The long awaited sequel to Dark Forces is out, and Kyle is back, teamed up with Jan and looking to save the universe again. Only this time Kyle is an up and coming Jedi branding not only his trusty blaster, but a light saber as well. In comparison to its predecessor, Jedi Knight: Dark Forces II has no comparison. LucasArts has gone all out to develop a first person game that

is comparable to Doom when it first came out. With outstanding 3D graphics and a realistic feel while playing, this game is instantly placed among the great Star Wars games and the great person first shoot'em ups.

If the game play and graphics do nothing to keep you interested

then the well thought out plot definitely will. The game starts Kyle out finding information about his father and his past. Through a gradual process, he learns the ways of the force and becomes more attuned in his abilities to use it. These abilities complement your existing abilities making you jump farther or run faster. You as the player must make the choice all Jedi must make. That is, it is the players choice to choose the light side or the dark side of the force. Depending on how you play, Kyle will learn and follow either the dark side or the light side of the force. It is this choice that leads the player into a whole new level of play that other first player games cannot give you. Your choice to follow the light side is made by circumventing through the maze of civilians and non-hostile droids while the path to the dark side is followed by blowing through every moving object you see, friendly or not. The ultimate choice of your destiny is solely dependent on you. By choosing one side or the other, the purpose of you succeeding in your quest is changed. But coming back to the plot. After finding out about your past, Kyle discovers that dark Jedi Knight's are plotting to use the power of the Val-

ley of the Jedi to take over the universe and it is up to you to find and defeat these Dark Jedi.

To compare the changes that were made since the original Dark Forces, one first notices the live action cut scenes instead of animated cut scenes. These live action cut scenes show Kyle as a twenty-something with a full beard, reminding me of Commander Riker.

> Jan is also shown as well as the Dark Jedi. The acting in these cut scenes is mediocre at best and really is the only complaint that can be made about the game. I personally never pictured Kyle to look like Commander Riker The usual cast of characters is back like the storm troopers

and Reylee's but a new member is with us in a couple of levels, Tusken Raiders. Also along with the ride is the usual implement of weaponry with the addition of a bow caster and the light saber which is not an easy weapon to use. What also makes the game nicer than the original is the ability to store bacta tanks which restore health points when needed. No more desperately hunting down life points when you are low.

Finally, it is the level layout itself that makes this game far superior. With a total of 21 puzzling levels, it is not just a quick run through the maze or a blow up everything that moves game. The addition of civilians keeps you on your toes and sensation of what to do next. "I'm lost" is one that is always with you. Sometimes the route that needs to be taken is not that obvious. Sure there is a map, but the quality is severely lacking and really provides no help at all. One has to just sit through and figure it out the hard way, which makes the game far more entertaining than just running through the motions. So I invite you to strap on your holster, clip on your light saber and clear your mind. May the Force be with you.

Prayer in a hostile environment

I'm angry.
What?
I'm angry.
You can't be angry,
you're a Christian.

Wrong--please tell me where in the Word it says to not

where in the word it says to not be angry.

Well, don't you think

Well, don't you think that it hurts your image as a Christian and the image of the church to be angry?

No, and here's why. The church has stood by long enough attempting to avoid being labeled with a term perceived negative--"angry." Now we just call ourselves "righteously indignant" and attempt to show the world that we are accepting. The problem with this is that a church will become whatever it tolerates. Not only have we allowed what used to be perceived as sin to slip by, but we have also allowed this nation to become a religiously hostile one. It's time for the world to see that the followers of Christ will not allow the perversion and abuse of the church to continue.

(I just want to add right here that I don't believe that the church should become militant or violent, rather it needs to stand up for that which is right.)

Do you actually believe that the U.S. has become a religiously hostile nation?

Definitely. The courts have become hostile toward religious expression and if you watch television at all, you can see that religion and religious people are constantly labeled as the crowd that has lost touch with reality. Allow me to illustrate my point with three recent Supreme Court decisions.

First of all, there is the court case of *Brittany K. Settle vs. Dixon County School Board.*This case comes from Dixon County, Tennessee. Brittany K. Settle was given a typical research assignment, and the students were allowed to chose any topic and had to use four sources. She was not the only student to write about something spiritual. One student wrote about reincarnation. An-

other wrote about the occult, and another wrote about spiritualism. Brittany wrote about the life and times of Jesus of Nazareth. For this topic, she was awarded a zero, and the decision was upheld all the way to the Supreme Court. For some reason the other topics were fine, but you just can't write about Jesus in a public setting. Sounds like religious hostility to me

Next there is the recent case from Mississippi, where the state passed a law which stated that voluntary prayer was legal. This law was created to clarify for parents, teachers, administrators, and especially for students, that voluntary prayer in school was completely constitutional. But someone didn't agree and took it to court.

On January 10, 1997, the Fifth Federal Circuit Court of Appeals declared that voluntary prayer is not constitutional-a student cannot pray if he or she wants to. In fact, they said they would permit prayer in only one setting-high school graduation. The reason was that graduation was a once in a lifetime event, and prayer is a once in a lifetime event, so the two go together rather well. Religiously hostile? I believe so.

Third there is the May 1997 case of Jane Doe vs. the Santa Fe Independent School District. This case also addressed the issue of graduation

prayer. This federal court said that the students most certainly could have a graduation prayer, as long as they prayed the right words.

The following is directly from the court case: "This court will allow prayer if it is a typical, non-denominational prayer. The prayer may refer to God or the Almighty, but it must not refer to Jesus. And make no mistake, this court is going to have a United States marshall in attendance at graduation. If any student offends this court and mentions Jesus in a prayer, that student will be summarily arrested and will face six months of incarceration. Anyone who violates these orders will wish that he or she had died as a child when this court gets through with it.'

Folks, that is hostility toward Christianity if ever there was. We don't even give six month jail sentences for manslaughter, but we're going to throw a student in prison for that long simply for mentioning the name of Jesus in a prayer?

This is what I'm angry about. We as a church have sat by the wayside and allowed this to happen to our nation--it's time to stand up. But you see, these cases are based all in the same false premise that our history demands that we protect our heritage. Who do you think pays for the organization of Time Out? Someone has to be paid for putting the whole thing together. And who pays for it? Right again; ASNNC Dues. That \$50 you pay covers everything from paper clips to funding the fencing club.

The largest chunk of the \$50 goes to pay student salaries. This includes ASNNC officials, newspaper staff writers and editors, and all year-book employees.

This is basically showing that all of the money that we pay is actually being put to use. It's not simply falling through the cracks. Every penny has been accounted for. When you think about it, this is probably the best \$50 any of us has ever invested.



Castro names brother next successor

Raul is believed to be able to keep communism strong in Cuba.

HAVANA, CUBA -- As of last week a successor has been named for President Fidel Castro; Raul,

his 66 year-old brother. Being the future president, Raul has been urged to be unified in maintaining communism.

Castro felt that the party was fortunate that his brother was the number 2 man. "Raul is younger than I, more energetic than I," Castro

said. "He can count on much more time."

Through his manner of unusual explicit discussion, it was made very clear that Castro chose his younger brother as Cuba's successor. His discussions were aimed at the rumors claiming Castro suffers from ill health. So far Cuban officials have denied it and there are no direct references.

Raul is the vice president of the government and head of the armed forces as well.

He went along with his brother in the revolution that brought Castro to power, and was even more was closer allies with the communists than his own brother at the beginning of that revolt.

Along with his decision, Castro has ordered the party to exercise collective lead-

ership and maintain unity for reasons of other revolustions failing because of a division.

It is very important "that this revolution never can be corrupted by anybody ... that it can never be destroyed by ourselves," said

Castro also pushed the fact that the party needed to defend the ideals of the revolution. "We know that those ideas have a very long life and I understand the relative role of men," he said.

Castro also emphasized Marxism-Leninism, many times referring to the party's heritage and to the experince of Lenin, Mao and other communist leaders.



Chinese bishop arrested for underground religious movement

Bishop Su fights religious persecution; American group tells the tale

Shanghai, China -- The Chinese Catholic bishop that disappeared last year after troops destroyed a statue of the Virgin Mary was reportedly arrested this last Wednesday, October 8. Bishop Su Zhimin of Baoding in the northern province

of Hebei has been in hiding for the last 17 months in the nearby town of Xinji, where he was arrested. Baoding police forces have declined to comment and the Xinji police are unaware of the arrest thus far.

Bishop Su, 65, is a promient leader in the underground Catholic movement. He has been jailed for a total of around 20 years in prison. In 1993, he was ordered to attend a "re-education seminar" for three years after celebrating an outdoor mass.

Under chinese law Catholics are allowed to worship under the monitor of the state controlled Patriotic Association. Allegiance to Rome is prohibited by law and China has no

diplomatic relations with the Vatican

"Bishop Su's diocese is one of China's largest-- about 85% of the people living there are Catholics," stated Joseph Kung of the Cardinal Kung Foundation, the American group that released this information to the press. "They are all very active and strong supporters of the pope, and all have been persecuted."

The bishop first went into hiding after 5,000 troops with helicopters and tanks infiltrated the village of Dongluin in May 1996. Their purpose was to destroy the shrine of the Virgin Mary that the townspeople had erected.

The statue had drawn tens of thousands of people to the area in the time that it existed. The military did this to prevent a similar act in

1995 that had attracted Catholics from all over China and the surrounding countries.

The bishop at this time appears to be in good health except for loss of hearing that extends from beatings given to him while in captivity.

Cassini launch postponed; protests continue

With the launch postponed, protestors work to halt future launch

CAPE CANAVERAL, FLORIDA -- Monday, October 13, was supposed to be the launch of the planetary probe Cassini. However, the launch, which was supposed to take place in Cape Canaveral, Florida, was postponed due to technical problems and strong winds. Fortunately, the launch was only postponed and is scheduled to take place no earlier than Wednesday.

Although most NASA officials are excited about the launch, there are a few who are less than comfortable with the 72 pounds of plutonium that Cassini will use for fuel. In protest of the launch 70 people held a candlelight vigil outside the White House and opposing NASA officials did not show up for the launch.

In contrast, the supporters of the Cassini project brought their entire families to watch the launch. One official was reported to say, "I have 30 members of my family here right now, including my two granddaughters and there's more on the way. I invited everyone I love to the launch."

NASA officials have continually tried to

reassure the public that the plutonium-laden Cassini probe doesn't pose a threat to them or anyone for that matter.

Last Saturday, a federal judge in Hawaii denied a request to block the scheduled launch for Monday.

Being that plutonium is radioactive, people, even past NASA employees, aren't comfortable with the fact that this radiation could

be showered over the Earth if something were to go wrong either during the launch or during the planned flyby of Earth in

Still officials insist that even if the

blastoff fails, the plutonium that would be released would be little, as well as the exposure of it around the world

The Cassini probe, when launched, will travel to Saturn where it will orbit the planet. its rings, and moons for four years. This exploration will hopefully give humanity insight into questions about creation and Saturn itself.

The downside to this exploration (aside from the \$3.4 billion it will cost) is that the plutonium could leak during takeoff and spread nuclear waste over a large area. Fortunately, the odds of a radioactive leak in the first 3.5 min. after launch are 1 in 1,400 and the chances of a leak later in the launch is 1 in 476. Unfortunately, these numbers seem to be guesswork and have little to no statistical value.

"I find that NASA bureaucrats in some sense are living in fantasyland," Michio Kaku, a physics professor at City University of New York, said. "Pure guesswork has replaced rigorous physics. Many of these numbers are simply made up."

Those against this launch want NASA to redesign Cassini so that it operates on solar energy even if it means delaying the probe until the technology exists to do away with the plutonium.

"Saturn isn't going anywhere," Bruce Gagnon of the Florida Coalition for Peace and Justice said. "We are not opposed to space exploration. We just think it must be done properly."

October 16, 1991 -- Kodak gets their U.S. patent for an improved method of recycling PET polyesters.

October 20, 1991 -- The State of Georgia's plants and animals are found to be slowly disappearing after several biological surveys. 230 plants and animals are recommended for protection, which is up from the 80 from before.

October 14, 1992 -- More than half of the nation's most common polluting industrial solvents could be eliminated in a decade without significant cost to industry. This was found out after California's Metropolitan Water District and the Environmental Defense Fund made their questionable study in the area.

October 17, 1995 -- A \$1 million federal suit is filed by the environmental group, Greenpeace, against France. This suit was demanding the return of a boat that the French military seized in the south Pacific during a protest.

October 18, 1995 -- China announces it will build at least four nuclear power plants within 5 years to increase megawattage from 2.100 to 20,000 by 2020.

October 19, 1995 -- U.N. states weapons inspectors are checking to see if Iraq might be developing a radiological weapon.
