This week's cover is on the Religious Left, and what it believes in. And it's much, much broader than just the abortion issue.


The "Religious Left" isn't simply a group of misguided Christians who are pro-choice and believe in gay rights. Some of them don't believe in either of those issues.

## New Professor joins NNC staff: Dr. Karen Smucker

*Dr. Karen Smucker joins the NNC faculty and community as the Professor for Special Education*

Dr. Karen Smucker, with her energetic personality, has been an asset to NNC since the moment she joined the community. As NNC's new special education professor, she has a vast store of experiences in both the practical applications of her field and in the scholarly applications of her discipline.

Smucker has not always been a teacher. In fact, she considers it to be one of the last things that she would have done when starting out in life.

College did not really suit Dr. Smucker the first time, she spent a few weeks after getting out of high school in college and then began an assortment of odd jobs that run the whole spectrum of things one can do. From working in a poultry factory (which is about the bottom of the list, but made great money), working along side a veterinarian, leading horse rides through Shenandoah National Park, to stitching jeans in a Lee jeans factory, Smucker has done a little of it all.

She grew tired of working for other people and began her own business as a house painter. This was good work in the summer, but leaves something to be desired for the winter.

When she was thirty, she went to the local community college and began looking for courses that might supplement her income in the winter.

After finishing her community college program, Dr. Smucker began to look for a continuing program to further her studies. At the University of Virginia, she began their specialized program on emotional disorders in adolescents.

The program included a masters degree as well as a teaching credential. Through the first year of the program, she wasn't sure about going into teaching. During the second year, she wasn't sure about teaching in public schools. By the end of the program, though, she was hooked on the subject and began applying for jobs in the public schools.

She loved her public school classes and made a real impact in the lives of her students. In a situation that was both good and bad, the size of her class dropped because of

budget cutbacks but it made it easier for her to move on to a position elsewhere. It was at this same time, a friend and colleague was pushing her to finish her studies and get her doctorate.

After looking all around the nation, she finally settled back at the University of Virginia to complete a doctorate in special education.

Upon completing her doctorate, she got married to Mr. Jim Shelley and moved to Indiana.

"My husband and I didn't like Indiana very well. I don't do well in clouds." After teaching at Valparaiso for two years, she came to NNC.

Moving to Idaho was something that Dr. Smucker had wanted to do since her childhood.

"I've always liked Idaho." In middle school, she passed through the area with her family and then

eighteen years ago she went camping with Ruthanne Garber of the business department in the Sawtooth Mountains. "I've been in love with the place ever since." When applying to graduate programs, she tried several in the state but none of the programs offered exactly what she wanted at the right price.

She actually applied to NNC two years ago at the advice of Garber, but for one reason or another, the school didn't get to her before she renewed her contract at Valparaiso. The school did have the foresight though, to ask her to consider a position beginning the next year.

"There are certainly advantages of knowing a year in advance where you are going."

Her time at Valparaiso gave her the feedback she needed from other Special Education teachers before moving to NNC where she is the only Special Education professor.

"I was really excited to come to NNC because all across the Northwest when people talk about education programs, they talk about the great program at NNC. And this is great also because it is one of the flagship programs of NNC."

Raised in a Mennonite home, Smucker was introduced to the Christian faith at a very early age. She stayed in the church even through her rebellious period, but felt that she grew away from God spiritually. She attended the same church as her parents, but more out of habit than anything else. She also liked to

sing the hymns and fellowship with the rest of the church.

Still, she began to move away from God and stayed at arms reach until she returned to college.

It was in a psychology class at her community college that she began to move back toward God.

"It was in that psychology class, at a school that wasn't a Christian

college, and heard things that sounded like they were out of the Bible... so I began to read the Bible and began to read a chapter or so a day." Dr. Smucker knows that, "God was after me. He never once dropped me."

"Finally, one day I realized that I was still hanging on to some of that sin. One day I just had to face myself and submit myself to God or totally reject it and I didn't want to be that kind of person. It was one of the hardest things that I ever did. [But it has] made all the difference in my life."

Dr. Smucker believes that this experience is most helpful to her work because she understands the rebellious nature of people. She was in her thirties before she ended that phase in her own life by giving her life over to God.

Dr. Smucker has now been married to her husband, Jim, for three years. She believes that it was the cultural influence of the 1960s that kept her from getting married until now. She took her husband's last name as her middle name. This causes some interesting situations as people try to decide how to address her and her husband.

She is related to the Smuckers of Smucker's Jams and Jellies. J.R. Smucker was her grandfather's first cousin. She was told stories growing up about J.R. going around the countryside selling his apple butter.

Dr. Smucker has two nieces and two nephews along with her other family in Virginia. She also has two stepsons that are in their thirties.

# The Class of 2001, who they are and what they believe

Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company did an extensive study on the first graduating class of the new millennium. Students from over 101 colleges were surveyed during an extensive 25 minute telephone interview.

The results of the study were very informative.

The class of 2001 is the class of the Clinton's daughter Chelsea, and they head up the first group who will come of age in the new millennium. For freshman in college, these students show a great deal of sense. They view the world with both their hearts and their heads.

They are optimistic and idealistic but realistic at the same time, meaning the goals they set for themselves will more than likely be met.

Because of their idealism, the Class of 2001 is extremely motivated, but at the same time, they are able to recognize the challenges they will have to surmount in order to reach their goals.

As far as contentment stands, the freshman class typically is happy with who they are and how they look. They feel that religion is an important part of their lives, or at

least that it will be someday. Most desire to get married and have children. More importantly their focus is towards others, not themselves. This translates into a great number of students who are active volunteers in their communities. These students realize that America can become a better place if they will only do their part.

Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance noted that the Class of 2001 has "a deep respect and admiration for their parents." Northwestern Mutual said the students listed moms as being the person they respected the most with fathers immediately after.

These students also desire to see improved race relations. Many firmly believe that during their generation either a black or a woman will be voted into the White House and they believe they can change the government from within the system. As active participants in the government the Class of 2001 plans to use their vote noting Education as their first priority. Education was chosen for two main reasons. Number one, this class sees learning as a life long experience and number two, many felt unprepared for college because of

the education they had received previously.

When it comes to work and family, the first class of the new millennium puts a priority on family, but at the same time does not have a problem with divorce, premarital sex, living together before marriage, two income households or working over 40 hours a week to meet a financial goal. The statistics were slightly over 70 percent for each category, but the push is on for financial security in the form of houses and retirement accounts.

Their views on life, though more liberal in some ways, more closely reflect the views of their grandparents and previous generations. In fact, the older the generation, the more trust the Class of 2001 puts in them. There own peers then rank lowest as far as trust is concerned.

When it comes to what careers the Class of 2001 would like to pursue: education/teaching, medi-

cine, business, computer-related fields, law and psychology were the top rankers. And with these career choices, 33 percent added that receiving a high salary is important and 26 percent responded that "high job prestige" is very important.

The survey was conducted over the phone between the dates of November 11, 1997, and January 12, 1998, over a national sample of 2,001 college freshman from 101 colleges and universities. The "representative sample [was] stratified on three dimensions: by geographic region, by student enrollment and by school affiliation: public or private. Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company claims that the survey was accurate to 95 percent with a two percent deviation.

# REVIEWS

## Crichton novel translates well to silver screen

In case you didn't see any of the previews or advertisements for this movie, I will start with a bit of an overview. *Sphere* is yet another movie based on a book by Michael Crichton, author of *Jurassic Park*, *The Lost World*, *Congo* and *The Andromeda Strain*. It is rated PG-13, and stars Dustin Hoffman, Sharon Stone and Samuel L. Jackson. As a fan of Crichton's books, I was excited about seeing this movie, but a little bit leery after my disgust at the atrocity Hollywood made from Crichton's book *Congo* (my apologies to those who liked it). My fears were for naught, however, and I found the movie to follow the book fairly well and actually found myself riding the tide of emotional thrills and chills even though I already knew how it was going to end.

The movie is about some scientists who are called in to investigate what we are initially lead to believe is an alien spaceship. The fact that the ship is one thousand feet underwater of course becomes a main part of the suspense. Upon entering the spacecraft, our hapless heroes discover a large golden sphere (surprise!) and later begin communicating with a mysterious entity known as Jerry. The plot thickens and, as usual, people get drowned, burned, squished, etc... Though none of the

violence is very graphic, it is all quite creepy and contributes greatly to the overall suspense of the film.

*Sphere* had both good points and bad points. If you are the type of person who does not enjoy science fiction and suspense, then you will probably not like this movie. Of course, that means you didn't really like *Star Wars*, so don't complain and go rent *Jerry Maguire*. For those of you who do enjoy a good sci-fi thriller, you may find that the movie seems rather typical at times if you have seen the movies *Leviathan* or *The Abyss*. *Sphere* was a better movie than these, and the acting, directing and special effects were quite good. The main thing that keeps this movie from

being just average is the big mystery of what the sphere actually is. The answer is a bit unlikely, but it is still pretty cool and the conclusion to the movie leads to some interesting discussions while driving home from the theater.



## Blockbuster soundtrack carries Titanic tradition

No, this is not an article about the movie *Titanic*. This is an article about the soundtrack. When I first bought the CD, I was so excited. I'm a huge fan of movie scores and I knew when I watched this film that this score was a good one.

The soundtrack to *Titanic* was written and conducted by James Horner. Horner has written over 100 scores for film and television, including such film hits as *Braveheart*; *Sneakers*; *Willow*; *Searching for Bobby Fischer*; *The Devil's Own*; *Ransom*; *Courage Under Fire*; *Jumanji*; *Apollo 13*; *Casper*; *The Land Before Time* (the first three); *Legends of the Fall*; *The Pelican Brief*; *Patriot Games*; *Clear and Present Danger*; *The Rocketeer*; *Swing Kids*; both *48 Hours*; *Honey, I Shrunk the Kids*; *Glory*; *Die Hard*; both *Cocoons*; *Aliens*; *Captain Eo*; *Commando*; *Star Trek 2* and *3*; *An American Tale* and many more. The score to *Titanic* ranks as one of his best.

The soundtrack to *Titanic* is much like the film; sweeping, majestic, romantic, and tragic all at the same time. It starts off with a beautiful (although synthesized) bagpipe solo. This sets the tone for the rest of the soundtrack. One thing that makes for a good soundtrack is if you can listen to it and totally picture the film while you listen. This soundtrack definitely does that. Some of the best songs on the CD are tracks 11-13: "A Promise Kept," "A Life So Changed" and "An Ocean of Memories," respectively. These are the songs played near the end of the film, so, naturally they are sad, but also very beautiful.

The biggest draw of the soundtrack is the love theme of the

movie, "My Heart Will Go On," performed by Canadian diva Celine Dion. Although I would not call myself a big Celine Dion fan, I really like this song, mostly because of the music. The music was written by Horner with lyrics by Will Jennings. The music is the same as track number four, entitled "Rose." The only difference is that there are no lyrics, only a chant-like vocal line by Swedish artist Sissel. Anyone who likes "My Heart Will Go On," will enjoy the instrumental version, "Rose." This, to me, is the best format for a

soundtrack; mostly orchestral music with one, or maybe two, lyrical songs, usually the love theme.

Although this is one of the better soundtracks in my collection, it is not the best. I personally like Horner's score to *Braveheart* bet-

ter, but *Titanic* does beat out *Speed* and *Far and Away*. With such beautiful themes as this album has, sometimes the luster is lost because of the use of synthesizers. James Cameron, the film's director stated that, "James [Horner] has walked the tightrope by using synthesizer, vocals and full orchestra to create a timeless sound which tells us that these people were not so very different from us." Most of the time the sound is wonderful, but there are spots where the synthesized sound is so blatantly obvious, it's distracting.

The *Titanic* soundtrack is definitely a good one, that's why it's up for an academy award for "Best Original Score," an award held by scores such as *Dances With Wolves* and *Star Wars*. I recommend listening to this score to anyone who enjoyed the film or simply enjoys listening to soundtracks.

As such, he is being consulted by the administration as to the functioning of the institution, its vitality and its viability. 





# Who is really right about the

Over the past few weeks there has been much discussion on campus concerning the Christian Coalition and its leader Pat Robertson. Snickers erupt from some at the mention of the name, while others are enraged at the dregs the name of the Christian Coalition is being taken through. The problem with the Christian Coalition (and the Religious Right), is that it seems to be the only group where Christians

can get involved in politics, but few realize that the Christian Coalition is not the end all for participation in religion and politics. The Christian Coalition is often considered to be the mouthpiece for the Religious Right, even though there are other organizations that are a part of the Religious Right: Focus on the Family, The Family Research Council and the American Family Association to name a few. Yet there exists another side: the Religious Left. But what is known of the Religious Left?

The basic problem of the Left and Right labels is that they often, mentally, come before "Religious." They are the Left or the Right, the Religious part is easily and quickly dropped for convenience when it is time to give the dirt on the "wrong side." Each side desires only to tell you the problems of its opponent. The Right will then call the Left: Marxists, humanists, feminists and homosexuals. The Left can in turn call the Right: bigots, elitists, anti-humanitarian and anti-homosexual.

Would Jesus be on the Religious Left or the Religious Right? Jim Wallis, editor of the magazine *Sojourners* and a voice for the Religious Left, would claim that the answer to the question, or even the question itself, is completely preposterous. Jesus had no need of po-

litical parties. The definitions of Right and Left exist to allow for freedom of choice and individuality. When few people see eye to eye on an issue, there must be parties to represent each viewpoint, or a party that will allow for a spectrum of similar viewpoints. The problem arises

between the two sides when each tries to make the other appear "less-Christian." Which raises the question again, "Which party would Jesus belong to?" The question is not what party would Jesus belong to, but through which side can each Christian best serve and live out their Christian lifestyle and commitment to Christ?

However, there are certain political tendencies that can be used to describe the mind set of the Religious Left. Of utmost importance to the Religious Left is the recognition of the shared dignity of humanity. All people need to be loved with the love of Jesus, no matter what their lifestyle, gender, race or age may be. Such a stance means that the Religious Left, politically speaking, usually believes that the church needs to pick up where the government is no longer able to help, the Left believes in Christian moral responsibility. It is not that the Right does not emphasize the Christian moral responsibility, but that the Left stresses the importance of Christians in all careers to see their position as part of their stewardship, part of their moral responsibility to the earth and their fellow men. "Religion best contributes to pub-

an active role, even take the initiative at times, in society, and must give help where help is needed. Issues where the Religious Left often sees a need to become involved includes everything from affirmative action to full employment, legal abortion and gay rights. Yet within the movement, there is a vast difference of stances taken on these issues. Abortion is most likely the hottest topic. Many with the Religious Left are pro-choice, but not pro-abortion, while some advocacy groups, such as the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice, want to make certain that each woman can choose for herself what is




does not qualify as Right? Such a loose definition leaves much to be desired. The term "Left" seems to get in the way of defining what the Religious Left really is.

Jim Wallis is as much a spokesperson for the Religious Left as Pat Robertson with the Christian Coalition is for the Religious Right.

In the December 31<sup>st</sup> *Sojourners* issue from 1996, Jim Wallis wrote that "people are deeply disillusioned with both political parties and political choices in general, that the old solutions—liberal and conservative, Left and Right—no longer supply adequate answers to our problems, and that more and more people are eagerly searching for alternatives" (7). Willis further discussed the rationale behind either side, Left or Right, to claim victory based on political race turn outs. Such a rationale is more than fallible, it is dangerous.

in terms of divisions for fighting political and cultural wars. That is an excellent question, and the answer is that we have reached the sorry state when such discussion is inescapable" (Neuhaus 10). America is a democracy and because it is a democracy it is important that there are differing political parties, but for Christians, political parties are not where the highest alle-

point fingers at the Religious Left. Both sides have their share of short comings. Jim Wallis, editor of the publications *Sojourners*, believes that perhaps the bickering between the two sides, instead of each side using its means toward a helpful end, might be the largest part of the problem. Who wants to be a Christian when the Christians cannot decide who they want to be?

The existence of a Religious Left began in earnest in the 1960s. Before the Christian Coalition was formed, there was Martin Luther King, Jr. and his crusade for equal rights for people of color. More recently Jesse Jackson, and the various black churches that support him, have been prominent members of the Religious Left. For Jackson, an issue the church needs to meet is that of race relations.

But for all this involvement with issues that are well known to most, the Religious Left seems to partake in politics on a smaller scale

It places importance not on where each side can serve in politics but on which side can conquer or "one-up" the other. A movement should be judged by the concrete changes that take place, not by who can get more candidates into office. Having elected officials run for office on their Christianity or having constituents told that voting a certain way is "Christian," places God in a box and does not allow Christianity to define itself. Both sides are equally to guilty of such practices but neither side seems willing to discontinue.

# War criminals surrender in Bosnia

BOSANSKI SAMAC, BOSNIA-HERZEGOVINA — Two Bosnian Serbs that have been charged with leading an ethnic cleansing, surrendered Saturday to the U.N. war crimes tribunal. They are the first Serbs to turn themselves at this point in time and their surrender could become a turning point toward cooperation from Bosnian Serbs and the court.

Milan Simic and Miroslav Tadic left Saturday for Tuzla where they will meet up with NATO troops that will accompany them on to the Hague in the Netherlands.

"I hope that this is the beginning of the end of the demonizing of the Serb people," Tadic told reporters at his home on the Sava River, 38 miles from Tuzla.

The surrender follows the election of a pro-Western government for the republic. The

new prime minister, Milorad Dodik, stated that the country would abide by the 1995 Dayton peace agreement and that the government would cooperate with the tribunal. Dodik is also setting up an office for the tribunal in the capitol.

While Simic and Tadic have denied all charges against them, they believe that the trial will be fair. An unbiased trial "is the only thing that we demand or expect," said Simic.

Simic and Tadic are two of six men that were indicted in a ten-page document on the war crimes that were committed in the town of Bosanski Samac. Simic was an assemblyman at the time and is charged with being part of the mob that beat Muslim Muhamed Bivic with iron bars and chair legs in June 1992. Tadic is a former teacher who was placed as the chairman of the local "Exchange Commission." The Commission was the arm of the government in charge of deporting non-Serbs to prison camps. Along with the movement the Commissions is believed to have performed many executions.

Simo Zaric is another of the six men charged. Local papers have reported that he will turn himself in to the tribunal as "soon as



he is ready."

"I have not given up my intention to surrender to the Hague tribunal, but I have postponed this act for a certain period," Zaric is quoted in local papers as saying. "I will turn myself in to the Tribunal as soon as I am ready and once a few legal matters are cleared up." He refused to elaborate any further.

Chief Prosecutor Louise Arbour hailed Simic and Tadic for their voluntary surrender and wished to persuade the rest of the fifty-two publicly indicted people to surrender also.

"The voluntary and unconditional surrender of Simic and Tadic is significant because it represents the first surrender of the accused from the Serbian Republic," Arbour stated. "I assure the remaining fifty-two publicly indicted accused that they are not going to avoid the tribunal's jurisdiction forever and I invite them once again to surrender themselves..."

## Gas incineration to begin

*Nerve gas stored near Hermiston, Oregon*

UMATILLA, OR -- For those of you who might be surprised to discover that large quantities of nerve gas are stored near Hermiston, Oregon, never fear. Federal authorities are planning on installing 22,000 tone alert radios in area homes that will warn area residents of a gas leak should one occur when the Umatilla Chemical Depot begins incinerating its chemical stockpile next year.

About 12 percent of the nations chemical weapons are stored at the Depot.

Fears that local emergency crews would be unable to respond to such a leak will hopefully be alleviated by a government promise of \$25 million to beef up emergency response equipment.

In addition to the radios, the Chemical Stockpile Emergence Preparedness Program (CSEPP) is planning to install new portable radios in every police car in Umatilla, and a new negative air flow system for

the Umatilla Police Department that would keep gas out of the building.

Other improvements include protective gear for firefighters (to be delivered this fall) and stockpiles of supplies at area schools.

A number of local authorities are wondering where the money which supposedly was spent on preparation actually went. *60 Minutes* filmed a short piece on the subject last month. "The federal officials were flabbergasted that these things hadn't taken place smoother than they had," said Mayor Don Eppenbach of Irrigon, Oregon after a meeting with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in Washington D.C.

David de Courey, FEMA regional director in the Northwest, emphasized at the meeting the government's desire to protect Umatilla citizens. "I think public officials at all levels have an obligation to these communities. This meeting was an effort to carry out these obligations in a collaborative effort."

## Texan is found Convicted

*Former midshipmen given life in prison*

FORT WORTH, TX -- A Texas jury found Tuesday that former Naval Academy midshipmen Diane Zamora was guilty of murdering a 16-year-old romantic rival. Former Air Force cadet David Graham will be tried later this month for the same crime.

The charges against the two stem from an incident in 1995 when the formerly engaged couple's relationship was on the rocks. Graham had told Zamora of a one time sexual encounter with 16-year-old Adrienne Jones of Mansfield, Texas. The two then conspired to kill her.

Prosecutors have blamed Zamora for acting as judge, jury and executioner. "Adrienne Jones is dead because that woman... demanded that it be done," stated the

Assistant Prosecutor Michelle Hartmann.

Zamora is said to have hid in the back seat of her parents car while Graham drove Jones to a secluded lake. Zamora proceeded to hit Jones in the back of the head with a dumbbell. When Jones fled, Graham shot her.

Texas District Judge Joe

Drago refused to allow the jury to consider a non-capital punishment charge in this case. Non-capital punishment carries a sentence of five to 99 years in prison and

the defendant is eligible for parole in 30 years. Capital punishment charge carries a life sentence or the death penalty. Zamora will automatically receive a life sentence because the prosecution did not seek the death penalty. She will be eligible for parole in 40 years. Zamora and Graham are both 20.

# Weather causes China Airlines to crash into a rural area

TAIPEI, TAIWAN -- Police closed off a semi-rural area Monday in order to pull bodies from the homes that were destroyed when a China Airlines jet tried making a foggy landing, but crashed, killing all 196 people aboard.

Among the passengers killed were the governor of Taiwan's Central Bank and other key financial officials, as well as Taiwanese families that were returning from their vacations in Bali and four Americans.

According to witnesses, the airliner crashed hundreds of yards short from the runway of Chiang Kai-shek International Airport, 25 miles west of Taipei. The jet tore its way through second floors of homes while stringing itself out along the highway just before skidding into a rice paddy and exploding.

Not only did firefighters have to respond to the fire from the jet itself, but to the houses of the blackened neighborhood as well.

Firefighters had their hands full with this crash, filling body bags from wreckage and rural areas, as well as having to spray the area with flame-retardant detergent.

"I heard a blast, and was scared to death. Parts of the house started to fall down," said Chen Ah-mei, who happened to survive as she crawled her way out from her ruined home. She and her husband were being treated at a hospital near by.

Heavy fog was reported around the airport throughout that afternoon and into the evening, also a light rain was falling at the time of the crash.

Airline officials said that the plane was experiencing some difficulties with its approach to the air-

port. "Visibility was extremely bad," said airline spokesman Liu Kuo-chien. "The pilot said he was having trouble seeing the runway as he made his approach and asked to come around for another try. Immediately after, the pilot lost contact

with the tower."

Tsai Tuei, the director of the Civil Aeronautics Administration, apparently resigned immediately to take moral responsibility for the crash, which was said to be the worst in the

airport's history.

The tail of the demolished jet was the only piece of the plane that was recognizable.

Not only was this the worst crash in the airport's history, but it

seemed equally as painful as families of the passengers at the hospitals and the airport burst into tears and fell into each other's arms when they learned the extent of the disaster.

The airport officials claimed that the two flight data recorders were recovered and were being analyzed to help figure out the cause of the crash.

Reports from Airbus Industrie, based in Toulouse, France, released a statement giving specs on the jet. The plane was delivered to China Airlines in December 1990. By the end of January 1998, it had accumulated up to an estimated 20,070 flight-hours in 8,800 flights.

Since 1986, China Airlines has had five other crashes recorded. After the crash of another Airbus A-300 in Nagoya, Japan in 1994, a safety campaign began that would include pilot retraining. The crash in Japan was blamed on the inexperienced co-pilot who apparently aborted his landing.

The plaintiffs claimed to have taken up smoking back when they were teen-agers, and have now smoked for decades and suffer from smoke related illnesses.

A law suit filed against the tobacco companies claims that they elevated the level of nicotine in cigarettes, and proposes a \$368.5 billion tobacco settlement.

hoped to spend their \$175 tax refund on a weekend getaway, but instead received a bill from the I.R.S. totalling \$300 million.

This letter came to them last week, and was applied to the couple's 1992 balance of \$300,000,082.17. Ken Reed says he owns a small antique and furniture store, but that he earned less than \$30,000 that year.

IRS spokesman Larry Wright says that mistakes are possible with the 200 million tax returns that are filed, but declined to discuss the Reeds' case.

### An open fire to begin on rioters

JAKARTA, INDONESIA -- Indonesian Police gave warning that they would shoot any rioters on sight Monday.

Rioters are said to pose a danger to others through their looting, and Indonesian Police won't tolerate it anymore.

So far five people have died in the recent food riots triggered by the rising prices of basic commodities.

### Libya wants Pope to visit them

VATICAN CITY -- Libya made its first envoy to the Vatican and invited Pope John Paul II to visit the Arab nation that the U.S. and other countries have tried to isolate.

Husein-Fuad Mustafa Kabazi said he was hoping that "one day Your Holiness will deign to visit [Libya]."

Last March, the U.S. went as far as to criticize the Vatican for establishing diplomatic relations with Libya. Despite criticism, the Vatican went along as planned and may visit Libya soon.

### Guerrilla attacks won't be tolerated

JERUSALEM -- Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, floated by an accusation that cleared him of any blame in an Amman assassination bid, promised on Monday to continue striking at guerrillas wherever necessary. "I believe that an understanding has been reached between us and Jordan on how to combat terrorism in a way that this incident won't recur. But our policy is that we will strike at terrorism wherever necessary," he told reporters.

# Roadtrip is rough on Crusaders

Men win a sloppy game on the road over Oregon Tech, after dropping one to OIT

The NNC men's basketball team loaded up the bus and took to the road last weekend to find themselves in the unwelcoming area of Southern Oregon. The Crusaders first headed to Klamath Falls to take on Oregon Tech and then traveled onward to Ashland to play host to Southern Oregon.

Against OIT on Friday night, NNC was looking to tighten the

clamps on their lead over the rest of the Cascade Conference. Instead, the Crusaders fell apart. Rather than firming up their lead in league play, the men's team took a big step back into the ranks as they quickly fell behind to the

Owls. OIT would score first and maintain the lead throughout the game; they led 45-30 going into the intermission.

The Owls would pour it on in the beginning minutes of the second half gaining as much as a twenty five point lead; a margin that would never be challenged by the Crusaders allowing OIT to cruise to an unfortunate victory.

Leading scorers for NNC were Jawanza Hadley with 13 and Kai Knell with 10. The Crusaders were looking to regroup on Saturday night's game against

Southern Oregon.

"We just have trouble winning on the road," said head coach Rich Sanders. "Winning on the road is something that good teams must do in order to win championships. We may not be mentally tough

enough to accomplish what it is that we want to do. We'll see how we respond tomorrow night."

The next night Coach Sanders would once again state the phrase that is becoming a cliché in Crusader dialogue: "We hate the road."

After getting routed at Oregon Tech, the Crusaders barely held on in overtime against Southern Oregon University. The tired 'Saders pulled out a close win, 95-94.

After jumping out to an early 17-4 lead, the Raiders chipped away at NNC and made a close game out of one that had blowout potential.

Said Kai Knell, "I don't know what it is, but we're just having a bundle of trouble finishing teams on the road. Give Southern credit, but that game should have been over after the first few minutes of the second half."

"I think we did better tonight," NNC coach Rich Sanders said. "We came out with some energy and some life, but we really need to pick each other up on the road."

The Raiders managed to tie the game in the final minute as Raider guard Tom Chipps converted a three point play. After a Southern shot hit the basket long, the game was sent into overtime.

Next, NNC hosts Albertson College of Idaho in a key match-up for control of the Cascade Conference title. Both teams hold an 11-3 record coming into the game on Tuesday Feb. 17, at 7:30.

verse the personalities get, "everybody gets along."


