

Questions and answers concerning the upcoming change to semesters

This week, as with the upcoming weeks also, a small section featuring information on the conversion to semesters will contain some commonly asked questions and their answers about what changing to semesters will entail.

Q What is the difference between the quarter system and a semester system?

A A semester system normally has two 15-week sessions, plus finals. Our current quarter system has three 10-week terms, plus finals.

Q Will I lose credits when NNC converts to the semester system?

A No, both the number of credits earned and the number of credits required for a degree will be converted to semester credits.

Q How will Financial Aid and Tuition be affected?

A Tuition and Financial Aid will not be affected on an annual basis. However, students will pay tuition and fees twice a year rather than three times as we do now.

Q When do we change to semesters?

A The summer session of 2000

Q Will the change to semesters have an effect on my schedule for 1999-2000?

A It might. Check with your major advisor about scheduling courses you want to retake or about "sequential courses." Both of these situations should be taken care of, if possible, before the conversion to semesters.


have toured Idaho performing their musical anti-drug message. They sang last Monday in chapel for the award ceremony.

For those of you who missed chapel last Monday, you missed something special. The chaplain for the day was Reverend Reuben Welch, NNC Chaplain Gene Schandorff's college chaplain and role model. "This created a much closer, stronger, and smoother working relationship."

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
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NNC addresses the concern of alcohol use

This year at NNC, there has been a growing concern about certain life style expectations not being upheld. The great concern is that of alcohol use and abuse by NNC students, both on and off campus. There is a perception that alcohol use is greater this year than in years past.

NNC's faculty and staff have had a surprising number of students come to them with this concern. Though some people think that the administrators are oblivious to this and do not care to address it and do something about it, this is not the case. The faculty and staff are aware that every year there is a problem with alcohol use and abuse, and they try to deal with it as best as they can. However, people may not always be aware of what is being done to reduce alcohol consumption by NNC students.

At the first chapel of third term, President Hagood addressed this concern about the lax attitude toward the lifestyle guidelines. He stated that new measures are being taken to test the truth of this perception, and if so, they will take the necessary actions to address it.

President Hagood addressed the student body, reminding them that each and every member of NNC's community needs to fulfill NNC's mission statement in every area of life, including lifestyle choices, by developing a "habit of mind which enables us to become God's creative and redemptive agents in today's society."

After investigating and examining this perception, it was concluded that there is not much more alcohol use going on this year in comparison to past years. But because of the great concern here on campus, extra measures will be taken against the trend.

Some steps have already been taken. Student Development met with freshmen students

along with their RDs and RAs. Students were presented with the concern on campus. Student Development went on to ask the students to be accountable to one another. This does not mean students must "tattle" on their friends and fellow students. Instead, they were asked to be accountable to each other and encourage one another to live according to the lifestyle guidelines that each student agreed to upon coming to NNC.

The response to this meeting

was very positive. Many students were surprised that the school administrators were aware of the problem and that they actually cared enough to do something about it. Many colleges and universities have similar problems and are aware of them, but they do nothing about them.

The same kind of meeting that was held with the freshmen was also held with the on campus sophomores on Monday night. The meeting for juniors and seniors is scheduled for Tuesday night.

There was also an off-campus Tuesday chape about the concern that off-campus students are not living up to all of the lifestyle expectations, especially with alcohol. A letter was also sent out to all off-campus students reminding them of the privilege it is to live off campus. This privilege can be revoked at any time if a person is no longer in good standing academically and socially by violating the lifestyle guidelines.

Another common perception among students is that athletes are less likely to follow the spiritual and lifestyle guidelines. Upon closer inspection of this matter, however, it was found that there is no more use among student athletes than among the students who do not participate in athletics. In keeping with the measures taken among the rest of the student body, actions have been taken in this sector as well. Coaches have met and are committed to our school's covenant.

They want to help in this action against alcohol use and abuse. The coaches are working on alcohol use policies and procedures that will be uniform for athletes as well as all other students.

When someone violates the lifestyle guidelines, it is NNC's policy to treat each situation in a redemptive way. NNC's policies contrast somewhat to

programs like the "one strike and you're out" program that some colleges and universities use. Treating situations in a redemptive manner means forgiving the people. But, unlike the common misconception that NNC rarely disciplines offenders, NNC believes that, though the people should be forgiven, they must experience the consequences of their actions.

Students who violate the lifestyle guidelines must go through the Residential Life disciplinary process. Besides consequences directly related to the actions, other disciplinary actions that might be taken by the Residential Life disciplinary board can range anywhere from restricted dorm hours to community service, to being asked to withdraw, to expulsion.

For some people, this way of dealing with guideline violators seems too lax, while others think it is too harsh. NNC has adopted this policy because we seek to be

NNC's policies contrast somewhat to programs like the "one strike and you're out" program that some colleges and universities use

a redemptive school instead of a creedal or confessional school. Creedal or confessional schools only accept students that have confessed to and show evidence to an active relationship with Christ. Because NNC follows the Wesleyan tradition in trying to express God's outreaching grace and is a school with a redemptive policy, no such confession is required. Therefore, some people who come here are not Christians or do not have an active relationship with Christ. The hope is that, by coming here, some will make the decision to follow Christ. Thus, to be unforgiving to those who violate the rules is to go against what this college stands for.

It is the hope of the faculty, staff, and most students that our school will be, as it advertises, drug and alcohol free. This can only happen if each and every person decides to follow the rules to which he or she agreed and to keep those accountable who choose not to.



Digital vision: The future of human sight?

What would your life be like if you could hear a name once and never forget it? What if you could digitally record everything you saw, or take notes during class without missing a word? What would it be like to be slightly... machine?

No, I am not talking about drastic new cosmetic surgery but rather a new application of computer technology which has existed (until recently) only on the pages of science-fiction. I am talking about wearable computers.

According to Rachel Ross, reporter for MSNBC's news network, the first appearance of the wearable computer pre-dates even laptops or personal digital assistants such as the PalmPilot by 3Com.

Its inventor, the University of Toronto's Steve Mann, has been working since the 1970's to produce a pair of digital eyes—computer-assisted glasses capable of projecting a small computer screen over the natural field of vision.

These glasses provide a link to what Mann calls the "visual intelligence collective" (any good Star Trek fan will immediately envision something similar to the Borg collective but without the sinister overtones).

He sees his "WearComp" as a means of creating a sense of community, a visual network on the world.

This system is to visual information as the Internet is to digital information—and it conveys it in much the same way.

Mann's glasses link the wearer to a database of visual information and present it as translucent messages in the foreground of a person's field of vision. This information appears whenever applicable and can be accessed at the mere flick of an eye.

A good example would be a person's name—whenever the glasses focus on an individual's face, his/her name is immediately presented on the screen alongside any other personal information he/she has submitted to the network.

The glasses can also record the visual data they receive—in other words, everything that the

person sees—and may play it back on command via the laser-generated display on the glasses' lens. What would it be like never to forget where you parked the car?

Plus, with a keyboard small enough to hold in one hand, it would be easy for college students with this system to take notes in class without once having to drop their eyes. This feature also makes them invaluable for safety reasons—who would attack you

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when you could record the entire event with your digital eyes?

Perhaps the most exciting—and disturbing—aspect of this WearComp is the ability to share information between other wired individuals. Courtesy of what Mann calls an EyeTap, another person may look through your digital eyes and see exactly what you are seeing.

The possibility also exists to pass messages to others through this visual network. Certainly in most cases, this sharing of visual information would be innocent enough—and would eliminate a great deal of misunderstanding between wired individuals—however, anyone can see how easily this system could be exploited.

The same source of information which is potentially invaluable to police officers could also be valuable to a pornography dealer, blackmail artist, or an assassin. Another concern being to what extent should our personal information be available to the general public? Mann replies that his system is actually a means of "shooting back" at an already intrusive and bugged world, but society as a whole must set WearComp's limits and they may disagree.

Even as the massive Internet started small and mushroomed, Mann's current network of only twelve Toronto users might be the beginning of a completely new generation in computer technology.

Nato pummels Yugoslavia

YUGOSLAVIA - Satellite transmissions were interrupted at around 2:50 am in Yugoslavia. Military sources later confirmed that the Avala transmitter, the largest in Yugoslavia in the hills above Belgrade, had been hit. The attack disabled the transmitter's power supply, Yugoslav sources said.

The television station, which has become a clear target of NATO in its attempts to force Serbia to agree an autonomy agreement deal for Kosovo, resumed broadcasting shortly after 2 pm with a concert of romantic songs.

Another morning attack on Nis, Yugoslavia's third largest city, hit an army barracks and industrial areas in the second successive night of raids on the town, Yugoslav agencies and internet Web sites said. They also said a chemical factory in central Serbia has been attacked.

Alliance officials said all air-

paign.

"An end or a temporary halt to NATO's rocket and bomb attacks would open a good chance for a settlement," he said. "A continuation of air attacks, not to mention NATO ground operations, would only increase the mass suffering, the grief, the destruction and the number of victims."

In a separate development, President Bill Clinton spoke by telephone with Russian President Boris Yeltsin.

Clinton declared Saturday that the alliance would strongly enforce an oil embargo against Yugoslavia, but added that NATO would take care not to provoke violence on the high seas. "But we have to be firm about it," he said.

Earlier Saturday, NATO officials said that an embargo enforcement mechanism had not been worked

welcome Russia's efforts and hope they will continue," he said.

"Our alliance recognizes the tremendous importance of Russia to our alliance's future," Clinton said. But Russia's foreign minis-

ter said Saturday his country would ignore any oil embargo of Yugoslavia, claiming such a move would violate international law.

Clinton earlier urged patience in bringing the Kosovo crisis to a conclusion saying that it takes time to reverse a Serbian military presence in the province estimated at 40,000 troops and 300 tanks. "We are doing what needs to be done with great vigor," Clinton said.

"In order for this strategy to succeed, we need two things: vigorous execution and patience," Clinton told a news conference during the summit originally intended to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the alliance. He denied that the United States and NATO were escalating into military engagement with Yugoslavia.

"We haven't weakened our conditions," Clinton said.

While some have questioned the effectiveness of the month-long air campaign, Clinton noted that allies bombed Iraq for 44 days before beginning a ground assault to force them from Kuwait.

Nation mourns over victims

LITTLETON, CO -- Vice President Al Gore spoke to more than 70,000 people mourning the tragic shooting rampage at Columbine High School in Littleton, Colorado. Gore told the crowd that nothing he or anyone else could say would be able to comfort them after such a tragedy. But he assured the people of Littleton that they were not alone in their grief.

"Why bad things happen to good people, I do not understand. . . I go on my knees and as, Why, oh Lord, why? . . . The heart of America aches with yours." Also stating, "All of us must change our lives to honor these children."

"We must have the courage not to look away in life or in death, from those who feel despised or rejected. . . Children learn from us and look to us. We must teach them right from wrong."

The crowd was expected to only reach 35,000, but swelled well beyond that. Mourners included retired General Colin Powell and Christian singers Amy Grant, Phil Driscoll and Michael W. Smith.

One of the killers, 17-year-old Dylan Klebold, was buried Saturday in a private service that was disclosed by his family afterward.

In their statement, the Klebold family said that their "sadness and grief over Dylan's

death and this tragedy is indescribable." They also apologized to the families who lost loved ones in the attack by their son and Eric Harris, 18.

About 3,000 people turned out on Saturday to remember one of the victims, 17-year-old Rachel Scott, a pretty, popular junior at Columbine High School, celebrated as fun-loving and deeply faithful. One week earlier she was the belle of the ball at her senior prom. Her date, Nick

one of the gunmen, which includes chilling references to Nazi Germany. The attack on the high school was launched on Hitler's birthday. This was the culmination of a year of meticulous planning, begun in April 1998.

In an interview with *The Denver Post*, a member of the "Trenchcoat Mafia" described life for members of his group as "hell... pure hell." He said that athletes at the school called him by an anti-gay epithet, bashed

Baumgarten, said she looked like the film actress she aspired to become. "I swear, she was a movie star, I swear it," he said.

New drug out for diabetics

Diabetics scared of reports that the current diabetes medication may destroy some patients' livers may soon have some new options. Government advisers are recommending the approval of Avandia, a drug that will fight the disease with fewer liver risks.

The Food and Drug Administration panel said that they observed no serious safety concerns with another diabetes drug, Actos, though it said both new drugs will disclose the possible liver problems linked to its potential competitor, Rezulin.

Studies of over 4,000 patients who used Avandia have not shown signs of liver damage. Yet with the possibility of liver damage as with the competing drug Rezulin, then it may have fewer diabetics try Avandia, said FDA panel chairman Dr. Henry Bone of the Michigan Bone and Mineral

Clinic.

Avandia has been recommended for either use alone or in combination with metformin, another often used diabetes drug. The FDA is not bound to approve the drug because of the panel's recommendation on Avandia, but they typically follows its advice.

Due to incomplete data on the effectiveness of Actos, the panel has not yet voted on its approval.

"Avandia represents a significant advance in the treatment of diabetes and is highly effective in safely and significantly lowering blood sugar," said Dr. Douglas A. Greene, chief of endocrinology and metabolism at the University of Michigan Medical Center, Ann Arbor. "It has dramatically improved my patients' conditions, making them feel better and motivating them to take an active role in managing their disease."

But there are still safety concerns for Avandia. In studies, no

one got jaundice or liver failure. However, neither did Rezulin patients when it was studied.

In Rezulin's studies, 2 percent of patients showed significantly elevated liver enzymes. But Avandia patients shared no difference compared with patients taking a placebo or other diabetes medicines, FDA officials said.

Avandia is not without risk, the FDA panel said. It can increase cholesterol levels, particularly the so-called "bad cholesterol" or LDL. Diabetics with high LDL levels probably should not be prescribed Avandia, and all patients need cholesterol tests, the panel said. Also, the drug seemed to cause weight gain from 4 to 6 pounds, a concern because diabetics are supposed to lose weight.

"There will be a very interesting marketing battle," said Mehta Partners analyst Sergio Traversa. "But the diabetes population is so different. . . there is enough space for both."

Underpass to be revamped

NAMPA, ID - The days of congestion at the 11th Avenue underpass will be coming to an end. Construction on a \$14 million project to widen the downtown Nampa underpass to four lanes should begin in the spring of 2001.

"This was a priority of mine when I took office," said Nampa mayor Maxine Horn. An informal meeting was held where city leaders, business owners and elected officials came up with ideas to reduce inconveniences during the project's construction.

City service vehicles are figured to be among the parties least inconvenienced by the road remodeling. A police substation planned for north Nampa will be functional by the time construction begins, and already there is a fire substation on the north side. City officials plan to will explore alternative routes as early as this summer.

London blasted by another bomb

LONDON, ENGLAND - A neo-Nazi group claimed responsibility for the second race-related bomb attack in London in a week. The car bomb injured at least six people in the heart of the Bangladeshi community in London's East End.

Two hours after the blast, police received a call from someone claiming membership in an extreme right-wing group, Combat 18, also mentioning that the organization carried out this bombing, and the nail bombing of a week ago.

Prime Minister Tony Blair, speaking from the NATO summit in Washington, said, "These things are outrageous and we will not tolerate them, and we will make every effort to find out those responsible and bring them to justice."

Combat 18, which takes its name from the positions of Adolf Hitler's initials in the alphabet, is said to have formed in the mid-1980s by members of groups like the National Front.

Car crash claims another life

PARMA, ID - America Avila, a 14-year old Parma cheerleader, became the third casualty of the crash that took the lives of two other Wilder High School students, David Dean Butler, 17, and his passenger, Santiago "Buge" De la Cruz Jr., 15. Avila was air-lifted to Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center after the accident, suffering multiple trauma injuries. She died after eight days in the hospital.

The accident occurred when Butler ran a stop sign and his Ford Escort was broadsided by a pickup traveling north. JoAnna Contreras was the Escort's lone survivor. She and Butler were wearing seat belts, but it is uncertain whether Avila and De la Cruz were buckled in.

The pickup's driver, 17-year-old Ryan Thomas Crane of Ontario, OR, was wearing his seat belt. He sustained only bruises and abrasions from the collision.

Local schools rethink safety

NAMPA, ID - After the nightmares of the Littleton, CO shooting that took the lives of 15 people on Tuesday and the Notus Junior-Senior High School shooting last Friday, safety is the No. 1 concern of schools.

Caldwell, Vallivue and Nampa school districts are reviewing their crisis plans to remind everyone of security measures already in place. Most schools are holding "shut down" drills to simulate a hostage situation. "Every staff member [in the district] has had some communication about being more aware," Caldwell High School Principal Julie Yamamoto said.

The school currently has security cameras and a full-time resource officer in place. Yamamoto said teachers are also monitoring halls more frequently. All of these methods are being used in hopes of better preparing the school for any crisis situation.

South Africa rethinks execution

JOHANNESBURG, SOUTH AFRICA - The murder of one school principal and the beating of another by a mob of students have enraged South African opinion. These attacks, along with other high-profile crimes, have ignited demands for the restoration of the death penalty. The death penalty was outlawed after the 1994 election when the black-led African National Congress took power.

Recent statistics show violent crime leveling off, but at high rates, with on average a murder or attempted murder happening every 12 minutes and a rape every 26 seconds. No official polls have been taken, but an informal survey taken two years ago supports a return to the death penalty.


Many of these clubs offer classes such as Kardio Kick and Cardio Box which have many of the same characteristics as Tae-bo incorporated in them.

Trainers can set up an individualized workout plan for you. These plans include cardiovascular and weight training exercises for you to do on your own.

However, if you would prefer to work with a trainer one-on-one, they are more than happy to schedule weekly appointments in which they will guide you through your workout and offer encouragement.

For those of you who are interested in aquatics, there are many activities from which to choose. They offer lap swims, water aerobics for all fitness levels and they

Most athletic centers are involved with community events. These events include Round-Robin racquetball, basketball and volleyball tournaments. They also plan triathlons and body-building competitions. Athletic clubs are also usually willing to host events for non-profit organizations to help fund-raising and community awareness events.

Parents who want to work out but do not know what to do with their children have options in an athletic center.

Other clubs offer discounted memberships for college students at a monthly rate ranging from twenty to fifty dollars. If you think about the benefits this is really a great bargain for maintaining physical fitness.

As we have said, these indoor recreation facilities are an asset to the community. They offer a variety of programs to help you get in the shape that you so desire.

Indoor fitness creates a positive environment. It is also a fun place to hang out with your friends during those long, cold winter months when there is nothing to do. If you feel the urge to become more physically fit, we would recommend and encourage you to take a look into these awesome facilities.



Alcohol policy limits exercising of personal convictions, misses important biblical points

Welcome to NNC: Christian training for the real world, or is it? Our wonderful chaplain Gene (whom I love dearly) often equates our environment here with that of the real world, but I wouldn't be so hasty to make that assumption. If I remember correctly, the real world rarely makes decisions for us. I also recall that the real world carries along with it certain rights protected by our legal system. Responsible drinking for those over the legal age of 21 is one of those rights. Apparently at NNC, the laws of the land just aren't quite good enough. In fact, they are so lacking that we need to add a few of our own rules just for the sake of teaching good Christian holiness. As you well know, one of those rules is the prohibition of alcohol consumption, even by those of legal age.

Having been one who has actually lived in the real adult world, I can attest that we often encounter circumstances that we aren't prepared for in a sheltered environment. Alcohol and the dilemmas regarding responsible drinking are two of these issues. Being sheltered from experience in this area my whole life, how was I to know how to drink re-

sponsibly without having had some previous encounters? Furthermore, how could I understand how to be a godly person and, heaven forbid, drink lightly as well? Thus, it is my opinion that,

rather than presenting only a double dose of Christianity to students, incorporating Christian values into a secular setting would be far more beneficial for training Christian leaders for service in the context of the real world.

Most Bible-based arguments

against drinking come with a presupposition that drinking and drunkenness are the same thing. Unfortunately, this could not be farther from the truth. I think we would all agree that the Bible is quite clear that drunkenness is detestable in the sight of God. Does that mean that the Scriptures denounce drinking? No. Actually, Paul's first letter to Timothy sheds some light on this, when in chapter three he outlines the characteristics of a holy man, fit for service as a bishop or deacon in the church. In neither case does Paul tell Timothy that to be a church leader one must abstain from alcohol. Rather, one should be "not given to drunkenness" or "not indulging in much wine." Granted, circumstances were different in that day as the use of wine was in a different context than what is true today. Being drunk, however, has remained the same throughout the ages.

Perhaps more applicable to our case is Paul's instruction to the church in Corinth. There, the issue was one of appearances, specifically related to food sacrificed to idols. Much like our dilemma with alcohol, this was widely practiced socially acceptable, but one which became a touchy sub-

ject within the church.

Paul's instruction was not to abstain from consumption of such meat, but rather to be sensitive to those looking on. In fact, he tells the church, "Everything is permissible—but not everything is beneficial." This is followed by instruction for the believers on the proper time and place for this behavior. I believe we at NNC need to have the same freedoms granted to others, and those of us who profess to be Christians should be free to exercise a listening ear to the leading of the Lord for ourselves regarding what is

beneficial. This school, being a church community in some sense of the term, should be governed by the same guidelines as the early church, with emphasis given to proper context of time and place, rather than on placing restrictions on what is permissible for students.

Thus, my stance is that NNC should refrain from restrictions on behavior common to the real world, and should rather teach from a context of being responsible stewards of the freedoms granted outside this little bubble that we call home.

NNC policy in need of consistent consequences

It's Saturday night and, as many students do, a group of friends head off campus to get away from school. There are many places to go and many things for students to do in the Nampa/Boise area. Many may go to a movie and to Shari's for desert. Still others will find themselves at a friend's house for a movie and time to hang out together. This is fine, but there are several things that can go wrong in these situations.

Normally, people will watch the movie and have a good time. But occasionally, someone will bring some alcohol. This is indeed sad but it is not uncommon.

The problem comes when NNC students are in the presence of the alcohol. "I was not participating because I did not actually do it!" says one student. Students also make the argument that they are off-campus and no longer have to abide by the rules set forth by the college. It is true that they can legally drink. In the Student Resource Guide (SRG) of Northwest Nazarene College there are a number of guidelines for students to follow. Many of them are quite vague which leads to people try-

ing to get out of anything with a loop-hole in the SRG. This policy on alcohol/drugs is written as follows (but has since been modified):

"Using, possessing, or procuring tobacco, alcohol, illegal drugs or drug paraphernalia, and the improper use of prescription drugs

is prohibited."

This policy needs to be more inclusive in its consequences when a student is "caught in the act." When students gets caught, nothing is done to persuade them to change their lifestyles. Many times they get a slap on the hand and a warning not to do it again.

I think that as Christians we are mandated to hold each other accountable in our actions with one another. It does not make any difference whether we are going to a secular school or a private Christian college. Because we are going to a Christian college, we have an increased obligation to let

others know where we stand. We do not want their decisions and actions reflect poorly on our campus community.

We want to help those who have a problem and at the same time let them feel like bad guys. We also want them to know that they are part of the NNC community and we want them to stay. We want to show those who do not get caught that this college takes this seriously. We take a stand we they do not want their students and peers to take part in this activity.

One way we need to be more strict is with our athletics. If someone is caught they should be held accountable by suspension. If it happens in the off-season and someone finds out about it, the consequence should be carried out at next time inter-collegiate play is resumed.

Life is Beautiful heart-wrenching behind the humor

When I headed out for a movie Saturday night, I expected to spend a small fortune to see another mindless film with a mindless plot. Fortunately, my experience did not live up to these expectations. The lines of the theater were long and full. The only movie I could still get a ticket to was one by the name of *Life Is Beautiful*, an Italian import starring Roberto Benigni, Nicoletta Braschi, and Giorgio Cantarini, complete with subtitles. I knew little about this film but took a chance anyway and was greatly rewarded.

Getting into the beginning of the movie was somewhat difficult with trying to watch both the action on the screen and read the quickly moving subtitles along the bottom, but I adjusted quickly. The film is set in Italy, during the Holocaust and portrays the wonderful story of one small Jewish family and its struggle to survive,



not only physically, but emotionally as well. The story starts off with the unlikely courtship of

Guido (played by Roberto Benigni), a Jewish waiter, and Dora (played by Nicoletta Braschi) a beautiful young school teacher already engaged to a brutish, narrow-minded man.

Guido is a relentless suitor who will manipulate any circumstance to win Dora's love. The energy that Benigni puts into the character of Guido rivals that of Robin Williams and creates a

number of hilarious incidents all for the love of a woman. Eventually Guido is successful and rescues his love from her own engagement party on a horse painted green by anti-Semites. Guido is a hopeless romantic and gives the movie it's upbeat feeling throughout.

At the beginning of the movie, there is very little mention of the Nazis' increasingly present power and oppression. The mood of the film is happy and in love. However, as the middle of the movie approaches, the mood shifts from carefree life to sudden struggle. Guido and Dora have begun a family and have a small boy of about three years old. Their son, Joshua, and his father are abducted by Nazi forces while the mother is away from home on the son's birthday. They are taken to a Nazi concentration camp.

At this point, the film takes a serious tone, and yet the humor is still present. Throughout the entire ordeal of being abducted and shipped away to less-than-human conditions, Guido makes a decision to keep his son alive by maintaining a sense of hope and love of a life that is beautiful re-

gardless of the circumstances. Guido manages to convince Joshua (Giorgio Cantarini) that the camp is only a game where if

amidst of horrible death and inhumanity, it is the only thing that keeps the both of them alive. Benigni's high energy level allows the movie to be tenderly believable. The acting in the film is powerfully gentle and the story is incredibly moving. The film itself is sometimes rather shaky and the scenes often look a little fake, but this can be overlooked as the plot wraps the viewer in the emotions of the movie. Don't let the idea of subtitles scare you off; *Life is Beautiful* has a lot to offer. It will keep you smiling through even the most heart-wrenching moments.

The NNC baseball team came into a big week of games badly needing some wins. To start the week, they hosted 17-0 Albertson who they had not beaten since March 4, 1997.

The NNC batters took awhile but finally got going; with the game winner delivered by Andy Heyer in the big blow with a two


Heyer continued his good hitting, driving in the only run.


Dan Benedick stretches to finish the play for the out on first.

But after the pain subsided I was very excited, because I'm a huge Beach Boys fan. I'll never forget the first time I saw them in person, back in 1964, at a fantastic concert in New York. ... Wait, no, it was Philadelphia, and it might have been 1967. And come to think of it, it wasn't The Beach Boys; it was the Bee Gees. Or maybe the Turtles. It was definitely a plural name. Although now that I think of it, I'm not 100 percent sure I was there.

But never mind the details. The point is that I've loved the Beach Boys' music since WAYYY back when I was in junior high school, and America was happy and care-free because the Civil War was finally over. I went through puberty with the Beach Boys (not LITERALLY, of course; we all had separate rooms). Their songs expressed a new kind of feeling that was stirring deep within the bowels of my loins; a feeling of vul-

I still know all the words to all the Beach Boys' car songs. They don't make music like that these days. In fact, sometimes they don't even make MUSIC. I saw a TV show recently wherein a group of "hip-hop" DJs competed to see who was the best at making sounds with a record turntable. They'd put the needle on a record, then they'd spin the turntable forward and backward violently, thereby creating unique, by which I mean ugly, noises. I used to do that when I was 7, and my mom would yell, "STOP FOOLING WITH THE RECORD PLAYER!" But these guys were SERIOUS; they had expressions of intense concentration on their faces, as though it took vast artistic skill to simulate the sound of deranged squirrels fighting in an amplifier. A couple of the ones I saw definitely had not been born yet when they made their first record.

But even though some of the older Beach Boys could enter the Ernest Hemingway Look-alike Contest, they still SOUND like the Beach Boys, and that was all that mattered. Within 15 minutes the crowd was on its feet (it would have been on its feet sooner, but it has to be careful with its back).

It was a great night. And even though I didn't get home until almost 10:20 p.m., I was so excited that I stayed awake until almost 10:27. 'Round 'round get around, I get around.
