Explosion hits USS Cole

ADEN, Yemen--

An enormous explosion rocked an American Naval destroyer refueling in Yemen on Thursday. The U.S.S. Cole, a guided-missile destroyer based in Norfolk, Virginia, had been refueling at a station in the port on the southern tip of the Arabian peninsula when an explosion came from one of several smaller harbor boats helping the Cole dock.

Initial reports said that the blast occurred at 12:15 p.m. (5:15 a.m. Eastern time). The explosion tore a gaping hole in the side of the vessel, which measured about 30 feet by 40 feet. The Cole was carrying a crew of about 300. The blast caused extensive flooding, forcing the ship to list slightly. By nightfall Thursday, crew members had managed to control the flooding and keep the ship afloat.

President Clinton said it appeared to be a terrorist attack. Nearly three dozen others were injured,

some of them severely, and the most recent reports have accounted for 17 deaths. If reports confirm it as a terrorist attack, it would be the worst against American military forces since the bombing of an Air Force barracks in Saudi Arabia, which killed 19 airmen in 1996. This is the worst attack on an American Naval ship since an Iraqi missile struck the U.S.S. Stark, a guided-missile frigate in the Persian Gulf in 1987, killing 37 sailors.

"If, as it now appears, this was an act of terrorism, it was a despicable and cowardly act," Mr. Clinton said, only moments after having met with his senior national security advisers.

Senior Pentagon officials said the boat, with at least two men aboard, had been loaded with explosives in

what was evidently a well-planned suicide attack. The officials said they would not know the exact type of explosive used until forensic experts arrive and take samples from the ship's hull. Western diplomats in Yemen said the explosion seemed to be the work of a well-organized group with good connections in the port of Aden who might have provided the bombers with logistical support.

As dawn broke Friday morning, the U.S.S. Cole could be seen from across the harbor, with a black hole in its side and sooty marks running up from the water. Sailors were active on the deck and American investigators began arriving. Adm. Vern Clark, chief of naval operations, said that the Cole's hull at the point of the blast was designed to

withstand 51,000 pounds of pressure per square inch which meant that this blast was devastatingly powerful to rip a hole in the side of the warship. Later, the side of the ship wore a white cloth over the gaping hole ripped into the hull by the blast. Yemeni speedboats patrolled the area bounded by the coast and a peninsula.

One Pentagon official said the two men aboard the small boat appeared to stand moments before the blast, but Mr. Cohen and Admiral Clark declined to speculate on their actions before the blast or their motives. Both are believed to have died in the explosion. It was not clear if others were aboard.

The harbor area was tense and tightly sealed by army and police units of Yemen, many of them in camouflage. One officer said: "The Americans are our friends. This is bad for Yemen." Mr. Clinton, already grappling with escalating violence in the Middle East, appeared in the Rose Garden at the White House Thursday afternoon and solemnly vowed to determine who was responsible and hold them accountable. His remarks raised the possibility of American military retaliation. Ali Abdullah Saleh, the president of Yemen and a former army general, said there was no evidence linking the blast to the current fighting in Israel. "Yemen does not have any terrorist elements, and there is no relationship between this and what is happening in the occupied territories," Mr. Saleh said.

Despite its history as a haven for terrorist groups, the United States has been trying to engage Yemen diplomatically. American ships have stopped in Aden a dozen times since last year, officials said. Admiral Clark said that efforts to improve ties with Yemen were "at the heart of the motivation" to use its refueling station.

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Julios Coleman tells life story, dreams

His plans were to play football and to be a lawyer. God had other plans for Julios Coleman, fourth year Assistant basketball coach and director of Intramural sports at NNU.

Coleman first started playing basketball competitively in Jr. High. Football was his first love as a child, but he thought that he would give basketball a try. He was really intrigued with basketball, and so he went to lots of camps and learned the fundamentals.

Coleman grew up in a Baptist church in southern California in the 70's. He first started going to church at his single mother's request on Wednesday nights and Sunday mornings. He learned quickly at around 7 or 8 years old it was, "Either go or suffer the consequences."

Coleman continued to play basketball through high school and junior college. Playing at Pasadena State Community College for Dan Davis, who had known him since he was a preteen. Coleman without a father in his home had a special relationship with Davis. Davis was a father figure for him.

While playing at Pasadena State, Coleman was recruited by Point Loma Nazarene University. When he went and visited the beautiful campus, placed right on San Diego Peninsula with the beach on one side and the bay on the other, he knew instantly that he wanted to go there next and continue his education.

Before he got to Point Loma, the coach who recruited him retired and Davis took his place. During his time at Point Loma, Coleman studied criminal justice and made lots of great memories. While Coleman was there, Davis continued to shape and guide Coleman as a Christian.

After college Coleman had

thoughts of pursuing a career in law, and/or playing basketball overseas. So he tried his hand at clerking at a law firm in LA for a year. His thoughts were that it was a safe and secure way to start a good career. The only problem was he didn't like it. That year clerking was one of his toughest years, as he struggled internally over what his future was to be.

One day in the midst of his struggles he called on coach Davis. Davis just happened to know of a Graduate assistant position at Kansas State with coach Davis's friend Tom Asbury. Coleman jumped at the opportunity to get back to his game, basketball.

At Kansas State, a campus of twenty thousand students in the heart of the cornfields of Midwest America, far from home and what he knew, Coleman found a new home. About Asbury, head coach at Kansas State University, Coleman said, "Coach made you feel welcome and at home."

In his position as Graduate assistant to the K. State NCAA division onemans basketball team, Coleman did many things. He tutored the basketball players, did scouting, assisted in running summer camps and while he was at it, made some new friends. He especially took notice of another tutor who worked with the football team. After knowing her for a year and hearing that she had broken up with her previous boyfriend, Coleman decided to ask Becky out. Becky said yes.

Becky was from Idaho, and as their relationship grew he decided to come home with her and visit her parents.

After their stints at Kansas State, Becky wanted to move back to Idaho and be closer to family.

Coleman like the small town feel of Nampa and the closeness of the larger city of Boise. They moved and their relationship continued to grow. He got a job as a teacher with the public schools and volunteered to help out with the NNU basketball team.

When a position opened up at NNU coach Sanders was quick to hire Coleman on because of his experiences working for a NCAA division I basketball team and his background of going to a Nazarene university. Coach Sanders was sure that Coleman would be able to fit into the program at NNU. Coach Sanders said, "He knew what was expected. What the life style was like (here at NNU)... and what our kids were like and was a good fit."

This will be Coleman's 4th season as assistant basketball coach and intramural director at NNU. Coleman just last month married Becky.

"B-ball wise I'm very happy here... someday I hope to be my own coach and run my own program," said Coleman. Coleman has a passion for coaching, "I really enjoy all aspects of recruiting, scouting and working with the kids."

The accomplishment that he is most proud of in life is being a college graduate. He is the first in his family. It means more to him than any other accomplishment he has achieved, even the ones he has achieved on the court.

There are two games he has had as a player that he considered the best games. In high school he scored 42 points in a Christmas tournament. His mom still talks about that game. In college he set the record at Point Loma Nazarene for most 3's on a night against University of Redland, CA. He scored 29 points, had 19 assists and the score

of that game was 133 to 116.

His best game as a coach was last year against Albertson College when they were ranked third in the NAIA division II league and NNU played spoiler. In that game, "Josh Coop had a great game... scoring, assisting, rebounding..." a player that Coleman works with as assistant coach.

But, this year is going to be tougher.

NNU has moved up two levels from the NAIA division II league they were in to NCAA division 2. Now NNU has a chance at playing in the Elite Eight championships at the end of the year and going to Louisville, Kentucky if they are one of the winners of the eight regional conferences.

NNU got a dose of division II play last year. The league is big, so NNU had to get big fast. That's one way Coleman has helped out immensely.

Coach Sanders says that Coleman has been instrumental at selling Idaho to parents who are concerned about sending their children here. With Coleman's efforts the NNU basketball team has been able to recruit athletes from Texas, Florida and California. Making the NNU team much more capable of competing in the larger NCAA division 2 league.

Coach Sanders said this about Coleman, "You can't out work him, he's very thorough and if you ask him to do something he's going to get it done. He's a student of the game, always watching tapes, very loyal, loves the game."

Coleman has been around a lot of coaches and from each he has been able to learn how to be a great coach. The ones who influenced him the most were: former coach of K State Bob Hansen, present coach

at K. State Tom Asbury, and Point Loma Nazarene coach Dan Davis.

What Hansen did that influenced Coleman was how he dealt with people. "He can take a room full of people and make the small people feel important. He had a great knowledge of the game and he was one of those tough coaches who related with players so well that even though he was working them really hard they still loved him," said Coleman.

From Tom Asbury he learned about the detail aspects of being a basketball coach, being very detail oriented.

From Dan Davis, Coleman's coach at Point Loma, he learned one of the most important parts of being a great coach. From Davis he learned how to be a good role model, and a Christian mentor to he players on

the team.

From each of these coaches he has taken bits and pieces, but he feels he still has more to learn about being a head coach before he takes on a program of his own.

What Coleman wants to be remembered for as a coach is, "Not so much the coaching, but the passion... for my players and that they can rely on me and each other."

Coleman wants to be a coach like his coaches were and, "Develop kids into men."

One homeless girl said about McClure growing up in a Christian home. "I feel really sorry for you."

"This was a shock to me," McClure said, "I never thought about it that way. I guess as a Christian we always think about it the other way, we feel sorry for people who did not grow up Christian. This girl's comment really

caused me to think."

Kami Watson shared several highlights from the trip.

"My favorite part of the trip was socializing with people my age who lived on the streets. I was able to share my beliefs and answer several questions about my relationship with Christ."

According to Watson the time spent with the great group of college kids was definitely worth the long ride.

One man shared "There is no shortage of food for us [homeless people] here in Portland, often we are overfed. What we need is a place to stay."

Kayser agreed with the rest of the council saying simply "I like to be involved."





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Idaho state education budget

On Thursday September 29th, Allison Westfall, Public Information Officer for the State Department of Education addressed Reg Hill's intro to journalism class.

Westfall's job is to convey information to the public on how their children are being educated and how the state is doing on education overall.

The best way that she can get that info is through teachers as they talk with the public, one on one. She holds conferences with the teachers and sends out newsletters to help teachers be able to convey this info as best they can.

Another way is through the weekly television show that she holds late nights on Idaho Public Television.

In January she will be going before the finance committee in the

state legislature to ask for a billion dollar budget for the 2002 school year. This budget is for many things, partly for a pay increase in teacher salaries. Compared the rest of the nations teacher salary rates, Idaho's near last place. Westfall says that the requested increase is to try and get Idaho's pay scale near that of Utah's.

This is the largest budget ever sought for funding the states public schools K-12. Westfall pointed out that "Billion" shouldn't be so surprising though. "The budget has been creeping up, and just now it has reached that number..." said Westfall.

The state is currently only able to pay 70% of the states teachers salaries through state funds, Westfall informed us. The other half has to come out of the funding for other parts of school funding like

construction.

The state is currently being sued for the backlog of school construction projects as the urban school enrollment grows and rural shrinks. She will be fighting in the next legislative session for the 250 Million dollar tax surplus to go to school construction.

Westfall also noted that she really enjoys her job as a PIO.

Her background is as a reporter, knowing how to use media connections helps her daily with her job duties. "I like working with reporters," said Westfall on how the job takes her back to her roots of being a reporter. When she was a reporter she met her husband. Westfall is currently pregnant has been talking with her boss, Marilyn Howard, the State Superintendent of Education about telecommuting once the baby comes.

West Bank turmoil continues

JERUSALEM, Israel—

This Friday, Yasser Arafat refused to attend a Mideast summit until Israel agrees to stop firing on Palestinian demonstrators at flashpoints in the West Bank and the Gaza Strip. This comes despite increasing international pressure.

On the West Bank, violence continued with two Palestinians killed by Israeli gunfire. In Jerusalem, Israeli police masquerading as Palestinians seized two Arab teenagers throwing stones at the U.S. Consulate, and proceeded to beat them.

Kofi Annan, the Secretary-General of the U.N., led diplomatic efforts to bring together Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak, and Arafat at a U.S. led summit at Egypt's Sinai resort of Sharm el-Sheik.

Following a meeting with Arafat, Annan said that he was optimistic that a summit could be held in Egypt within a few days.

President Clinton called many Arab leaders, including Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak, to win their backing for a summit. Mubarak has spoken with Arafat six times in the last 24 hours in order to persuade him to attend. Annan was headed for Egypt Saturday.

Though Palestinian officials said that mediation efforts would continue they remained skeptical of the summit.

"Israel must stop its attacks, and if Barak does not agree to Palestinian conditions, there will not be a summit," Palestinian negotiator Nabil Shaath said.

Arafat's conditions include Israel's withdrawal of troops from the entrances of Palestinian cities, a lift of the siege of West Bank towns, and an agreement to the establishment of an international commission of inquiry into the violence.

Barak also appeared reluctant saying to Israel TV's Channel One, "We have no problem with attending a summit that will stop

the violence. We are not willing to get there by rewarding violence."

Across the West Bank, Palestinian protestors marched to demonstrate against Israel's rocket attacks Thursday against Palestinian government buildings, including broadcast centers and police stations. Israel fired the missiles in retaliation for the brutal killing of two Israeli reserve soldiers by a Palestinian mob in a police station in the West Bank town of Ramallah.

The two Israeli soldiers that were killed by a Palestinian mob had taken a wrong turn. They were taken to Ramallah's police station and beaten and stabbed when the mob stormed the building. Many Israelis see the incident in Ramallah as a watershed.

A large front-page photo of a Palestinian man victoriously raising blood covered hands to signal to the frenzied crowd that the two soldiers had been killed, was ran in the Yedoit Ahronot daily.

Nahum Barnea wrote that the pictures "will be etched for eternity into the history of the conflict," in the front-page commentary.

Cook said that Arafat told him that the killers would be arrested. Palestinian Information Minister, Yasser Abed Rabbo said only that an investigation was to be completed in a few days.

"This is our fight and we defy Barak and his tanks and planes," said Marwan Barghouti, the West Bank leader of Arafat's Fatah movement, while standing on the ruins of a police station destroyed by Israeli rockets on Thursday.

Barak has singled out Barghouti as the mastermind of the shooting attacks on Israelis.

Later, a firefight erupted between some of the demonstrators that Barghouti was addressing and Israeli troops who were manning a checkpoint north of Ramallah.

In the West Bank town of Hebron, a 22-year-old Palestinian was killed in what the Israeli army said was a gun battle between Is-

raeli troops and gunmen mingling with Palestinian rock throwers in the center of town. A second Palestinian was killed by Israeli fire in clashes in the refugee camp of Al Fawar, south of Hebron.

A total of 96 people, most Palestinians, have been killed in the 16 days of conflicts, triggered by the visit of Israel's hard-line opposition leader, Ariel Sharon, to a Jerusalem shrine that is sacred to both Jews and Muslims, known to Jews as the Temple mount, and to the Muslims as the Noble Sanctuary.

Sharon said of his visit to the shrine that "The Temple Mount is the holiest place for the Jewish People - the remains of the temple are there. It is not only my right but my duty to go there."

On Friday, Israeli police pre-

vented Muslim worshippers under age 45 from gathering for weekly noon prayers at the site. Deadly clashes have erupted on the previous two Fridays between police and rock-throwers, during prayer.

The relative decrease in violence on Friday suggests that Israel and the Palestinians were stepping back from the brink of an all-out conflict.

The summit is far from sealed. The relations between Arafat and Barak are so strained that the two leaders have asked for international mediators, including British Foreign Secretary Robin Cook and Annan to carry messages back and forth.

The goal of the summit is not to restart negotiations between Israel and Palestine, but rather it would reach to bring a truce between the two. The fighting has cut deep on both sides, with both Barak and Arafat each say-

ing that they no longer had a partner for peace.

Barak is also in trouble politically. Parliament resumes in two weeks, and the prime minister now only has the support of a fourth of Israel's 120 legislators.

Barak has invited Sharon's Likud party to form an emergency coalition, a step seen by Palestinians as a signal that the prime minister is completely abandoning peace talks.

A cabinet minister, Rabbi Michael Melchior, said an alliance with Sharon and his Likud party might only be temporary. If Arafat returns to negotiations in good faith, "then I think it will be difficult to stick... with the national unity government," Melchior said.

Link found between Agent Orange, Diabetes

Even though the Vietnam War is well over, the effects from the environment of Vietnam are still present in those that fought for our country. There are many mental disturbances that the soldiers have undergone and are continuing to deal with.

There are a myriad of physical ailments that those who fought will have to live with for the rest of their lives. Some of these ailments are strictly from injuries that are expected from any war, but there are also many unexpected ailments from new tactics used during that war. Many of those ailments caused Agent Orange.

Agent Orange is a herbicide used to clean areas of the jungle so the Viet-Cong could be seen and attacked from the air. Many Vietnam veterans were exposed to Agent Orange during the war. If veterans can prove a direct causal relationship between Agent Orange and diabetes they will

qualify to receive service-based compensation. Many with diseases already receive service-based compensation, including Hodgkin's disease, multiple myeloma, respiratory cancers, soft-tissue sarcoma and prostate cancer. Also, veterans' children that have congenital birth defects of the spine, called spina bifida, are also eligible for health care benefits.

According to an Institute of Medicine study, "There may be an association between exposure to Agent Orange in Vietnam and getting diabetes in later life."

This is not yet proven, however, according to Dr. David J Tollerud, director of the center for Environmental and Occupation Health at Hahnemann University School of Public Health in Philadelphia, "research findings that have now accumulated over a long period of time seem to support the possibility of a link between Agent Orange exposure and Type Two diabetes."

Type Two diabetes has an adult-

hood onset opposed to Type One, which begins in childhood. Some know predictors of Type One diabetes are family history, physical activity, and obesity. And the "there is a limited/suggestive evidence of an association between exposure of herbicide used in Vietnam or contaminant dioxin and Type Two diabetes: the known predictors of diabetes risk," continue to greatly outweigh many suggested increased risk from wartime exposure of herbicide," adds Tellerud.

Nothing is completely proven about the link between Agent Orange and diabetes; however, the research is substantiating enough that more research will be carried out.

Maybe the link will be found and Type two diabetes will be added to the list of side effects of Agent Orange. If this is the case, we will continue to reveal more victims of the Vietnam War and they can be provided for from the side effects of fighting for our country.

Diabetes: Abnormal sugar metabolism

At least 135 million people worldwide are diabetic. About 10% have Type 1, insulin-dependent diabetes; the rest have Type 2, non-insulin-dependent diabetes.

How diabetes develops

Pancreas: Narrow digestive gland behind the liver

Islets of Langerhans: Specialized cells that produce the hormone insulin

Beta cell: Produces insulin

Part of intestine: Glucose, other food molecules

▶ When level of glucose (sugar) in blood changes, specialized pancreas cells react by producing the hormone insulin

▶ In diabetes, the pancreas produces no insulin (Type 1), or too little insulin or defective insulin (Type 2).

What Insulin does

▶ Regulates amount of sugar in blood

▶ Gives body cells energy by opening a channel into cell, where glucose (sugar) and other food molecules can be absorbed from blood stream and burned to provide energy

Abnormal insulin

▶ With little or no insulin, glucose, other food molecules can't enter the cell; cell lacks energy

▶ Body breaks down fat for energy; chemical by-products can build up to toxic level

▶ Glucose accumulates in blood, causes high blood sugar level

▶ Glucose surplus passes through kidneys into urine

▶ High glucose level can be toxic to the kidneys

Gore juggles responsibilities

WASHINGTON, D.C.—

The Middle East crisis provokes concern for both presidential candidates, Republican George W. Bush and Democrat Al Gore. Headlines from overseas regarding both the U.S. Navy warship, terrorist bombing and the heated violence that is spreading through Israel and Palestine all but drowned out news of politics.

Al Gore attempts to keep his focus both on the campaign and in top-secret White House efforts to keep the Middle East calm. George W. Bush is involving himself as well by getting at the edges of Gores' vulnerability in his position as vice president.

On Saturday, Bush relaxed at his Texas ranch while Gore attended a campaign rally in Detroit, an area with an Arab-American community of 300,000.

On Friday Gore canceled a meeting with Arab-American activists from Michigan because of a White House national security meeting with President Clinton, Secretary of State Madeleine Albright and Defense Secretary William Cohen. Main topics of discussion were the terrorist bombing of the U.S. Navy warship in Yemen and the past two weeks of heated violence between Israelis and Palestinians.

Gore, attempting to emphasize his position involving these delicate and weighty matters, told supporters that he was summoned to a meeting which was for the nation's principals.

"This is a great time of tension. It is a time when our country's leadership is needed," Gore told a crowd of 2,000 in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. "As a nation, we're going to stand together and do everything we can to promote peace and security and the right outcome."

Gore met for 45 minutes on Friday evening with Arab-Americans as a make-up meeting. He met with three of the community's activists in Washington. Greg Simon, campaign advisor, said the three expressed their concern for the United States "to maintain its role as an honest broker" and not to choose sides between Israel and Palestine.

In 16 days, 96 people, two Israeli soldiers and the rest Palestinians, have been killed. Despite pleas from the Arab-American community, Gore sides with Israel, said Terry Ahwal, a member of the Ramallah Federation in suburban Dearborn, Mich. He was to have met with Gore in Detroit.

"His support to Israel I am not questioning," said Ahwal. "I believe in a secure Israel but is it fair for children to die to keep Israel secure?...He is hurting himself. We do matter, the Arabs, we vote."

Arab-Americans are traditionally swing voters, so both Bush and Gore are making their impressions on a southeastern Michigan community. According to a new poll by Marketing Resource Group, the Michigan race is close with Bush at 42 percent, Gore at 41 percent, and Green Party candidate Ralph Nader at 4 percent.

The margin of error for the survey was 5 percent and Gore had been up by 6 points in the late-August poll. Another Michigan poll run by EPIC/MRA showed Gore at

46 percent and Bush at 43 percent. The margin of error was a 4-point.

On the campaign trail in Michigan on Friday, Bush blamed Gore for the recent administrative decision to tap the nation's strategic oil reserve in effort to stabilize fuel costs.

"Every barrel released today is one less barrel available to protect us against threats to our security --- threats that are becoming more vivid with this week's turmoil and violence in the Middle East," Bush told hundreds of Pontiac auto workers. "Vice President Gore called for this release and he should take responsibility for what has occurred."

This next week Gore is increasing his spending on television ads to be aired in Michigan, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Washington, Maine and Iowa. His funds will increase to more than \$5 million, decided after cutting Ohio and Louisiana from his campaigning, since neither is an important state to win over.

During an interview on Friday, Bush questioned the role Gore plays concerning the U.S. agreement on the sale of Russian arms to Iran. Gore, co-chairman of the United States-Russia Bi-national Commission, added his name to a 1995 agreement with Clinton and then-Russian President Boris Yeltsin.

Mission Foods recalls corn chips

WASHINGTON, D.C.—

Mission Foods Co., the nation's largest manufacturer of tortilla products, recalled all its tortillas, taco shells and snack chips made with yellow corn on Friday. The recall involved the corn, because the flour used may contain an unapproved biotech variety of grain.

The move by Mission followed a decision made earlier in the week by Safeway Inc. to remove all of Mission's taco shells from its stores and an earlier recall of taco shells made by Kraft. Mission's sister company, Azteca Milling, has also announced a recall of all its flour made from yellow corn.

The health concern at hand is that of a variety of genetically engineered corn, known as StarLink. StarLink is not approved for human consumption because health officials question its potential to cause allergic reactions. "Our guiding concern has been to protect the safety of the consumer, our customers and our food products," said Steve Brummer, senior vice president of Mission Foods.

Officials at Azteca Milling decided to initiate their recall of the flour because they were not confident of the methods of testing for StarLink. The company has announced that they intend to mill only white corn in the future.

"Because StarLink is a yellow corn, and we believe that we need to assure our customers and the public that products made with our flour are safe, the surest way to bolster confidence is to make products with only white corn," said Dan Lynn, Azteca's president.

FAA audit finds faulty fasteners

WASHINGTON, D.C.—

According to a government audit released Friday, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has ignored evidence of faulty nuts and bolts used in airplane assembly. While belatedly questioning the accuracy of tests at an Air Force laboratory that found strong indications of a problem, the aviation agency has refused to handle the problem effectively.

The FAA also failed to visit the laboratory sight, Hill Air Force Base in Ogden, Utah, to verify the claim. Eliot Brenner, a spokesman for the FAA, simply noted that not visiting the Air Force Base "was an oversight."

The issue raises important safety concerns about defective bolts. From March to December of last year, the bolts in question failed on ten engines and caused one engine to shut down in flight.

The auditor's office raised the issue of fasteners with the agency in September of 1999, saying that thirty-two percent of a random sample evaluated at Hill had threads that did not meet specifications. Eight months later, according to the new report, FAA officials responded that the fasteners did not actually fail to meet standards, but that the laboratory tests were inaccurate.

"If fasteners were failing at the rate suggested by this data, manufacturers would be in our conference rooms pounding their fists on the table demanding some kinds of action," Brenner said, defending the FAA. "But they're not. The parts are holding together."

War criminal dies in NATO pursuit

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands—

A Serbian war crimes suspect in Bosnia, wanted for the rape and torture of women, killed himself Friday. In the process of fleeing from North American Treaty Organization (NATO) troops, Janko Janjic wounded four German soldiers and killed himself with a hand grenade while resisting arrest.

It was the first time soldiers of the NATO-led peace force suffered casualties making arrests on behalf of the United Nations (UN) war crimes tribunal.

Janjic, who had vowed he would not be taken alive, threw a grenade which he habitually carried. The injuries from the grenade were sustained as the troops were using explosives to blast open the door of his brother's home in the Serb-held town of Foca, 25 miles southeast of Sarajevo. Janjic was fatally wounded and his brother, Oliver, was also injured.

Janjic is the third war crimes suspect in the former Yugoslavia to die resisting arrest by international troops.

NATO headquarters in Brussels, Belgium, said the soldiers did not fire their weapons during the arrest attempt.


"NATO deeply regrets the loss of life as well as the injuries," said NATO Secretary-General Lord Robertson.

The German Defense Ministry said none of the wounded soldiers were in critical condition.





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Upcoming convention promotes marital equality

When thinking about marriage, some might envision the stereotypical 1950's view; the husband as the head of the household and the wife as his subordinate.

However, it is now the year 2000 and more people are beginning to come around to the view of complete equality between husband and wife as being the true definition of a healthy and successful marriage.

In agreement with this idea is a group that calls themselves the Christians for Biblical Equality (CBE).

They are a group of evangelical Christians who believe that the Bible teaches equality for all genders, races, ethnic groups, economic classes and age groups.

The CBE will be holding a conference from October 27-29 in Minneapolis in order to address what the Bible teaches about equality between a husband and wife in marriage.

One significant reason for holding this conference is that it is in direct response to the recent Southern Baptist Convention, which came to the conclusion that wives should indeed "graciously submit" to their husbands.

However, interestingly enough the CBE has reported that their membership numbers have actually increased in response to the ideas that were presented at the Southern Baptist Convention.

Mimi Haddad, the executive director of the CBE, explained the group's purpose by stating, "Christians for Biblical Equality does not believe marriage is

about subordination, but mutuality. Intimacy is impossible when you are subordinate to anybody else. That is not what the Bible says, and we don't think that's how God intended us to live."

In order to get this message across, the conference is scheduled to include sessions such as the theology of egalitarian marriage, dealing with conflict, an intense study of the chapters in Ephesians that discuss marriage; also a discussion about abuse and violence in relationships.

In addition, Jim Mellado who is the president of the Willow Creek Association in South Barrington, a network of outreach-oriented churches, and his wife Leanne will be speaking on the benefits of having a marriage based on equality.

This couple is qualified to speak on this subject considering that their marriage has gone through a great deal of refinement over the past few years.

Their marriage started out under the assumption that Jim would be the leader in the household, while Leanne would take on the role as more of his helpmate.

The situation has torn Leanne apart for years, especially since in her heart she continually felt the strong desire to take a more active role in the marriage and be Jim's equal.

With Leanne becoming increasingly more depressed, she and Jim decided that it was time to completely transform the established "roles" in their marriage.

Eventually, they both became involved with the CBE and Leanne even began studying for her master's degree at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School in Deerfield.

With this shift towards equality, Jim has noticed an apparent change in his wife. He attempts to explain it by saying, "I cannot describe to you the depth of community we have now."

Whatever we had before just cannot be compared to what we have now. She is alive and full of life, and is strong, a leader, opinionated and an innovator...and at the same time, my life has flourished too."

Yemen blast kills 17 on Navy destroyer USS Cole

Despite the Cole's technological sophistication, the ship was essentially helpless to prevent an attack of the type presumed to have happened - the maritime equivalent of a truck packed with explosives pulling up to a building.

The Cole's vulnerability to such an apparent attack immediately raised questions about the security measures the ship had taken. Admiral Clark said that the ship's captain would not have necessarily have expected a routine mooring operation to pose a threat.

Clinton said the explosion aboard the Cole would not scuttle American diplomatic efforts in the Middle East, if indeed that was the motive for the apparent attack.

"If their intention was to deter us from our mission of promoting peace and security in the Middle East, they will fail utterly," he said.

Secretary of Defense William S. Cohen said in Washington that no one had immediately claimed responsibility for the attack. He and others in Washington warned against prematurely assigning blame to any group or speculating on the motives for an attack.

While Clinton and his senior aides stopped short of definitively attributing the explosion to terrorism, senior Pentagon officials said the Cole was attacked in a highly sophisticated operation that depended on access to information about its brief visit to Aden.

They said evidence indicated that the attack may have been weeks or months in the planning, suggesting that it might not be directly related to the roiling tensions in the Middle East.

Attorney General Janet Reno announced that a Federal Bureau of Investigation team of investigators would lead the inquiry.

But according to the State Department, several radical Islamic organizations operate in Yemen. They include the Palestinian group known as Hamas, the Palestinian Islamic Jihad, the Egyptian Islamic Jihad and cells linked to Osama bin Laden, the exiled Saudi whom American officials blamed for the bombings of American embassies in Kenya and Tanzania on Aug. 7, 1998.

In the past few weeks, President Saddam Hussein of Iraq has also intensified his threats against the United States, Israel, and Arab states like Kuwait and Saudi Arabia.

Even as the Cole was struck, American intelligence officials had detected movement by one of Iraq's Republican Guard divisions west of the Iraqi capital, Baghdad. Mr. Cohen suggested the timing of this bombing could be purely coincidental.

The Pentagon announced that it had heightened the state of alert for American forces around the world, including American bases, while the State Department reiterated a worldwide advisory warning Americans living or traveling

overseas to be watchful of potential terrorist attacks.

The crew of the Cole was also left on high alert because of the events that occurred. While the visit was scheduled to be brief, Naval officials had notified the government of Yemen several days in advance.


While security personnel were on deck at the time, a Pentagon official said the crew had no warning before the explosion, which had such force that badly damaged the engine room in the middle of the ship, an adjoining mess, living quarters and severely buckled the metal on the side of the ship. Most of those killed were in those or adjacent areas.

Secretary of State Madeleine K. Albright said she had spoken with the president of Yemen, Ali Abdullah Saleh, who had offered to help with the treatment of those injured and with the investigation.

At the Cole's home port in Norfolk, the Navy set up a center for family members to gather as grim news of deaths and injuries came in.

"In the wake of this tragedy," he continued. "I want to be very clear about one point. We will continue to protect our national interests around the world, in the Middle East and elsewhere."

No one should doubt our resolve to remain a force for peace and for stability, and no one should assume that they can force us to retreat. No one should assume they can attack us with impunity."




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Women soccer team visits Hawaii, Men's team stays home

In his book *The Great Evangelical Disaster*, the late famous Christian Scholar Francis Schaffer foretold the issue that would cause a "Great Divide" among believers. The rift would not come from matters involving what style of music to play on Sunday morning, or even an epidemic of church gossip, but rather about whether we could trust the Word of God as the inerrant, final authority. Such an issue recently surfaced in a Sunday school class while out of state on a weekend service project with the NNU band.

The teacher posed the following questions to the class. "Should we take the Holy Bible as the authoritative guidebook for making all of life's decisions? Is the Holy Bible scientifically credible?"

Following varied responses ranging from the enlightenment to Biblical minimalism, I offered the following scripture from II Timothy 3:16-17, "All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for

every good work."

The point I went on to make was that because all scripture is God-breathed, it is by definition flawless and without error, for God does not make mistakes in His revelation. Scripture is inerrant because it all comes from God, and if you want to dig into the scientific credibility of The Holy Bible, look at archaeology. It has only confirmed and supported the events portrayed in Biblical history and never gone against them!

Unlike other religions, Biblical Christianity is rooted in real history. From the formation of Adam out of the dust by the very hand of God to Christ's death on the cross for our sins and His resurrection from the dead, we serve a God who has repeatedly involved Himself in human history. He loves and desires personal fellowship with each of us.

Paul who warned, "And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins." (I Corinthians 15:17) If the Holy Bible isn't historically authoritative, then the fall of mankind through the sin of Adam and Eve found in Genesis is not an actual historical event. Why in the world then are we in

need of a Savior? If the fall didn't happen in real history then we are not sinful, fallen creatures in need of Christ's redemption on the cross!

The significance of all this is that the God we serve does not have His authority come to a screeching halt at the boundary markers of faith and salvation. Rather, He is the final authority in all matters upon which He speaks.

God does not face a stop sign when the archaeologists head out to the excavation dig. God doesn't come up against red tape while the gurus of chemistry toil over their lab tables. God is not stranded on one side of the Grand Canyon while historians write their scholarly books on the other. God does not run up against a brick wall when astute scientists hypothesize about the laws that govern the universe!

The authority of God's Word does not have to slam on its brakes when approaching the entrance gate to any field of study! We serve the

One and only true God, the God of faith, truth, salvation, science, knowledge, and history. He is the God of all of these things. His Word is the infallible, trustworthy authority from Genesis to Revelation.

The reason I believe the Lord Jesus Christ rose from the dead is because God's Word tells me so. The reason I believe I'm forgiven only by the blood of the Lord Jesus Christ is because God's Word tells me so. The reason I believe in the virgin birth is because God's Word tells me so. The reason I believe God took six days to create is because God's Word tells me so. The reason I believe anything about the Christian faith is because God's Word tells me so.

The Holy Bible is to be the basis of our thinking in every area upon which it touches and not to be regarded as simply a collection of manuscripts that we conveniently label as "fable," or "myth" every time they become controversial. May we all stand firm on the authority of God's Holy Word and always "Let God be true, and every man a liar." - Romans 3:4

Great food, atmosphere with a decent price tag

Recently, a group of friends and I went to Boise with the plan of going to the Olive Garden for a nice Italian dinner. One in the group was an employee, so we were all looking forward to the discount she could get.

When we got there, though, there were people lining the sidewalks outside of the building. Sure enough, it was going to be at least an hour before we would be seated. We decided to ditch it and go somewhere else. Right across the parking lot, next to the main

entrance to the mall was Old Chicago. I had heard some good things about the place, so we decided to check it out.

The restaurant has a nice atmosphere. It has the eclectic look with old posters and other stuff on the walls. It mainly has a baseball

theme, with televisions hanging from the ceiling showcasing various games. We were seated within a few minutes and greeted by our waitress. She was very helpful in explaining various things on the menu, the sizes of the pizzas and so forth. She patiently waited as we made up our minds, changed them and made them up again.

The food they serve at Old Chicago is the type of Italian food you might expect at a pizzeria in Chicago. They have various kinds of Chicago-

style pizza, calzones, pasta, and sandwiches. I ordered the "Meat Me" calzone. Now let me tell you, this was nothing at all like the calzones we are served at our beloved Marriott, the one's that are ninety percent bread. This thing was huge and stuffed with several

different kinds of meat and mozzarella. It was kind of like a pizza crust folded over with all the toppings inside. Marinara sauce was served with it for dipping.

Ryan Pike, who was with us, had the Pasta Alfredo. He said that it was some of the best pasta he had ever had at a restaurant. Cristi Gage went for the regular Cheeseburger, which turned out to be a little more than she bargained for.

I was impressed with the portions that everyone received. The average price for a meal without a beverage was about \$7.00 and all


of us went away stuffed. Two of the people I was with had decided they wanted to just order one calzone and split it. Then, when the waitress came with our food, they had actually made two separate ones for them. Both were nearly as big as a regular sized one.

There are 42 Old Chicagos nationwide. They are run by the Rock Bottom Restaurants Company, which is based out of Louisville, CO. You should be aware that these restaurants do fall under the category of sports bar, so if that offends you, then you may want to go elsewhere.

The bar section of the restaurant, however, is well-separated from the dining room, so we were not bothered by it. They also do serve alcohol in the dining room, as do many pizza restaurants.

All of us were very pleased with the service we received, but even more with the food. It wasn't as elegant as the Olive Garden, but it was definitely just as good, and not near as pricey. All in all I'd say that Old Chicago is probably not the best place for a date, but if you're going there with a group, or just the guys, it's perfect. But that's my opinion.

I'm amazed to hear people who have been here for three and four years still complaining about Nampa. Why do they still insist on explaining to everyone what they hate about this place.


