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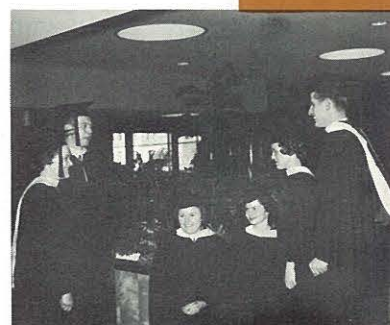
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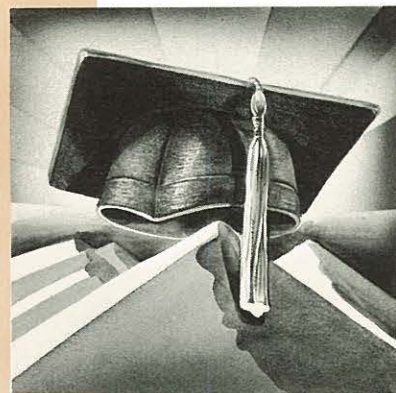

To you, Miss Juanita Demmer, is appreciatively dedicated this 1961-62 yearbook.



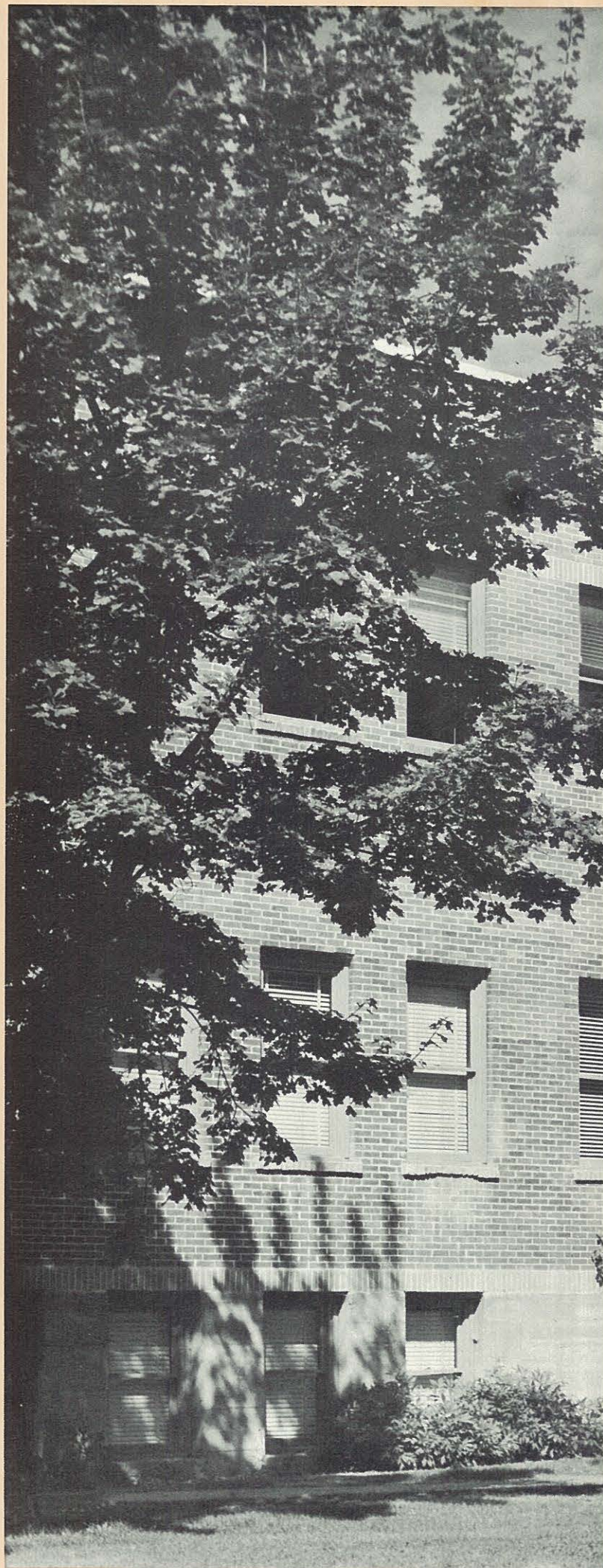

The Campus

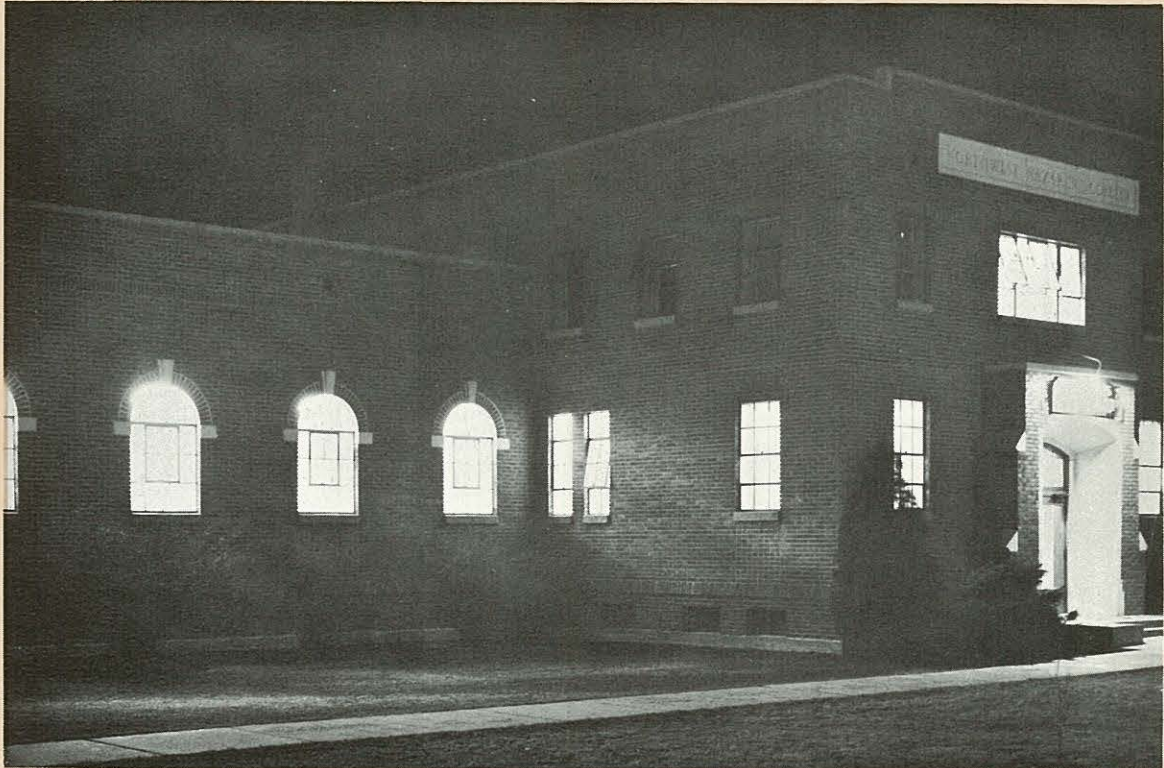

Though we are now making new memories in the Student Center, the Ad Building will always hold a special, cherished place in our thoughts of college days.





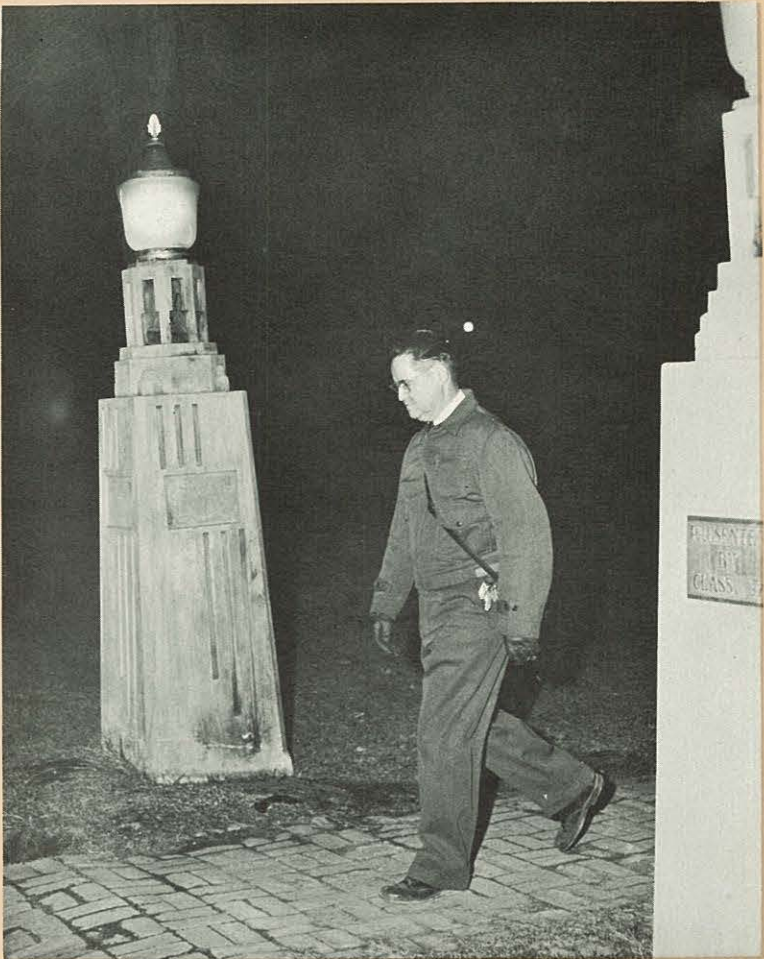

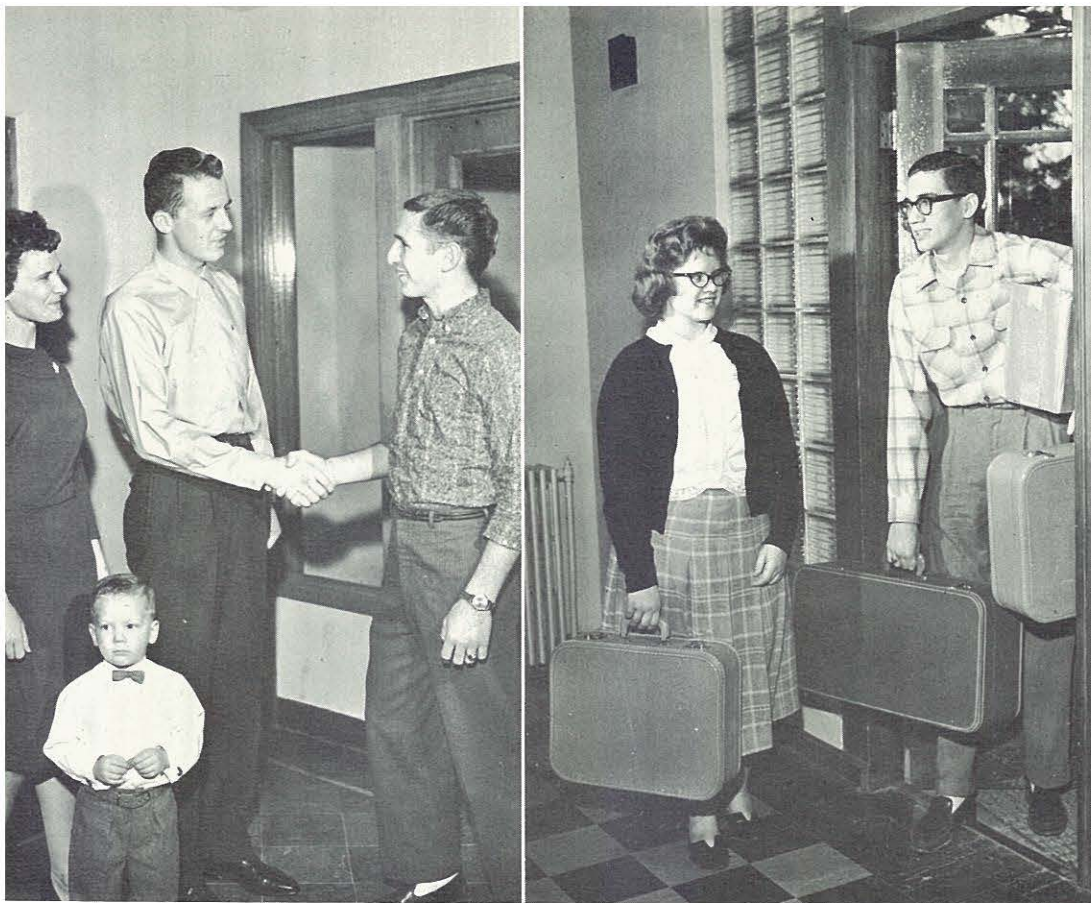

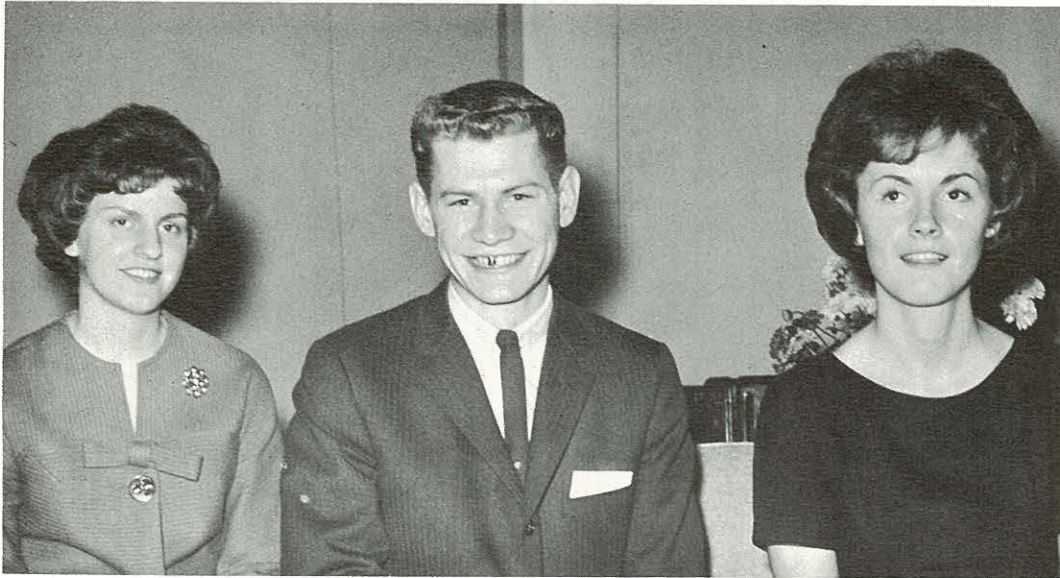

The play, written by Henrik Ibsen and adapted for the American stage by Arthur Miller, was presented November 17 and 18.

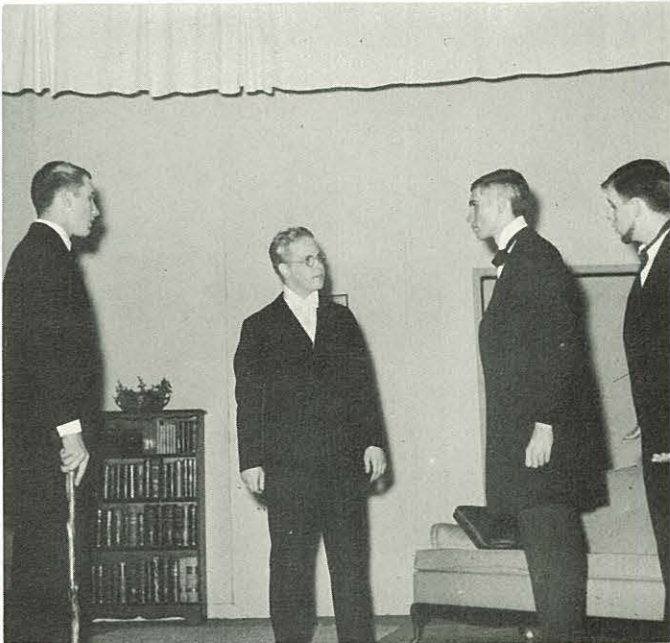

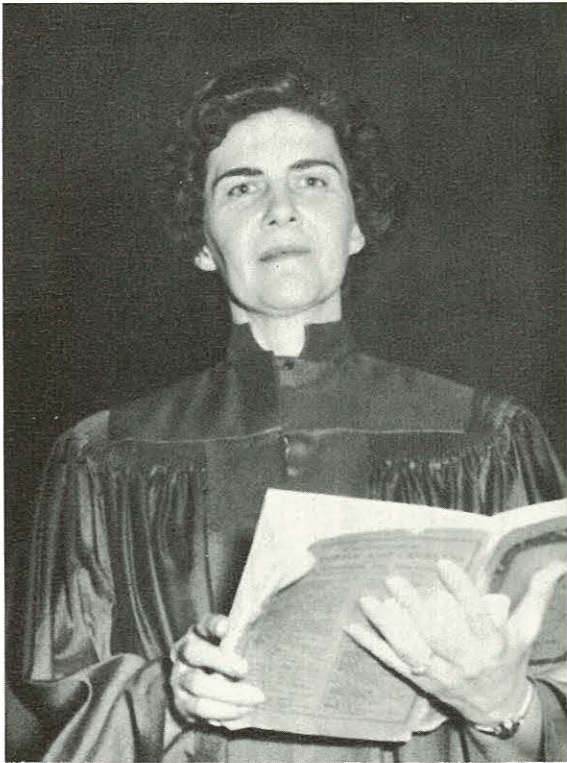

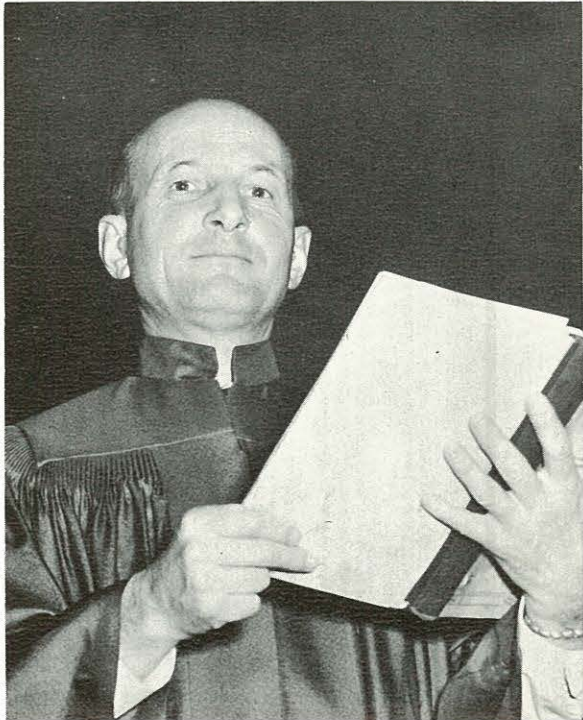
The Messiah

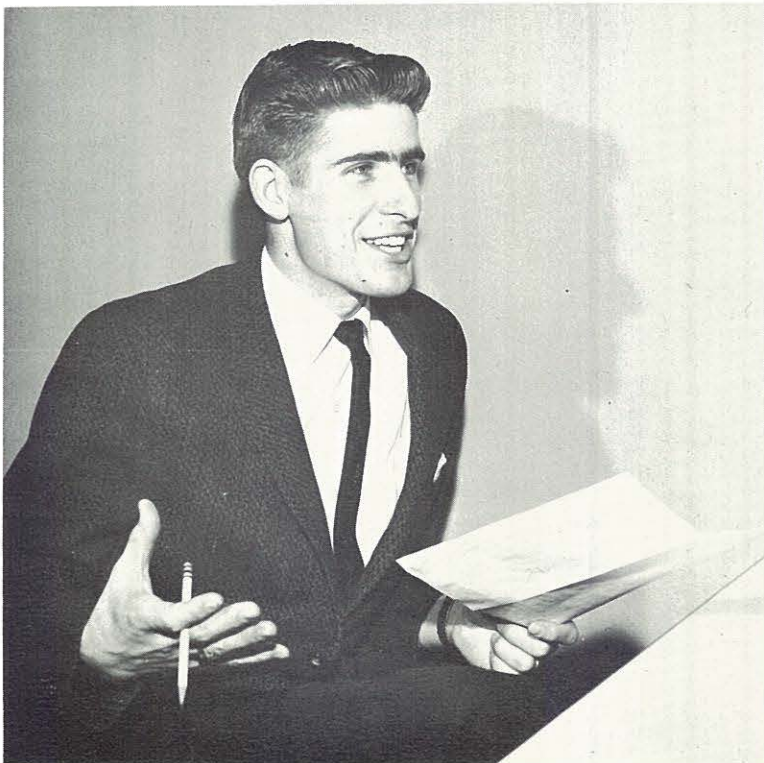
The Oasis

KROK

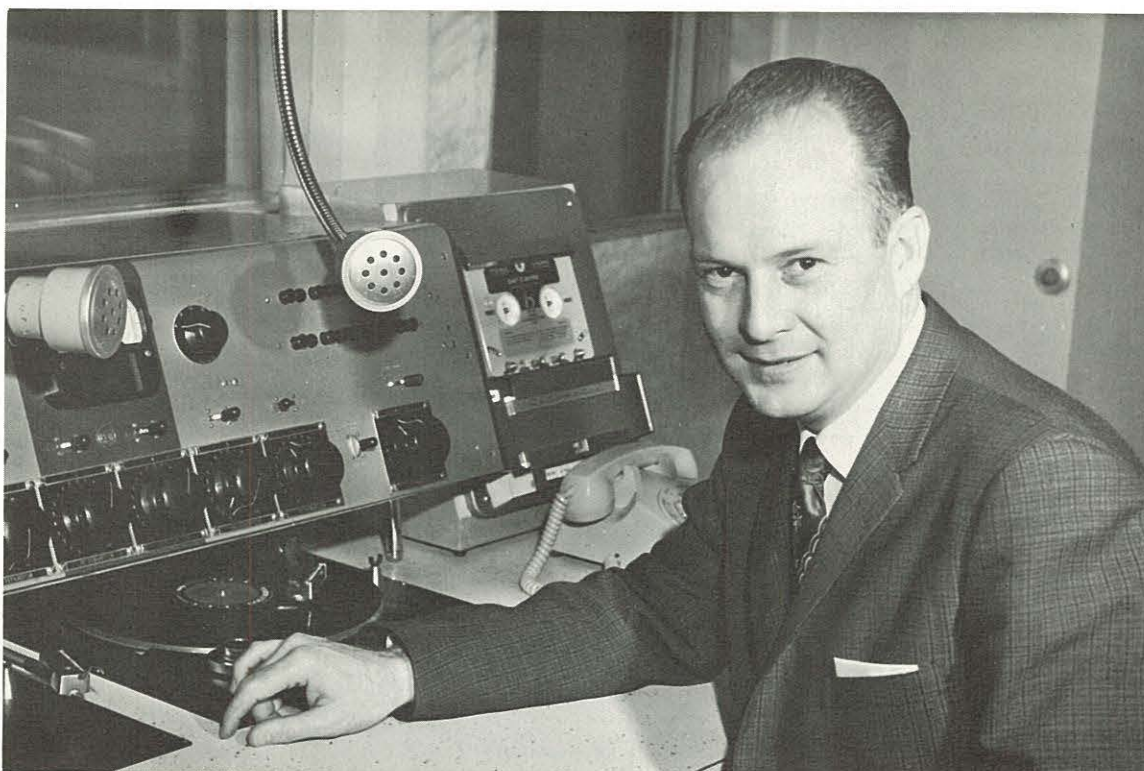
KROK celebrated its eleventh anniversary by relocating its studios in the new student center. The attractive studios are well planned and provide adequately for any future growth.

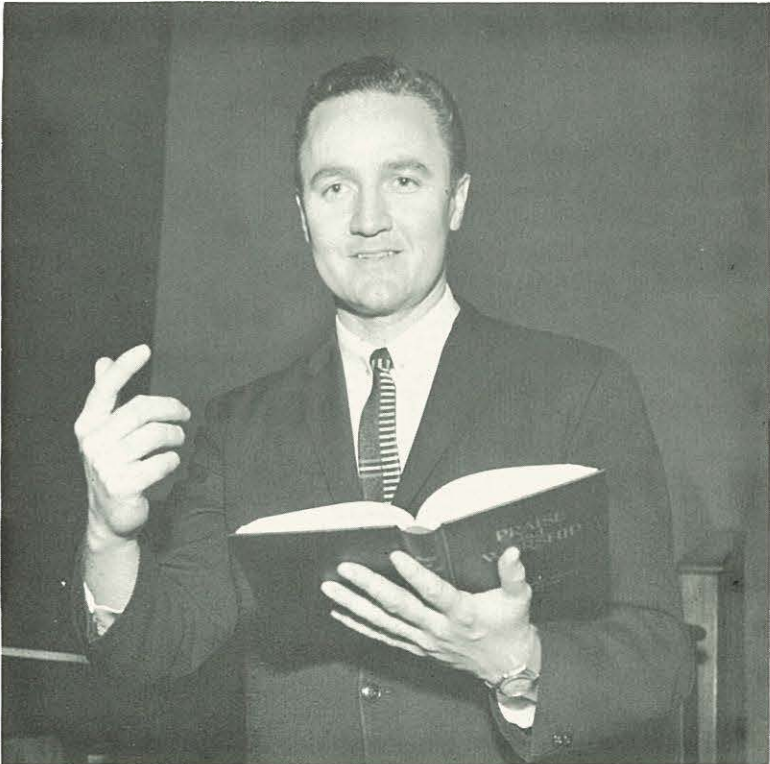
Madrigals

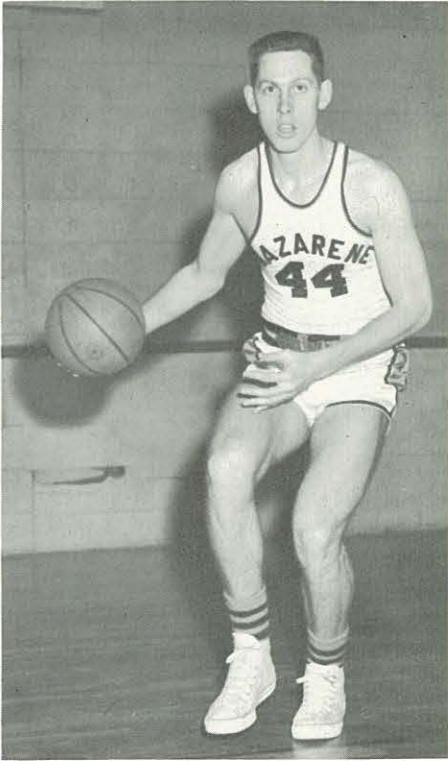
Next year the Crusaders will be represented by a veteran squad which should be one of the favored teams in the Boise Valley.

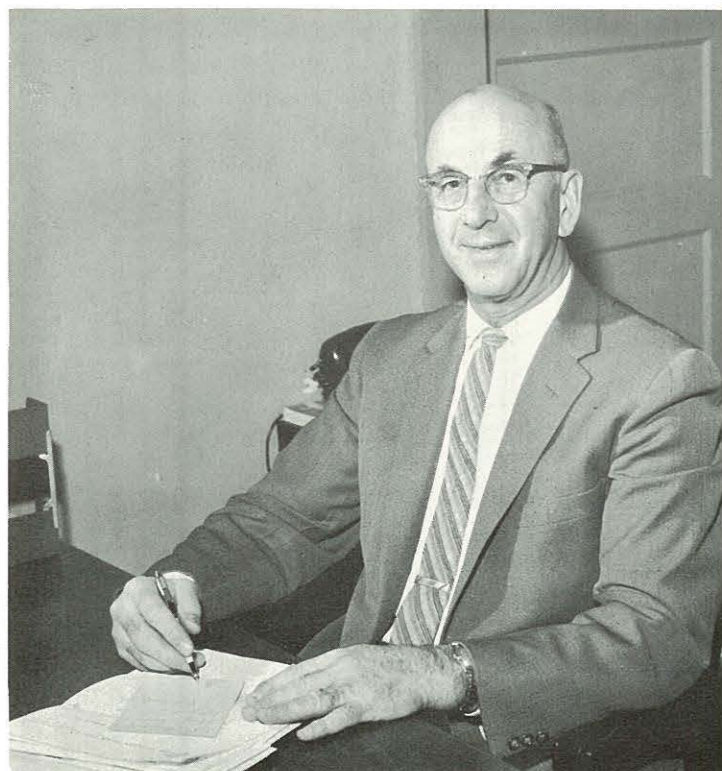
The business manager of the college has the responsibility of securing and expending money that comes to the college and accounting to the President and Board of Regents for financial progress.

As the director of development it is his responsibility to organize the solicitation of funds for new buildings and equipment, and to secure financial assistance from business and industry as well as the church constituency.



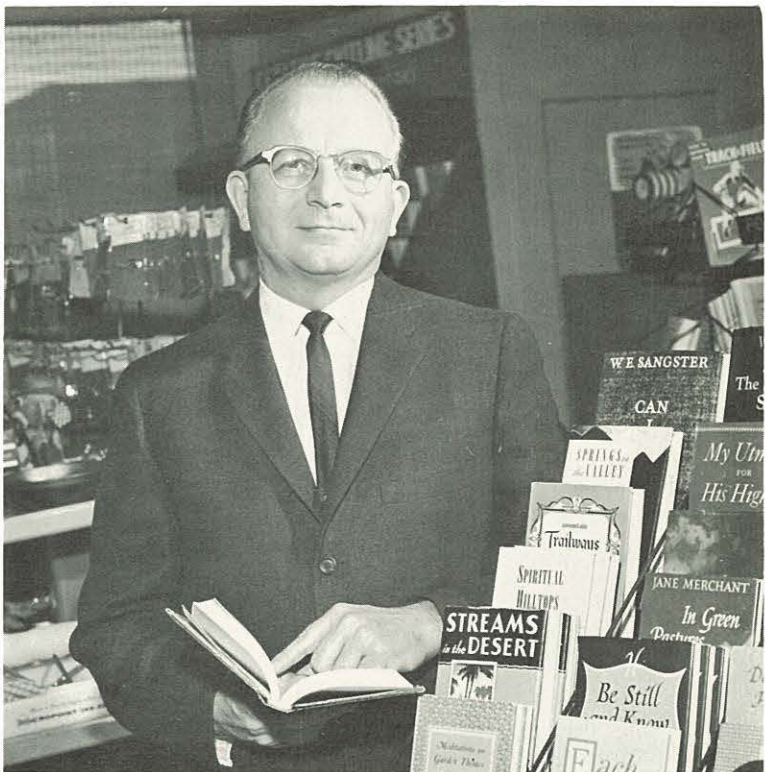
