It was John R. Mott who first called it to my attention in an emphatic way that life is made up of priorities. He insisted that we can never do all the good that needs to be done in the world, not even all the good we as individual Christians desire to do. The choice before us, therefore, is to choose our main task.

It is this business of setting up priorities—and sticking to them—that determines whether or not the church will continue to be the church or become another social group with scattered aims. Even as the government in World Wars I and II set up priorities for men and

materials in order to win the war, the church today must make Kingdom building the basis for her service and efforts. Actually, the sincerity and efficiency of the church are best demonstrated by her outreach for sinful men, and her purity and devotion are exemplified in the spirit of evangelism.

It must be an abiding conviction of the church that the Cross of Christ is God's answer to the sin of the world, and that this remedy is relevant to every generation and to every nation. We cannot escape the Great Commission if we would be true disciples of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. We are His witnesses to our own generation. Here are some "musts" to this assignment that seem pertinent for our Fiftieth Anniversary year:

- 1. The task of evangelism and Kingdom building commands the full energies and total resources of the church.
- 2. This effort is a continuous one on the part of the church and should constitute a planned invasion of the world at every level of life.
- 3. It demands a full-time Christian ministry, unencumbered by the necessity of "serving tables."
- 4. This mission requires the witness of our laymen everywhere in the ordinary vocations of life. Men must hear the word of reconciliation in the accents of their familiar tongue and with a common understanding.
- 5. Our message is full deliverance from sin, both outward and inward, and the ethical standard is, "Holiness unto the Lord."

Visitation and Revivals

For a month the flu epidemic made its inroads and caused hard sledding; then the heavenly light broke through, God came, and we had revivals. By way of reflection we have made the following observations of our last three campaigns. It was a noticeable fact that the people came faithfully to their revival, night after night. The meeting became the important issue of their lives and they were in their places to do their part. This made a challenging situation for the clergy and everybody.

In the second place, by personal visitation and telephone, pastors and people brought their friends and this added fuel to the revival fire. We quickly found that a working people became a happy people. Thus new zeal rose in the campaign from time to time.

In the third place, we launched a Bible reading contest and the readers reported each night, telling how many verses they read during the day. In this manner we became more scripturally minded and worked in harmony with the divine plan. Along with this they took hold in the prayer meetings. So we worked together, clergy and laity as a team, for one mighty cause—the salvation of souls.

As a consequence the results justified the efforts—altars were filled and running over with hungry seekers and happy finders. Rejoicing hearts praised God and went out to live transformed lives. Pastors took in a good class of members (over three dozen) and the churches were built up. But most of all, the Holy Spirit came and visited the churches that went all out in holy visitation for Him.

THE HOLY SPIRIT:

II. A Guest to Remain

It is our desire to place emphasis upon the ministry of the Holy Spirit so that each one of us may be able to understand more clearly what the work of the Holy Spirit is for us. Last week I wrote about "The Holy Spirit: A Gift to Receive"; this week I would like to suggest this additional truth, "The Holy Spirit: A Guest to Remain."

Shortly before the Ascension, Jesus said to His disciples, "If ye love me, keep my commandments. And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you for ever; even the Spirit of truth; whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth him not, neither knoweth him: but ye know him; for he dwelleth with you, and shall be in you" (John 14:15-17). The earthly ministry of Jesus was of comparatively short duration, much shorter than the average length of pastorate in our day. He was with His disciples for just a little over three years and then was taken from them.

During those three years they learned to love and worship Him to the point that it made them heartsick to think that He would ever be taken from their midst. Jesus knew that if they were left alone, without any kind of divine leadership, they would be as sheep without a shepherd and soon would be scattered abroad. This we see happening in their lives after the Crucifixion and before the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. So He said to them: "Don't be afraid, 'I will not leave you comfortless: I will come to you' "—not in My flesh, not in the way that I have associated with you for these three years or more, but through the ministry and power of the Holy Ghost. Samuel Chadwick, in his book *The Way to Pentecost*, states

that there are seven fundamental things about the Spirit in the promise of the Son:

- 1. That the selfsame Spirit that had been given to the Son would be given to them.
- 2. That the Holy Spirit would be to them all that He had been to Him.
- 3. That the Holy Spirit would be to them all that the Son had been to them and more.
- 4. That He, the Holy Spirit, would be in them as the Son had been with them.
- 5. They should gain in Him, the Holy Spirit, more than they would lose in the departure of Christ.
- 6. That He would be the Paraclete or the other self of Christ, and through His indwelling, the Christ would live in them.
- 7. That His mission was to glorify the Son, by taking of the things of Christ and making them available to us.

Christ could not be everywhere in the flesh, but when He returned to the Father He sent the Holy Spirit, His other self, to be with the disciples throughout all of life. He came to abide with those disciples in their generation, and He is with us today. Anywhere and everywhere, without fail, He is with us fulfilling the promise of the Lord himself, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." Let the Holy Spirit invade your life today, that He may abide with you forever.

Shall we pray? "O God, help Thy people this day to receive the person of the Holy Spirit in their lives, in all His fullness, that they may have the abiding presence of God forever. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen."

In 1944, after being appointed as missionaries of the Church of the Nazarene to the Cape Verde Islands, we were asked by the Foreign Missions secretary, "If our church is able to enter Brazil this year, would you be willing to go there?"

Since we had said "anywhere" to Jesus when He called, we answered, "Yes." However, Brazil was not entered, and we came to Cape Verde as planned.

During the twelve years that we have been here in these isolated islands we have been happy, knowing that we were in God's will. Brazil was all but forgotten. No, not really forgotten! There was the time in 1952 when we were on a Brazilian boat returning to Cape Verde. A Brazilian society lady, after reading a Gospel portion we had given to her, came to our stateroom, asking for prayer. There on her knees she prayed for Christ to come

into her heart and life. Later, when she asked where our church was located in Brazil, we were sorry to say that we had none there.

Then there was the day we bade farewell to a fine Cape Verdian young man as he left for Brazil. (The dream of many Cape Verdians is to get to Brazil.) He wanted his church letter to take with him, so that he might join the Church of the Nazarene there. Again we were sorry to say that our church hadn't yet gone to Brazil. Yes, and there were other similar experiences that made us remember the need of opening Nazarene work in Brazil. When would this need be met?

During the last few months our prayers have increased as we have seen the church moving in that direction. Our Cape Verdians have been praying, too, though, as one of our N.F.M.S. presidents testified the other day, "Little did we think that God would answer our prayers by taking a missionary family from us."

Yes, we prayed too that God would send workers to Brazil, not thinking that we would be the ones sent. It was a shock when the cable came about our appointment. From the human angle it isn't easy to leave what has been home to us for twelve years. Our seven-year-old Elizabeth, not wanting to leave her birthplace, and home for all of her life thus far, when told of our appointment, exclaimed, "I am mad at Adam and Eve, for they are the ones to blame for this."

However, we are ready to go wherever He leads. The challenge of Brazil cannot be brushed aside. We must enter with God's help. The needs of the fourth largest country in the world (only the Soviet Union, China, and Canada are larger) must be met with the message of HOLINESS. We cannot and must not rest until holiness centers are planted up and down the coast of Brazil and back into the hinterland. We are counting on the prayers and help of the church. The responsibility is staggering. The task is big—too big—BUT, "Not by might, nor by power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord." "The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much."

Appointment to Brazil

The youthful David Livingstone made an unscheduled stop in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, a little over one hundred years ago. He was on his first voyage to Africa. A storm on the Atlantic had split the foremast of the vessel he was sailing on. While waiting for the repairs he made contact with the people and the established church in Brazil. Writing to his friend Watt of his experiences, he said, "When will the beams of Divine Light dispel the darkness of this beautiful Empire?"

In our Golden Anniversary year, the Church of the Nazarene is planning, by the grace and help of God, to share in the challenge of directing the pure "beams of Divine Light" into Brazil.

We are thankful that in His providence we have been given a place of service on this new field of spiritual battle for the Church of the Nazarene. The call of God to Brazil came in the summer of 1956, soon after ordination. Our application for Foreign Mission appointment to Brazil followed.

The response in our hearts since our notification of appointment has been that of increasing thankfulness to Jesus Christ for saving us, for sanctifying us, and for gently leading us in His way. God's promise has been: "I am the Lord thy God which



"God moves in mysterious ways His wonders to perform" may well apply to the life and experience of Mr. Joaquin Lima, one of our most outstanding Bible school students in Buenos Aires, Argentina. Brother Lima came to Argentina six years ago from the Cape Verde Islands. Immediately he became a very active member in the Donato Alvarez church, to which he had transferred. Shortly afterward he entered the Bible school, and notwithstanding that he works in a meat-packing factory during the day and lives several miles from the Bible school, he has become one of our best students.

His native language is, of course, Portuguese, but he has overcome language difficulties easily and is proficient in Spanish also. During the years he has attended Bible school, through his depth of spirituality, characterized by his humbleness and spirit of co-operation, he has become endeared to both teachers and students. Mr. Lima was married to Miss Guillermina Melo, also from the Cape Verde Islands, on July 2, 1955. They have one boy, called Samuel, who was born February 3, 1957.

Here is Mr. Lima's testimony:

"The Apostle Paul writing to the Romans announced his determination and readiness to preach the good news of salvation also to those who lived in the prosperous city of Rome, capital of the historical and apparently indestructible empire. Paul's resolution was based on the power of the gospel in his own life. Praise God, that gospel of power which Paul was not ashamed to preach reached me on September 23, 1945. It was through the message preached by the Church of the Nazarene, on the island of Santo Antao, Cape Verde Islands, that God saved me from a life of sin and idolatry. Notwithstanding my youth-I was then seventeen years of age-I was under the complete dominion of sin and vice. Nevertheless, I considered myself to be spiritual because I possessed a dozen images, or idols, and prayed to them daily for protection.

"But the glorious truth of the gospel opened my spiritually blinded eyes, and I experienced a radical change in my life. One year later, in a Friday prayer meeting the Holy Spirit came to my heart in purifying power and enabled me to begin to please and serve my Lord. Immediately I felt a burden for the lost. Owing to providential circumstances I was not able to continue living in the Cape Verde Islands, and I emigrated to Argentina six years ago.

"I am now in the last year of the Ministerial Course of the Nazarene Bible Institute, Buenos Aires, Argentina. I praise God for this wonderful privilege of preparing to preach the glorious gospel that saves from all sin."

EDITOR'S NOTE: It is our understanding that Mr. Lima plans to offer his services as a national worker in Brazil as soon as the missionaries have become sufficiently established to consider his application.

A Day of Visitation for Brazil

Brazil is frequently called "the land of tomorrow," but so many changes are taking place every day that we are forced to realize that it is also "the land of today."

It is a land of great dimensions and growth. Its potentialities are as staggering as its physical dimensions. The population doubles every twenty-three years. Business and commercial expansion is going on everywhere, and numerous cities are growing up almost overnight. The city of Sao Paulo is one of the fastest growing areas in the entire world. A new building is said to be erected every four minutes.

Yet Brazil is a land of contrast between the old and the new. The new is rapidly pushing the old frontiers back toward the interior, but the old is still there, nevertheless.

The Bible tells us that in this day God is visiting the gentile nations to take out a people for himself. There have been spiritual awakenings in Africa, Asia, Europe, North America, and many islands of the sea. South America has long awaited its turn, but we firmly believe that there is evidence that this is their day of visitation from God. They wait to be set free from the "synthesis of idolatry, Africanism, and Spiritualism" in which they are bound.

Over one hundred years ago there were some beginning efforts of evangelism, but progress was slow. In recent years Brazil has become a wideopen door for the gospel.

We see the external signs and symbols of religion but there is much spiritual darkness and superstition. Crosses are everywhere. Many places of business are named after Jesus or a prominent saint. Wayside shrines are on every road. It is common to see pictures of Peter, John, and Andrew nailed on wooden frames on top of high poles, so that they can guard the entire house. In the larger cities, statues are set in alcoves in the front walls of the houses for protection from evil. The people living in Rio de Janeiro can daily see the massive stone Christ that crowns Corcovado hill overlooking their beautiful city. In recent times, statues of Christ have been erected on the lofty hills overlooking other cities. They typify the most characteristic Christ that Brazil knows-a stone, dead Christ who represents a religion of magic, superstition, and fear. Salvation to these povertystricken people is an end to be attained through repetition of prayers, or burden of payments for baptisms, blessings, marriages, and masses for the dead.

The results of this misrepresentation of our living Lord are that religion has been divorced from culture and has failed to give any moral foundation or power for clean, honest living.

Many people are turning to spiritualism. "Purification of souls through suffering" is their doctrine. Many intellectuals have turned to Positivism, that is, law, order, and progress; and to Theosophy, which is an Oriental cult propagating the idea of reincarnation. Humanism and materialism are also getting a large following and communism is growing, especially among the poor—and the poverty

is great, there being yet 65 per cent of the population illiterate.

Brazil knows little of a personal religion. It knows "family religion" or "traditional religion," the religion of one's race or country, but the individual's own experience of Christ is something new. Many times one who accepts Christ must give up much in the way of his relationship with his family and is often called upon to endure many trials and hardships. A Brazilian friend of ours, just a week ago, was stoned at a street meeting; but he returned the following evening to the same spot and held another meeting. Sixteen people were converted that night. What proof of a spiritual hunger! They are beginning to hear the words: "I am come that they [ye] might have life; and that they [ye] might have it more abundantly." We cannot let them think that these words come from Moscow. We must teach them that they come to them from the Man of Galilee, who is the only answer to their needs.

The need for Christ is apparent. The growth of evangelical work gives strong evidence of this. But yet there is very little holiness, as a second definite work of grace, being presented. The stage is set for a great spiritual awakening among the people of Brazil. They stand at the crossroads. What a great opportunity for the Church of the Nazarene today—yes, more than an opportunity; what a great responsibility! With the faith and zeal of our people there would be no end to what our church could do here.

Someone has said that Brazil "is like a ship splendidly equipped, all sails set and filled with the wind, but no hand on the rudder." Won't you pray with us that it will be Christ's hand that will be invited to hold the rudder, and that Brazil will have her long-awaited visitation from God?

New Thrust into New York

In 1952 the General Board asked us to go to Puerto Rico because of some distressing problems that needed missionary supervision. God helped us in a marvelous way and we were able to leave the island, after five years, with the serious problems settled and the work in a good condition for steady, spiritual growth.

One of the problems we did not settle, nor indeed could we, was the problem of the constant

migration of our Puerto Rican Nazarenes to New York and other cities on the mainland. Of course most of our readers are aware that Puerto Ricans are American citizens, and as such, enjoy unrestricted travel to and from the island. This constant stream of migration has been a cause for much concern to the General Board for some time, and various solutions were advanced, none of which were really adequate without the presence of a Spanish-speaking missionary in New York or the vicinity, to give guidance and direction to a Puerto Rican district on the eastern seaboard.

When we left Puerto Rico, the rate of migration from the island to the mainland was somewhere around twelve hundred per month. With around three million Puerto Ricans on the island and nearly one million in the States, it is easy to see that one out of every four Puerto Ricans, on an average, lives in the U.S.A. There are around seven hundred fifty thousand in New York City alone, often living in wretched conditions; around fifty thousand in Chicago, and others scattered throughout Ohio, Pennsylvania, Florida, and other states. It is a tremendous task and a mighty challenge to the Church of the Nazarene to do something for the Puerto Rican people, not only in Puerto Rico itself, but also right here under our noses. We already have enough Nazarene Puerto Ricans in New York to have a very fine church if they can be gathered up.

Consequently, in the board meeting of 1958 the Department of Foreign Missions appointed us, because of our five years' experience in Puerto Rico, to take over the work already begun among the Puerto Ricans on the New York District by Rev. Robert Goslaw, district superintendent, and expand and develop it as opportunity affords. The time should come in the future when we will have a thriving Puerto Rican district in the eastern part of our country.

In order to accomplish this we will need your prayers, General Budget support, and interest just as keenly and intensely as ever we needed them in Central America and Puerto Rico. I am quite certain that the "jungles" of New York will offer problems and will make demands that will be greater than ever were experienced in the actual jungles of Central America.

In this anniversary year, when the church is making such a thrilling thrust into West Germany and Brazil, and we are inclined to be enchanted with distant lands, let us not overlook the fact that on our doorstep we are presented with as great a challenge and as large an opportunity to do missionary work as we have ever had in any field.

Pray much for this new thrust into New York and the eastern seaboard among the Puerto Ricans. Get the vision on your knees of over one million Puerto Ricans right on our own doorstep; accept the burden of doing something for their spiritual welfare; rejoice with us in the thrilling opportunity to bring Christ to them wherever they are. Pray much for your missionaries as they begin their work, and try to meet the staggering need of this great Spanish-speaking group among us.

Editorials

"Us Four and No More"!

Perhaps you've heard the old prayer which closed with the words, "Bless me and my wife, our son, John, and his wife, us four and no more." There have been many prayers of this type. Some have ended with "my grandchildren and no more," "my church and no more," "my nation and no more," "my race and no more," "my social group and no more," "my friends and no more," "the people I work with and no more." Such prayers are definitely anti-Christian. Christianity does not build fences; it is not exclusive; it knows no limits.

I was in a committee meeting yesterday—only four of us were there; Christianity takes us all in. This morning I visited with six others, and not one of the seven (including myself) was excluded from the reach of Christianity. In 1915 or '16 it was my privilege to sit in a class in Brown University. It was a seminary group and was guided by a famous professor. Only twelve or fifteen persons had registered for this course, and most of us were from widely scattered sections of our country or the world. Further, our beliefs as to the fundamental meaning of life were very different in most cases. Still, no one, in spite of its variety and cosmopolitanism, would have any right as a true Christian to extend his prayers and interest to this group only.

Recently I was in the Union Station here at Kansas City—a spacious and beautiful station—and many trains come into it every twenty-four hours, for Kansas City is a large railroad center. People from all over the world pass through this building, day after day. Nevertheless we could not, if we are Christians, limit the gospel of Christ to those who enter and leave this edifice.

One of the most thrilling half days I ever spent was in the United Nations building in New York City. It is unique and very attractive. While there, one could not help but feel that he was visiting the whole world—a traveler in every land. There were signs of practically all of the nations of the world in that building: people, furniture, decorations, or architecture from most of them. It is truly a "United Nations" building. If you want to visit all the world at once, go to this building. Nevertheless I could not say that only those who get there, or are specifically represented there, "and no more," are to be given the gospel of Jesus Christ. His gospel does not exclude anyone. Christ died for all. "God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life"

(John 3:16). We should be delighted to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. He who is a genuine Christian will be a foreign as well as a home missionary. He is interested not only in those who are at hand but also in those who are anywhere in the world. The world is his parish if he is a Christian. He is a believer in world evangelism.

It is at this point that we must be careful and watch that we do not high-hat somebody because of differences in looks, language, intellectuality, riches, social position, nationality, or race. From the standpoint of Christianity, there is no room to high-hat anyone for any reason. Further, we must remember that we may take an exclusive attitude toward others by more than one method. We may stand aloof from them by refusing to communicate or visit with them, or witness to them. One of the easiest ways to separate ourselves from those who are in need of spiritual help is to hold our purse strings tight. After all, we can reach only a small circle personally, and it is very important that we do this, but we must not stop here. We must see to it that others are sent to reach those personally whom we cannot contact directly.

"Us four and no more"! This is a symbol of any kind of exclusiveness that may be manifested, and I insist once more that it is a symbol of that spirit which should not be manifested by a follower of Jesus Christ.

A similar situation confronts those who would be Christians. They face something difficult rather than that which is easy. Following Christ doesn't mean sunshine and a pathway of roses. Taking Christ's way does not guarantee freedom from cares and tribulations. He who takes the way with Jesus Christ will have to be a soldier—face a world which

is not primarily interested in his success in being a Christian. In your path there will be valleys, mountains, and deserts with their burning heat. In other words, there will be misunderstandings, ridicule, temptation, and sinners along the way. The "timid" will not start on this way, and "the weak" will not get very far. Paul rightly says, "Be strong in the Lord." He knew from experience that the Christian life is a battle. It was that for him almost every step of the way from his experience on the road to Damascus until he was beheaded in Rome.

Paul knew about contests in which the runner had to put all the strength he had into the race to win, and battles with odds innumerable against the fighter. These were the two illustrations of the Christian life used most often by him. When he did this, he was not merely dreaming; he was talking about facts. In spite of all he had to face, he came to life's end in triumph, and said: "Watch thou in all things, endure afflictions, do the work of an evangelist, make full proof of thy ministry." He was talking here, of course, especially to ministers, but the same general type of life must also be faced up to by laymen. Then Paul continues: "For I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing" (II Timothy

"The timid never started, the weak died on the way." Demas was in this latter class. Paul said to Timothy, to whom he was writing: "Do thy diligence to come shortly unto me: for Demas hath forsaken me, having loved this present world" (II Timothy 4:9-10). The contest was furious, the battle was long and hard, but Paul made it through victoriously; the grace of God was sufficient. And the grace of God will be sufficient for you. You do not have to be so afraid that you never start, and you do not have to be so weak as a Christian that you'll die spiritually after you have started.

Protestant Pavilion at Brussels World's Fair Nears Completion

The large Protestant chapel being built at the heart of the World's Fair Ground in Brussels, Belgium, is nearing completion and will be ready for services by the time of the opening of the World's Fair, according to a recent announcement. Designed as a meeting place for religious services as well as an exhibit hall for the Protestant faith, the pavilion will serve as an avenue for evangelical testimony during the fair and as a center of Protestantism in Brussels after the fair is closed. With only 75,000 Protestants in all of Belgium it is hoped that the pavilion will serve as a stimulus for the propagation of the Protestant faith in that country.

American Bible Society to Distribute Scriptures to St. Lawrence Seaway Workers

A unique effort in Bible distribution is being undertaken along the St. Lawrence seaway construction project by the American Bible Society. Four thousand trailer homes house workmen in temporary residences along the seaway. The Bible Society project calls for a worker to visit each trailer, leaving an illustrated Gospel in each one and giving the trailer dweller an opportunity to purchase a complete Bible. Nearly 700 volumes of the Bible have already been sold and the project will continue for several months yet. The society is now making plans for its fifteenth annual observance of the Bible-reading

program from Thanksgiving to Christmas. The theme for the coming program will be "The Book That Lives."

Missionary Books Reach "Best Seller" List

Three books on missionary themes sold 100,000 or more copies each last year according to an announcement from the Commission of Missionary Education. Kingdom Beyond Caste, by Liston Pope, sold 100,000 copies. Cross and Crisis in Japan, by Charles Iglehart, sold more than 121,000 copies, while the book Sense and Nonsense About Race topped 160,000. This put them in the nonfiction best seller list. Pope's book was a Religious Book Club selection.

Evangelistic Crusade Planned for Paris

Under the leadership of Evangelist Eugene Boyer, plans are being matured to conduct an extensive evangelistic crusade in France's largest auditorium, the world's famous Paris Sports Palace, beginning on April 26. Several groups are co-operating in the effort including the Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship, the Navigators, the Greater Europe Mission, the French Bible Society, and

Two Missionary Letters

Two weeks ago in the missionary meeting of Morrison Chapter here in Kansas City, Mrs. Williamson presented the lesson in a most unusual manner. She held in her hand an envelope made of Japanese paper. She told us the letter was addressed to Rev. and Mrs. Howard Eckel, parents of Will Eckel, and that it was dated 1916. Since I was once acquainted with the elder Eckels, I sat up and took notice. The letter told all about our early work in Japan. Clear to the end it sounded like the real thing. Imagine the surprise of the chapter when they discovered the letter was newly written by our study superintendent and the information had been obtained from the study book.

A few weeks before the above incident, a letter came to my husband from Terry Yoda, a Japanese minister. He spent six years in America studying at Northwest Nazarene College and at the Seminary. He returned to Japan last summer. Terry Yoda is a product of missionary efforts in Japan.

Would you like to read both letters?

November 25, 1916 Kyoto, Japan

MY DEAR PARENTS:

It is just one month ago today that we landed in Japan. I know the board in Kansas City has informed you that we arrived safely, that is, if they have received my letter to that effect. We must allow at least four to six weeks for a letter to go or come from America and sometimes it takes three months if the boats are not sailing frequently. We are a long way from you.

You will be interested to know we are located in the old city of Kyoto on East Mountain. It is very hard for Westerners to secure living quarters in Japan, for landlords think Americans want too many things fixed up. But a building company just erected one hundred new houses for rent in this area. Miss Williams, the lady missionary who was here before us, secured three. Florence and I occupy one, Miss Williams another, Rev. and Mrs. Isayama the other. You will recall that Brother Isayama is the same Japanese man who helped us so much in our Japanese mission in Los Angeles last year. student-sponsored "missionary workshop"-four days of exposure to burning truth)

Monday:

Pictures, curios, statistics, reports; questions answered, counsel given, messages delivered-but most powerful of all, the electric contact of six lighted lives, personalities aglow, irradiated by the Spirit of God. Then what really counts is not what I do, or am, but what He does and is, in me and through me. Supernatural naturalness-I am to be myself, alive with His life, radiant with His light.

Tuesday:

Yet I see that each personality is itself, unlike every other. The noisy, the quiet; the stormy challenge, the searching question-but through all the differences, the intensity of divine energy. Again the glory of God's infinite variety; He has a use for every creature He has made. God wishes to use just ordinary, different me-and you; that is enough. He knows where we will fit.

Wednesday:

I see the maturing of spirit which comes to one who gives self over to God, takes the place assigned and lets the Spirit supervise adjustment to the job. That young girl I knew seven years ago with her earnest devotion and her spark of humor-how spontaneously and powerfully those qualities have ripened as Africa entered into her and she into Africa! Self-giving and self-enrichment arc intertwined in the will of God. "There is that scattereth, yet increaseth"; "He that watereth shall be watered also himself.

Thursday:

The one common indispensable is love-and this is the gift of God. It is not natural to love a strange people, language, ways. Love sometimes would wear thin; it needs constantly to be renewed. But it was Livingstone's heart that was buried in Africa (not his head nor his hands, gloriously as these were used under his heart's compulsion). Two truths: If God-given love for His chosen place is lacking, we are failures; God wants our hearts, to fill them with Christ's own compassion.

Friday:

Missionaries bargain for difficulties, hardships; hindrances, obstacles; slow progress, life stripped of luxuries. They

go all out for souls. Is it worth it? Hear Fairy Chism's totaling up: light afflictions versus eternal weight of glory. Or Armand Doll's experience of the steamship putting back four hundred miles with loss to the company of thousands of dollars, to the passengers of thousands of hours, just to get one young man to a doctor in time-it is worth everything to save one life, much more one soul. Have we our priorities right -refrigerators or souls?

Saturday:

The greatest need a missionary faces, new on the field? Patience. Tests of patience many and varied. But wherever we serve, adjustment to other persons and their ways is necessary. are called to sacrifice any or all of our preferences, conveniences, pet notions

for the one essential, to give Christ.

The greatest personal asset of a missionary? Ability to fit in anywhere, to do all sorts of things. The best preparation for the foreign mission fieldwhy not for any work for Christ?-is alertness to every opportunity to acquire any sort of skill. Our best is not too good for God-anywhere, ever.

Sunday:

Marvelous transformations, "new creatures"-the gospel really works there. And here?

Miracles wrought; yet vast untouched areas and millions yet in darkness. Whose the responsibility for these? The same uncalculating, pressing urgency breathed through the spirit of a young missionary under appointment as he spoke and sang about his call. The urgency is upon us all!

DEAR MR. RAMQUIST:

Am trusting that you are enjoying our Golden Anniversary year under the rich blessings of the Lord. I have been so busy since I landed on Yokohama and am'still trying to get settled, but I haven't settled yet.

I am teaching one course at the present time and am enjoying it very much. But starting this semester, I shall be teaching a couple more courses. Along with my teaching ministry, I am also pastoring a church in Tokyo. It is the newest church of the Japan District and it has nothing. I have to build it from the ground. Yes, no building, no members, and nothing. Now we are meeting for our services at the home of one of the seekers. Since we do not have our parsonage or church building, I am living with my family in one of the rooms in the headquarters. It is a small room of 6 x 11 feet, so we are really crowded in that room. We haven't got our furniture and we are sleeping on the floor. We are just squeezing ourselves between table, dish cabinet, etc.—just as if we are in a sub-marine! But my wife and I are so happy to be here, for this is the place He assigned us to serve His kingdom. I have a difficulty of study, for I have Continued on page 18



Was there any ceremony in the Old Testament on which the sacrament of baptism was based?

Water was used frequently in the Old Testament in various ways as a sign of purification and consecration. The same has been true of many other religions. In other words, water has been used in religious ceremonies of various types in many religions. Also, it is claimed that proselytes to Judaism were baptized in Christ's time; certainly this was the case later. In a general way, then, your question as to the Old Testament could be answered in the affirmative. Specifically, however, the answer would have to be, "No." There was no ceremony in the Old Testament which could be placed in the same class with John's baptism for repentance and faith in Jesus Christ. Further, none was specifically the forerunner of Christian baptism.

The Church of the Nazarene teaches that as soon as we die we go to heaven or hell. In John 5:28-29, we are told that we shall come forth from the grave at the resurrection. Is my baby asleep in the grave or is she with Jesus?

Your baby is not asleep in the grave. She is alive and is with Jesus. One of the thieves on the cross looked to Jesus and was saved. Then Jesus said to him: "To day shalt thou be with me in paradise" (Luke 23:43). Lazarus "was carried by the angels into Abraham's bosom" (Luke 16:22). Then one author says: "To the sorrowing Martha, Jesus says, 'Whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die' (John 11:26). In 2 Corinthians 5:1 the apostle Paul declares that if the 'earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens.' In Philippians 1:23 he says he has 'a desire to depart, and to be with Christ; which is far better.' In Revelation 6:9-11 the disembodied spirits of the dead are represented as being in a state of consciousness and calling upon God." It should be added that the Church of the Nazarene and orthodox Christians in general do not speak of going immediately to heaven and hell, for the final state and place of all who die is not arrived at until after the resurrection of the body and its association with the living and conscious soul.

The Bible says that the grave is hell. Was Jesus in hell when He was in the grave?

Icsus was not in hell while He was in the grave if you mean by hell the place of the damned. The Greek word hades is sometimes translated hell, when

in reality it means only the realm of the dead, or the unseen. It does not refer to hell in the sense of the final place where the wicked will go.

Was Rahab justified in what she told the king's men (Joshua 2:5)? If so, are we ever justified in telling a falsehood?

We must not measure the actions of a heathen woman by the standard of light which we have. I think one writer properly describes the situation thus: "This was a palpable deception. But, as lying is a common vice among heathen people, Rahab was probably unconscious of its moral guilt, especially as she resorted to it as a means for screening her guests; and she might deem herself bound to do it by the laws of Eastern hospitality, which make it a point of honor to preserve the greatest enemy, if he has once eaten one's salt. Judged

by the Divine law, her answer was a sinful expedient; but her infirmity being united with faith, she was graciously pardoned and her service accepted (James 2:25)." Your second question is one which has been much discussed across the years, and there have been differences of opinion among those who have written on the problems of human conduct. So far as I am concerned, I am definitely on the side of those who believe that a deliberate lie is never justified.

What about those who say that we cannot be made free from sin and then go on to say that Christians sin every day in word, thought, and deed?

Many such people have been misled them often live better than what they by those who ought to know better, provided they mean by such a statement that such sinning is deliberate. Moreover, they and those who have misled

- 3. Man's rightness with God must of necessity include his rightness with his fellow man.
- 4. The moral law of God is basic still today, and society can be stabilized only by adherence to the divine precepts.

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
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
