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# Introduction

The School of Leadership book series is designed to provide a tool for the church to train and educate its members so they can actively participate in Christian service according to the gifts and calling (vocation) they have received from their Lord.

Each book provides study materials for a course of the School of Leadership program that is offered by the Theological Institutions of the Mesoamerica Region of the Church of the Nazarene. These are: AIBN serving Guatemala North; ASTN serving El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua; SENAMEX North serving Central and South Mexico; and SENDAS serving Costa Rica and Panama. The leaders and the schools (presidents, directors, academic vice presidents and directors of decentralized academic studies) actively participated in the program design.

The School of Leadership has five core courses common to all ministries and six specialized courses for each individual ministry. After completing the series, the respective Theological Institution gives the student a certificate (or diploma) in Specialized Ministry.

The general objective of the School of Leadership is "to work with the local church in equipping the saints for the work of the ministry, giving them solid, theological, Biblical knowledge and developing them through the exercise of their gifts for service in their local congregation and in society." The specific objectives of this program are threefold:

- Develop the ministerial gifts of the local congregation.
- Multiply service ministries in the church and community.
- Raise awareness of the vocation of professional ministry in its diverse forms.

A special thanks to Dr. Monica Mastronardi de Fernandez for her dedication as General Editor of the project, to the Regional Ministry Coordinators, and to the team of writers and designers who collaborated to publish these books. An additional thanks to the teachers who will share these materials. They will make a difference in the lives of thousands of people throughout the Mesoamerica Region.

Finally, I give thanks to Rev. Edwin Martinez and his team in Mesoamerica Regional Literature for the publication and distribution of these materials, and to Dr. L. The School of Leadership is part of the "Sanctifying Grace - Ministry Development" section, and is designed for those who have gone through the "Prevenient Grace" and "Saving Grace" sections of the discipleship path.

# How Do I Use This Book?

This book contains eight lessons of the School of Leadership program, along with activities and final evaluation of the course.

### How are the contents of this book organized?

Each of the eight lessons of this book contains the following:

▶ **Objectives:** These are the learning objectives the student is expected to understand at the end of the lesson.

> Main Ideas: A summary of the key teachings of the lesson.

▶ **Development of Lesson:** This is the largest section because it is the development of the contents of the lesson. The lessons have been written so that the book can be the teacher, and for that reason the contents have been written in a dynamic form and in simple language with contemporary ideas.

▶ **Notes and Comments:** The information in the margins is intended to clarify terms and provide notes that complement or extend the content of the lesson.

▶ **Questions:** Sometimes questions are included in the margin that the teacher can use to introduce or reinforce a lesson topic.

▶ What did we learn?: The box at the end of the lesson development section provides a brief summary of the lesson.

▶ Activities: This is a page at the end of each lesson that contains learning activities, for individuals or groups, on the subject studied. The estimated time for implementation in class is 20 minutes.

▶ **Final evaluation of the course:** This is the last page of the book and once completed the student must remove it from the book and hand it in to a course instructor. The final evaluation should take about 15 minutes.

### How long is each course?

The courses are designed for 12 hours of class over 8 ninety-minute sessions. Each institution and each church or local theological study center will coordinate days and times of the classes. Within this hour and a half the teacher or the teachers should include time for the activities contained in the book.

### What is the role of the student?

The student is responsible for the following:

- 1. Enroll on time for the course.
- 2. Buy the book and study each lesson before class time.
- 3. Arrive for class on time.
- 4. Participate in class activities.

- 5. Participate in practical ministry in the local church outside of class.
- 6. Complete and submit the final evaluation to the teacher.

# What is the role of the teacher of the course?

The professors and teachers for the School of Leadership courses are pastors and laity committed to the mission and ministry of the church and preferably have experience in the ministry they teach. The Director and/or the School of Leadership at the local church (or theological institution) invites their participation and their functions are the following:

1. Be well prepared by studying the book's content and scheduling the use of class time. When studying the lesson, you should have on hand the Bible and a dictionary. Although the lessons are written using simple language, it is recommended that you "translate" what you consider difficult in order to help the students understand. In other words, use terms that they can better understand.

2. Ensure that the students are studying the material in the book and achieving the learning objectives.

3. Plan and accompany students in the activities of ministerial practice. The local pastor and the director of the respective ministry must schedule these activities. These activities should not take away from class time.

4. Take daily attendance and grades in the class report form. The final average will be the result demonstrated by the student in the following activities:

- a. Class work
- b. Participation in ministerial practice outside of class
- c. Final evaluation

5. At the end of the course, collect the evaluation sheets and hand them in with the form "Class Report" to the local School of Leadership director. Do this after totaling the averages and verifying that all data is complete on the form.

6. Professors and teachers should not add tasks or reading assignments apart from the contents of the book. They should be creative in the design of the learning activities and in planning ministry activities outside the classroom according to the reality of their local church and its context.

### How do I teach a class?

We recommend using a 90-minute class session as follows:

• 5 minutes: Review the topic of the previous lesson and pray together.

• **30 minutes:** Review and discuss the lesson. We recommend using an outline, chalkboard, cardboard or other available materials, using dynamic learning activities and visual media such as graphics, drawings, objects, pictures, questions, assigning students to submit parts of the lesson, and so on. We do not recommend lecturing or having the teacher reread the lesson content.

• 5 minutes: Break either in the middle of class or when it is convenient.

• 20 minutes: Work on activities in the book. This can be done at the beginning, middle or end of the review, or you can complete the activities as you proceed in accordance with the issues as it relates to them.

• 20 minutes: Discussion about the students' ministry practice that they currently do and that they will do. At the beginning of the course you will need to present the schedule to the students so that they can make arrangements to attend the ministry practice. In the classes when the students discuss their ministry practice, the conversation should be focused on what they learned, including their successes and their errors, as well as the difficulties they encountered.

• **10 minutes:** Prayer for the issues arising from the practice (challenges, people, problems, goals, gratitude for the results, among others).

### How do I implement the final course evaluation?

Allocate 15 minutes of time during the last class meeting for the course evaluation. If necessary, students may consult their books and Bibles. Final evaluations are designed to be an activity to reinforce what was learned in class and not a repetition of the contents of the book. The purpose of this assessment is to measure the understanding and evaluation of the student concerning the class topics, their spiritual growth, their progress in the commitment to the mission of the church and their progress in ministerial experience.

# **Ministerial Practice Activities**

The following are suggested activities for ministerial practice outside of class. The list below includes several ideas to help teachers, pastors, directors of local School of Leadership groups and local ministry directors. From the list you can choose the activity best suited to the contextual situation and the local church ministry, or replace these with others according to the needs and possibilities of your context.

We recommend having at least three ministerial activities per course. You can put the whole class to work on a project or assign group tasks according to interests, gifts and abilities. It is advisable to involve students in a variety of new ministry experiences.

# DISCOVERING MY SPIRITUAL GIFTS

Objectives

Define spiritual gift, ministry and vocation.
Understand when spiritual gifts are received.
Identify gifts through a test.

Main Ideas

All Christians have a vocation, gifts, and are called to the ministry.
Gifts are varied and necessary for the mission of the church.
When we discover our gifts, we can be trained for service.

# Introduction

In 1996, a Work and Witness team from the United States want to Puerto Rico to build a chapel and stayed next to a house where they raised roosters. It was difficult to sleep at night due the constant "singing" which is typical of these birds. Then they began to wonder why roosters have this annoying habit, and why do they crow constantly. One member of the group answered the question, "Why do roosters crow?" saying, "Because they do it well."

This simple story teaches us a great truth: God wants His children to serve Him doing what they have been gifted to do, and doing it well. We do not all need to be important theologians and preachers to serve our Father. God has given one or more gifts to all Christians to use for His service. He only asks us to invest what He has given us. God calls us to fulfill the vocation in Christ for which we have been created.

# What is a Spiritual Gift?

Spiritual gifts are given by the Holy Spirit.



Spiritual gifts are abilities that the Holy Spirit gives to members of the church so as to serve according to His calling.

A spiritual gift is the ability or capacity received from God through the Holy Spirit to perform a Christian service. Some gifts include teaching, providing for the needs of others, healing the sick, among others (1 Corinthians 12:4, Romans 12:6, 1 Corinthians 12:31-13:13).

# What is Ministry?

Ministry is all the work we do to serve God and others

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The term ministry encompasses all work assignments in the church. In the New Testament, ministry was a "function" that all brothers and sisters took part in, that is, all the disciples participated in the task of presenting Christ according to their gifts and capabilities. Over the centuries this function was centralized in one person: the priest or pastor, and this affected the mission of the church, leaving the members separated from ministry. However, in the Bible, the term "ministry" applies to many more functions than any one person (Senior Pastor) can perform.

We are thankful that in our time, Christians are rediscovering the New Testament principles regarding the priesthood of "all believers" (1 Peter 2:5-9). In Ephesians 4, Paul teaches that God's call to ministry is for all believers regardless of their age, sex, marital status, social class, race or educational background, and they share the following privileges by the grace of God:

- They are called.
- They must walk worthy of their "calling."
- They have a "vocation."
- They have the same Spirit that unites them.
- They have gifts.
- They are ministers and have a ministry.
- Some of them are set apart for roles of spiritual leadership.

Paul teaches that there are special leadership ministries: apostle, prophet, evangelist, pastor and teacher (Ephesians 4:11), but these are not the only ones who have a ministry in the church, since God's purpose is to equip "all" Christians for the work of ministry (v. 12). The verb "equip" refers to providing education and training for each member of the Body of Christ in order that they might serve God and their neighbors, according to the gifts received from the Holy Spirit.

# What is Vocation?

### There is only one vocation in the life of a Christian.



Vocation is the inclination placed in the heart of Christians by the Holy Spirit for a profession or job where they can invest their lives in serving God and their neighbor.

In the early centuries of Church history, vocation was understood as the inclination to the work of ministry or a religious calling. Afterwards the term was secularized, in other words, it was applied to other non-religious professions and trades, such as, the vocation of a teacher, doctor, mason, and so on. Over time a division arose between a "secular" and a "religious" vocation. And so, a Christian could have a job to make a living (secular vocation) and, at the same time, have a ministry in the church where he or she served God. This leads to a division between the two vocations, and permanent tensions as to which should receive more energy, time, and skills. When every believer serves according to his or her gifts, it prevents other members from being overloaded with tasks and feeling exhausted.

When believers use their gifts, there is more joy in the congregation and many more ministries of service to the community.

# Lesson 1 - Discovering my Spiritual Gifts

Spiritual gifts are not given to satisfy our own needs, but to meet the needs of others.

Given this confusion, we must return to the Biblical meaning of the term. Everyone has a vocation, that is a purpose or mission for which God gave them life. This vocation is performed in everything a person does, whether in church, at work, at school, or with their family, etc. Christians never cease to serve God. In the Bible, life, service, and worship go together and are inseparable.

So a person can work as a baker, and because he has the gift of service, he could be a steward in the local church. When he is kneading bread to feed the people, he is not just doing it for a paycheck, but as a service to his Lord, sharing not only bread, but also the bread of life which is Christ Jesus. In this way, any occupation or profession becomes, for the Christian, a ministry in a place where we fulfill our vocation.

# How and When Do You Receive a Spiritual Gift?

### The gifts are received at the time of being born again.



Spiritual gifts are given to new believers at the time they receive new life in Christ, at their conversion. It is then that we are born into the family of God and the Holy Spirit comes to dwell in our lives teaching us and guiding us in the process of growing into the image of Christ. In this first "baptism" of the Spirit, gifts are given in order to serve God and others. As he or she grows, the believer learns to identify his or her vocation in Christ, the ministry for which life has been given by the Father.

In the church in Corinth there were many relationship problems between brothers and sisters in the faith. This was because they still lived governed by their own selfish desires and had not experienced the fullness of the Holy Spirit. This church is praised by the apostle for the wealth of gifts they had, but he warned them about the danger of implementing the gifts without perfect love. Instead of edifying the church, the Corinthians' gifts were destroying it.

No matter how many gifts we have, we must seek this second work of grace, the fullness of the Spirit, in order to use them in a right attitude of helpful love.

# **How Many Gifts Are There?**

There are as many gifts as there are needs in the church and community.



In the New Testament there are several lists of gifts:

- 1 Corinthians 12:8-10
- 1 Corinthians 12:28-30 - Ephesians 4:11
- 1 Corinthians 13
- 1 Peter 5:1

- Romans 12

Do not confuse gifts with talents. Talents are natural abilities given at birth. In some cases, these abilities are transformed into gifts by the Holy Spirit.

Spiritual gifts should not be confused with the fruit of the Spirit. Gifts enable us to "do" something, while the fruit of the Spirit imparts the qualities of the character of Christ: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Galatians 5:22).

There are other gifts listed in 1 Timothy 3:11, 5:9, 6:12 and 2 Timothy 2:22.

The gifts mentioned in these passages are the following: apostle, prophet, teacher, miracles, healing, tongues, interpretation, knowledge, faith, discernment of spirits, insight, wisdom, support, administration, martyrdom, giving, mercy, service, leadership, ministry with women, with widows, and others. Looking at the list of gifts that are mentioned in the New Testament, we can draw the following conclusions.

- 1. There are gifts that appear together such as being an elder, bishop, pastor, and teacher (Ephesians 4:11, 1 Timothy 5:17). This indicates that there are gifts that come together because they are required to perform certain ministerial roles. For example, a pastor must have the gift of teaching since one of his responsibilities is to edify believers in the Word.
- 2. The gifts are distributed to all Christians, not just to pastors and leaders. All who have received new life in Christ have at least one gift (1 Corinthians 7:7, Ephesians 4:7, 1 Peter 4:10 and Romans 12:3).
- 3. Ministry, which means service to God and others, is for everyone, not just for those with professional theological education.
- 4. Ministries involve working as a team. It requires a variety of gifts to lead local congregations, to open missionary fields, for theological education, for youth ministry, etc.
- 5. There is great diversity of gifts and ministries. This means that God is creative and wise in giving gifts to church members so that they may serve to meet the needs of their church and community.

In the activities section, there is a test included to help you to identify your gifts.

# WHAT DID WE LEARN?

The spiritual gifts are abilities that the Holy Spirit distributes to members of the church to serve in His work. All Christians have the responsibility to discover their gifts, receive teaching and training from spiritual leaders, and give their lives serving their calling and vocation in Christ. Do not confuse a spiritual gift with ministerial function or position. For example, the gift of teaching is required for teachers; the gift of hospitality for hosts and hostesses; the gift of leadership, for coordinators of ministries.

A minister is one who serves God and people. Jesus taught that a servant attitude is needed to serve (Matthew 20:26-28).

# Introduction

How would a football team perform without a coach? Would a boat arrive at its destination with no one at the helm? How could an orchestra play in harmony without a conductor? Functions like these are those that God has delegated to the pastors, administrators, and leaders. Their ministries are essential for guiding the church in the accomplishment of its mission in this world (Ephesians 4:11).

# The Gift of Pastoring

### In this section we will learn about the gift of pastoring.



Pastor is the translation of the Greek word "poimen" which means the one who cares for and feeds the flock, and it is applied to someone who pastors a church (Ephesians 4:11). The pastor is a minister, called by God and the people, to run a local church.

There are also others who have the gift of serving as pastors of a group of Christians for a certain time period. In other words, they have received a special ability from God to care for other believers and guide them in their spiritual growth. Here are some examples: a cell group leader, a discipler, a children's pastor, a youth pastor, a women's or men's ministries leader and others.

### **Pastoral Responsibilities**

The call to ministry as a pastor who leads a local church is distinguished by the passion to build, equip, and guide Christians in their spiritual growth and in the life of Christian service (Acts 18:24-26, Galatians 1:6-12, 2 Timothy 4:1-2). We can compare the pastor's ministry in leadership with the work of a sport's coach or the conductor of an orchestra. Their job is not to do all the work of the ministry, but to train believers so that they can serve. According to the New Testament, the quality of a pastor's work is measured by the quality of the ministries developed by the members of his or her church. It is for this function of leading the congregation that pastors also need the gifts of administration and leadership. A pastor has the following responsibilities:

- Preaching and teaching the Word of God (1 Timothy 5:17, Titus 1:9).
- Directing the ministry of the church so that it can grow in all dimensions (John 10:3-4, 1 Peter 2:25 and 5:3).
- Restoring, correcting, encouraging, and consoling (Ezekiel 34:10).
- Protecting, looking after, serving, watching over (John 10:10-15).
- Improving and equipping (Ephesians 4:11-12).

### John Wesley

John Wesley was born on June 17, 1703 in the home of an Anglican pastor in Epworth, England. In 1728, at age 23, he was ordained as an Anglican priest and two years later he received his Master of Arts. While at the University of Oxford, he presided over the "the Saint's Club" but in spite of this he did not have personal assurance that his sins had been forgiven. The faith and testimony of the Moravians impressed Wesley. On May 24, 1738, after attending a Moravian prayer meeting, he had a special experience: ".... I received the assurance that my sins had been forgiven."

Soon after, he realized that the experience he had received was heart sanctity and that this was different from and came after his conversion. The work of sanctification or Christian perfection became the key theme of his sermons and writings. God used his ministry to bring revival throughout England. John Wesley was the founder of the Methodist Church and the one who developed Wesleyan-Holiness theology.

During the 40 years of his ministry, he rode on horseback covering about 8,300 km. a year. He used this time to read and prepare sermons because sometimes he preached up to eight times a day. He was a man of great discipline; during his life, he wrote 40,000 sermons and 3,000 books and pamphlets on various topics such as theology, science, logic, medicine and music.

Burnis Bushong says that Wesley preached his last sermon at the age of 87, an event at which his friends had to help him stand in the pulpit. On March 2, 1791, he entered the presence of God. Before his death he said, "The best thing is that God is with us."

# The Gift of Administration

### In the next section we will study the gift of administration.

The gift of administration is the ability to organize well, develop plans and objectives for the short, medium and long term, and coordinate and direct church activities. Those with this gift have the desire and ability

to set goals according to the vision they have received from God; they communicate those goals to other people and motivate and lead them to achieve the objectives by designing, organizing and overseeing the process (1 Corinthians 12:28). Good leaders need administrators.

The task of administration is not only about the financial issues of the church, but also the aspects of institutional management, in coordination with the pastor and church leaders.

# The Administrator's Responsibilities

The word "administration" comes from the Greek "kuberneseis" which means "one who pilots a ship," which refers to the person at the helm of a boat who helps it to reach its destination without problems. It can also be translated as "governor" or "the one who presides" and in this sense it is closely related to the gift of leadership. In the Bible there are two qualities required of those who serve as administrators:

- Faithfulness 1 Corinthians 4:2, Luke 16:10-12
- Diligence Luke 14:28

# Miguel Ángel Mejía Flores

Miguel Angel Mejia Flores was born on September 28, 1926 in El Salvador. In his youth he studied for just two years at high school, but served as an administrator in a private enterprise. He married Celia Sara Perez in 1949 and has been a member of the Church of the Nazarene since 1966. Miguel served as a Sunday School teacher, a leader on the local church board and on the district advisory board.

Parallel to his life in the church, he became the sales manager in the company where he worked, where he was known for his diligence and success in his work and for the enthusiasm with which he evangelized employees at the office for 23 years.

From 1974 to 1999, he was the administrator of the Nazarene Seminary of the Americas (SENDAS) in Costa Rica, (1974-1987 and 1992-1999). After, he became the administrator of the Church of the Nazarene Regional Office for the MAC Region (1987 - 1992).

During his service he made significant achievements, including the expansion and construction of new infrastructure for SENDAS and his work as music teacher and director of the seminary student's choir. His impeccable testimony is expressed by his own words: "Being a faithful Christian is the root of great triumph; surrender to the Lord and expect great things."

# The Gift of Leadership

# In this section, we will study the gift of leadership.

The word leadership is translated from the Greek verb "proistemi" which means: to preside, lead and direct. These people motivate, inspire and organize others with spiritual authority for ministerial work (Romans 12:8, 1 Thessalonians 5:12). The style of spiritual leadership is in many ways opposed to the world, as the Christian leader must have a servant's attitude like Jesus (Matthew 20:27).

Most people have the potential to become leaders, even if they are unaware of it. This means that you have skills, abilities, qualities, and hidden talents that can be developed with training and practice. Spiritual leadership is a gift and a calling that has to do with the direction of the church in its mission.

# **Qualities of Spiritual Leader**

The leader is the one who sets the pace in the church. When the leader does not have a plan to achieve his vision, he is just a dreamer. That's why the spiritual gift of leadership is accompanied by the gift of administration (Exodus 18:13-27). A good spiritual leader is distinguished by the following attributes:

- Vision. The leader has worthy goals that are hard to reach and require long-term investment of time and resources.
- A practical plan with medium-term goals.
- Willpower or healthy ambition to put the plan into action.
- The main fruit of his or her ministry is to develop leaders (2 Timothy 2:2, Ephesians 4:11-12).

# Bruno and Liliana Radziszewski

Dr. Bruno Radziszewski (1946-2005) stood out as a pastor and leader of the Church of the Nazarene in the SAM Region, with his wife, Liliana, whom he married in 1986.

Both served as Evangelism Coordinators in Paraguay. Between 1988 and 1994, they served as Directors of Evangelism in Brazil, the Southern Cone and Ecuador. They also served as Area Directors for the Southern Cone.

In 1994, he was appointed Regional Director for South America, which included a move to Ecuador. The following year, for reasons of safety, the Regional Office was moved to Argentina. There, he served in the same position until June 21, 2005, when the Lord decided to take Bruno into His presence after a long convalescence from heart problems.

### Three styles or types of leaders by Roger L. Smalling:

- "Pioneers" are visionaries who open new fields of mission and are generally bad administrators.
- "Managers" are administrators who follow the pioneering leader and transmit their vision. They are able to find and organize resources to achieve the vision in an orderly and progressive fashion. "Caretakers" are the maintainers. They ensure the spiritual development of the people; they keep people happy and satisfied. But due to their lack of vision and goals, they do not see much growth.

During all those years, Bruno's wife Liliana served beside him as his assistant and administrator at each function. Currently, Liliana lives in Pilar, Buenos Aires, with their daughters. She continues to serve full-time as a missionary of the Church of the Nazarene, as the legal representative of the Church in Argentina, as Regional Coordinator of Nazarene Missions International, and as Administrative Manager of the Regional Office (Mujer Valiosa TV: 2008).

# The Gift of Wisdom

### In this section we will study the gift of wisdom.



The gift of wisdom is characterized by the ability to discern the practical application of God's truths to special situations (1 Corinthians 12:8). In the Word, the source of all wisdom is God (Romans 11:33; 1 Corinthians 1:21) and His wisdom has been revealed to us in Christ (1 Corinthians 1:30) and through the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 2:7-10).

The gift of wisdom is closely related to the ministries of teaching and preaching, since it includes the special ability to apply knowledge in practical and particular situations that require solutions (1 Kings 3:5-28).

# Responsibility of the Person with the Gift of Wisdom:

- Helping others to resolve difficult issues through counseling.
- Warning others against taking wrong courses of action (for example, in strategy or theology).
- Collaborating with leaders to develop plans and work projects.
- Working with teams to interpret and apply the Word to situations today.
- Providing guidance on the development of the church.
- Giving guidance concerning the best ways to utilize human resources and materials of the church.

# Phineas F. Bresee

Phineas Franklin Bresee was born in Franklin (New York) in 1838 to a Christian family. He became a Christian at the age of 16 and from his youth had clarity about his call to pastoral ministry. At 28, he was filled with the Holy Spirit. After pastoring several Methodist churches in Iowa and California, many leaders appreciated this young man's many gifts, most notably the gift of wisdom. Bresee had a knack for organizing the work of the church so that it grew not only in number but also in finances.

By then he was named pastor in the Methodist University "Matthew Simpson" (Iowa) which was having serious economic problems. Bresee designed a plan to save the university from financial ruin and finally

Scriptures pertaining to the gift of wisdom 1 Kings 3:9 and 16-28 1 Corinthians 2:7-10; 4:1;12:8 Ephesians 3:3-6 succeeded in doing so after much effort and sacrifice. His gift of wisdom was linked to his passion for the poor which led him to become involved in the social problems of the community.

At age 45, he moved to be a pastor in California where he found many challenges. The population surrounding the church in Los Angeles was made up of immigrants from many different cultures. Bresee took advantage of these circumstances and the church grew rapidly.

Bresee also had a special wisdom for preaching and teaching holiness. From 1890, Bresee made the doctrine of holiness the ultimate goal of all his preaching, so he led holiness revival campaigns from California to Illinois. Bresee faced a lot of opposition because of his emphasis on holiness and his work with poor immigrants.

After several years and going through various ministerial functions in the Methodist Church, finally at the age of 58, Bresee and his friend Widney, decided to start a new holiness denomination with the congregation of Peniel Mission. Bresee and Widney were the first leaders of the Church of the Nazarene. The church grew from 300 to 1500 people in eight years with a number of sister churches (including a congregation of Mexican and Japanese immigrant workers) in different places in California as well as out of the state.

Bresee continued as pastor, university president, and as General Superintendent of the Church of the Nazarene until his death in 1915, at the age of 77. The gift of wisdom that the Holy Spirit gave Bresee, together with gifts for pastoring, leading, teaching, administrating and living compassionately, among others, led him to be the Lord's instrument in the founding of the Church of the Nazarene which today has become the largest holiness denomination around the world.

The gifts of pastoral service, administration, leadership, and wisdom are essential to enable the church to function well. Good leaders and pastors surround themselves with good administrators and Christians with the gift of wisdom so that together they can lead the church to grow in a healthy way.

The gifts of teaching and knowledge are complementary.

# Introduction

Have you ever wondered how teaching, wisdom, knowledge and prophecy are related? Do you think only "scholars" can be teachers in the church? Do you think that prophets speak for God? In this lesson we will study these gifts to answer these questions.

# **The Gift of Teaching**

### In this section we will study about the gift of teaching.



The gift of teaching ("didasko" in the Greek language) in the Bible does not only refer to transmitting information but rather to the communication of spiritual truths that people need to grow into the image of Christ. The gift of teaching is also the special ability to study the Word of God in order to build up the church. Since all Christians are disciples that never stop growing into Christlikeness, the church needs brothers and sisters with the gift of teaching. In the Bible this gift appears joined together grammatically with the pastor who leads a local congregation. But not only pastors receive this gift.

### **Responsibilities of Teachers**

- In depth study of Scripture.
- Understanding the questions and needs of their students.
- Putting the profound truths into words that everyone can understand.
- Knowing and using teaching methods to transfer knowledge in an interesting, varied and entertaining way.
- Being a living example of the life of holiness (Titus 1:9).

### Jesus of Nazareth

Jesus is the best example of the gift of teaching. He shows us that a teacher's words reach only as far as the example of the holy life demonstrated

His life example gave Him authority to teach and it inspired confidence in His audience, two very important aspects for education so that the teaching does not fall on deaf ears.

The Lord believed that teaching was a powerful tool to transform lives and shape ideals, attitudes and behavior. Jesus understood human nature (John 2:25) and it was this knowledge that enabled Him to identify the needs of his listeners. Jesus had an intimate and personal knowledge of the heavenly Father and of the Scriptures. He knew that teachers nurture students from their abundance, not from their emptiness.

Jesus taught individuals, groups and crowds. He taught people of different races, ages, sexes, religions, occupations and social statuses. In each case, He used a variety of teaching methods and used available resources. He used all the methodologies that are used today: questions, stories, conversations, discussions, plays, objects, projects and demonstrations. His method is still used today by good teachers: His introductions were direct, and His illustrations and applications were appropriate for the needs and questions of his listeners.

As J. M. Price said: "No one had better training for his work as a teacher than Jesus." Jesus was first and foremost the Master teacher; He never stopped teaching (Price).

# The Gift of Knowledge

### In this section we will define the gift of knowledge.

The gift of knowledge (from the Greek "ginosko") refers not to intellectual knowledge, but to the ability that comes from God to study, investigate, collect information, analyze data, learn and be able to rapidly put the information into practice so it can be shared to benefit the church. Knowledge is not opposed to faith; on the contrary, knowledge and faith are related and together provide a firm foundation. This gift is closely related to the gift of teaching, preaching and writing.

### Responsibilities of the person with the gift of knowledge

- Since this gift can lead to pride, it is important to stay humble.
- Prioritizing: focusing study and research on matters that are helpful for the progress and edification of the church.
- Striving to communicate the conclusions to the church in a clear and simple way.

### General indicators that one may have the gift of teaching:

He or she is committed to the truth, the relevance and the authority of the Bible.
He or she has the responsibility to study

and prepare for the task of teaching.

He or she emphasizes details that lead to a correct interpretation of the Scripture.
He or she has the ability to explain and apply Biblical truths that contribute to the growth of the Body of Christ.
He or she has the willingness and ability to support and teach the truth while facing opposition.

The gift of knowledge can be applied in several ways in ministry such as in writing books, researching an area of theology, ministerial practices or church growth, and studying the needs of the community where the church ministers to find trends.

# Confirmation questions for the gift of knowledge

• Do I like investigating a case to get to the bottom of the truth?

• Do I have the patience and dedication to study a problem to find the best answer?

If I am in a group of people trying to solve a problem am I one of the first to propose a plan to find the best solution?
Do I like that people come to me for answers?

Scriptures pertaining to the gift of knowledge 1 Corinthians 2:12-13 Ephesians 1:17-19

- Being careful to avoid belittling people who do not have the same level of knowledge.
- Leading professionals and scholars to know Jesus Christ as Savior, using their area of specialty as a tool.

# Martin Luther

Martin Luther was born in Eisleben, Germany in 1483 and died in Thuringia in 1546. Contrary to the wishes of his parents, Martin became an Augustinian monk in 1505 and began studying theology at the University of Wittenberg, where he received his doctorate in 1512.

As a professor, he began to question some practices of the Roman Catholic Church. After spending years researching the Bible, he defended the doctrines of the universal priesthood of believers and salvation by faith, which are both pillars of the Protestant Reformation. Luther's criticism reflected a fairly widespread climate of discontent because of the corruption into which the leaders of the Church had fallen. Luther's protest escalated until 1517 when he decided to make public his writings. He nailed his 95 Thesis to the door of Wittenberg Castle.

The priesthood of all believers implies the Christian's personal and direct relationship with God. This divided the church leaders, who declared themselves as the only mediators between God and the congregation and the only ones who could access and interpret the Bible for the people. Luther also defended the right of every believer to read the Bible freely. But for people to read the Bible, it needed to be translated from the original languages (Greek and Latin) to the languages of the people. Luther himself translated the Bible into German providing a version used by many people during the centuries. Martin Luther is remembered as one of the great reformers of the Christian Church (Woodbridge, 1998).

# **The Gift of Prophecy**

# In this section we will study the gift of prophecy.

22

The word prophet (in Greek "prophetes") at the time of the early church often meant teaching the Word of God. The task of the prophet was primarily to build, comfort and encourage the believers (4:8,11 and Acts 13). The prophet's words did not have equal authority with Scripture and if contradicted, the prophet was considered false and his message was rejected by the church (1 Thessalonians 5:9-21). As for the unbelievers, the prophet's message was meant to make them aware of their sin.

As for the resemblance to the prophetic ministry of the Old Testament, in 1 Corinthians 13:8-9 the apostle Paul explains that the ministry of prophecy, the direct revelation of God's mind, was completed in Christ. This is because in Christ, God revealed His will to all human beings and His will is accessible to us in His Word (see also 2 Peter 1:19).

In conclusion, we describe the gift of prophecy as a special ability from the Holy Spirit to communicate and reveal God's will in His Word to people. This is the role of preachers and teachers today.

# The Responsibilities of the Christian with the Gift of Prophecy

- Studying deeply the Word of God.
- Keeping informed about different aspects of today's world.
- Encouraging, strengthening and comforting the brethren (Acts 15:32, 1 Corinthians 14:3).
- Reflecting on contemporary events in light of the Word.
- Knowing and using public speaking methods.

# Charles H. Spurgeon

Charles H. Spurgeon was born in 1834 in Kelveden, England. His grandfather and father were pastors and coal miners. As a child, his mother had instilled in him a desire for the study of the Word.

As a teenager, he rebelled against God and it was not until he was 16 years old that he accepted Christ as Lord and Savior. His first ministries were teaching children, handing out tracts and visiting the poor. Early in the morning he studied the Bible and prayed. At night after attending school, he taught the Word. At age 16 he joined an organization of lay preachers and was soon dubbed the "boy preacher." He preached in chapels, outdoors, in villages and in homes.

At 18 years of age (1852), he became a pastor at Waterbeach, located near Cambridge. His chapel was an old barn. The first Sunday twelve people attended, but the church was growing, thanks to his hard work. The following year, to his surprise, he was invited to preach in the church of New Park Street, a leading Baptist church in London, whose membership was 232 people. They had gone months without a pastor. This church had lost members consistently, and the first Sunday he preached 80 people attended. The membership started to grow and they continued inviting him until, in 1854, he was asked to accept the position of pastor.

Every Sunday the church was completely full and the people who did not come in heard the preaching from the streets. The building was expanded again and again, but there was never enough space, so they rented other buildings. At age 23, he preached in the largest available auditorium holding 23,654 people. By the end of 1891, after 37 years of ministry, he had baptized 14,460 people and had a church membership of 5,311.

Spurgeon published one sermon per week beginning in 1855. He also founded a seminary for pastors and established the Stockwell Orphanage,

### The Gift of Prophecy

The ministry of the prophets was developed in Old Testament times. Their ministry consisted of the "proclamation of the divine purposes of salvation and glory to be available in the future through the coming of the Messiah." The apostle Peter says in 2 Peter 2:1 that in the early church, Christian teachers played a role in ministry similar to the ancient prophets. The difference is that the teachers based their principles on the written word and the prophet based their principles on the word that God personally spoke to them (Vine 2007).



# Confirmation questions for the gift of prophecy

• Do I have the discipline to study the Word?

• Do I like to learn about the social, political and economic realities, etc?

• Do I feel responsible for teaching Biblical principles so others can make right choices in everyday affairs?

- When I speak, do people pay attention?
- Do I like to analyse the preaching of others?


# Scriptures pertaining to the gift of discernment

1 Corinthians 12:10 2 Corinthians 11:14-15 Acts 8:26; 10:3; 12:7-10; 16:16-18; 27:23-24 2 Peter 2:1; 2 Corinthians 11:14-15 2 Thessalonians 2:9 Revelations 16:14 which housed 500 children, divided into family groups, living in married couples' homes.

Charles Spurgeon died on January 31, 1892 at 56 years of age after 40 years of ministry. He preached over 3,500 sermons (Jay, 1984).

# The Gift of Discernment

### In this section we will learn about the gift of discernment.



The gift of discernment is a supernatural ability that comes from God to distinguish between God given manifestations and those with human or diabolical origins.

The gift of discernment is very necessary for leaders in contexts where many voices are raised, all who pretend to speak for God. They confuse people and divert the truth. Satan, the enemy of the Church attempts to destroy the Church, divert it from holiness and its mission through deception (Acts 13:6-12). Sometimes Satan uses people who teach false doctrines (1 Timothy 4:1).

This gift is also required to free those who are afflicted, oppressed and tormented by Satan (Acts 16:16). Christians with the gift of discernment are those who pray for the demon possessed to be freed.

# Responsibilities of a Christian with the Gift of Discernment

- Living a holy life. This ministry is not for the faint of spirit or immature believers.
- Avoiding making hasty judgments: it is necessary to test the spirits (1 John 4:1).
- Using Biblical criteria to test the spirits (1 John 4:2,3; James 3:14-17; Corinthians 12:3).
- Avoiding extremes (for instance, seeing demons in all people with problems).
- Teaching people to take responsibility for their actions rather than blaming demons for the irresponsible behavior.
- Not making a show of ministry; protecting the reputation of the church and the people involved.
- Knowing how to evangelize and disciple a person who has been freed.
- Knowing what ways Satan uses in a particular context to enslave people.
- Praying and fasting is required with this ministry.

### Peter and Paul

Several of the apostles had the gift of discernment. Peter, for example, noted the hypocrisy of Ananias and Sapphira who lied to the church by stating they had brought as an offering all the money from the sale of a property. When Peter discovered this, they both dropped dead in front of the congregation (Acts 5:1-11).

On another occasion, Peter discovered Simon the magician's bad intentions, when he offered the apostles money in order to "buy" the power they had from the Holy Spirit to heal the sick (Acts 8:18-25).

Paul also had this gift, which he used to detect the malicious intentions of Elymas or Bar-Jesus, a Jewish magician and false prophet from Cyprus who gave counsel to the Proconsul (government official) of the island. The Proconsul showed interest but Elymas argued with Paul so much that it became difficult for the Proconsul to accept the gospel message (Acts 13:10). The Proconsul believed Paul's message after Paul rebuked the magician who then became blind. Another time when Paul was in Philippi, he met a girl who was being exploited by others who profited from a "divination spirit" that had possessed her. She ran after Paul and his companions for days shouting that they were servants of the Most High God. Finally Paul commanded the spirit in the name of Jesus Christ to leave her, and she was released. The men who exploited her reported the incident, and Paul and Silas were imprisoned until they were miraculously released (Acts 16:11-40).

### How can I know if I have the gift of discernment?

- I feel compassion for people who are slaves of evil.
- It's easier for me than others to tell when something is not from God.
- Sometimes I can recognize a spiritual phony (hypocrite).
- People ask me for advice to distinguish right from wrong.

These statements may be indications that you have the gift of discernment.

# What **D**ID We Learn?

The gifts of teaching, wisdom, knowledge and prophecy are fundamental to guiding Christians in their holistic growth.

Several of these gifts may come together and are complementary. For example, the gift of prophecy relates to the ability to skillfully preach the Word of God and apply it to everyday living.

# Lesson 3 - Teaching and Preaching Gifts




### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

1. Mention some of the qualities of a Christian teacher who has been a positive influence in your life.

In the other group, gather those that have gifts of prophecy and discernment. Their task is to write a list of tips or recommendations for Christian teachers. After three minutes, each group presents to the others their advice.



# EVANGELISM AND SPIRITUAL COUNSELING GIFTS

## Objectives

Define the gifts of evangelism, faith, miracles, healing, intercession and exhortation (spiritual counseling).
Identify the responsibilities that these gifts require.

Main Ideas

- The gift of exhortation is aimed at equipping spiritual counselors so that they can encourage, comfort and admonish others.

- The gifts of evangelism, faith, miracles, healing and intercession are essential to win others to Christ.

### Introduction

Evangelism, faith, intercessory prayer and miracles are gifts related to the ministry of winning others to Christ. Some of these gifts have to do with the skill and passion of sharing the message of salvation with others, while others relate to miraculous signs that lead many unbelievers to believe and give their lives to Jesus Christ. Also, we will study the gift of exhortation, which in today's church, is related to the ministry of spiritual counseling.

### The Gift of Evangelism

#### In this section we will study the gift of evangelism.



Although all the disciples of Jesus have the responsibility to share their testimony with others, some Christians receive a passion and ability from the Holy Spirit to lead others to reconciliation with God. This gift is distinguished by a sense of urgency to communicate the gospel to all the people that they can. For these people, once they have received some training, evangelizing and discipling others becomes as normal as breathing. It has been estimated that at least ten percent of committed Christians have this gift.

#### **Responsibilities of the Evangelist:**

- Allowing the Spirit to show you who to testify to (Acts 8:5-6, 26-40).
- Being open to talking to all kinds of people.
- Not feeling spiritually superior to other Christians.
- Learning to present the plan of salvation and leading others to conversion.
- Living life with a holiness testimony that others can emulate.
- Teaming up with pastors and church disciplers.

Scriptures pertaining to the gift of evangelism Acts 14:13-21 Romans 10:14-15 Ephesians 4:11 believe and give their live exhortation, which in too counseling.

### Confirmation questions for the gift of evangelism

Do I feel a great burden to pray (more than other Christians) for the lost?
Am I sad for individuals and families who suffer because of their sinful habits?
When someone accepts Christ as Savior, is it one of the happiest moments of my life?
Do I feel compelled at all times and everywhere to start conversation with strangers to bear witness to what Christ has done in me?
Do I like to present the

• Do I like to present the message of salvation in simple, creative and contemporary language?

- Training others who have the same gift.
- Praying for unbelievers, that the Spirit would prepare their hearts.

#### **Bill Bright**

Bill Bright (1921-2003) was born in Oklahoma, United States. He was a businessman until his conversion in 1944 at the First Presbyterian Church of Hollywood, California. Soon after, he began his Biblical studies. It was in Fuller Seminary that he felt a personal call from God to help fulfill the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19). From that time on, he began to evangelize with Campus Crusade for Christ which he led with his wife, Vonette. Currently this movement involves 27,000 full-time workers and more than 225,000 volunteers in 190 countries.

On one occasion, on a plane before the flight departure, he led to Christ the person who was sitting on his left. Then, during the flight, he evangelized the person in the seat to his right. Bill had a special gift for bringing people to give their lives to Jesus and accept Him as their Lord and Savior.

Bill received several doctorates and the Templeton Prize, which is awarded to individuals who have contributed to the advance of the gospel. He wrote over 100 books including the widespread method of evangelization, "Four Spiritual Laws," and in 1956 he produced the Jesus Film.

### **The Gift of Faith**

#### In this section we will study the gift of faith.

The gift of faith is the ability to place trust in Almighty God to meet real needs in miraculous ways with a firm assurance the needs will be met. It is not an irrational faith, but one that is based on His promises, in the knowledge of His love, and belief that as individuals and as a church we are serving according to His plan and according to His will (Matthew 17:20). Christians with the gift of faith have the ability to encourage others to trust and wait for divine provision in a given situation.

#### Responsibilities of a Christian with the gift of faith:

- Taking time to listen and encourage others.
- Praying for others in need.
- Encouraging church leaders as they pass through discouragement.
- Being careful not to confuse faith with personal dreams (this is especially important for those with the gift of leadership).
- Being aware that not everyone has this gift.

• Learning how to teach others to develop their faith.

#### Loida Morejon

Scriptures pertaining to the gift of miracles Mark 2:1-12 Acts 3:1-8; 14:8-10 James 5:4-16 Exodus 14:21-31 Acts 12 2 Kings 4:1-7 John 2:1-11 Luke 9:16-17 Romans 15:17-20 Loida Morejon is a Nazarene leader in the Caribbean. On one occasion, when her father Andres Morejon was the district superintendent, an event occurred where Loida showed this gift of faith. During the celebration of the district assembly, hundreds of Nazarene brothers and sisters all from the island had arrived at the seminary facilities. Loida was responsible for providing lunch to everyone.

When it was time for lunch, seeing that the crowd of people in line had exceeded all expectations, her worried father went to the kitchen and asked her, "My child, what are we going to do? It is evident that the food will not be enough for all." Looking at her father firmly, Loida said, "Dad, the same Jesus who multiplied the loaves and the fishes is here today, and he'll multiply this meal." Loida and her assistants served the food with love as the line moved along. One by one each person received a plate and even the cooks and leaders ate their fill. Loida testifies, "God multiplied the food that day, but when we finished serving the last dish, there was nothing left to scrape out of the pot!"

### The Gift of Miraculous Acts and Healing

In this section we will learn about the gifts of miraculous acts and healing.



#### Confirmation questions for the gifts of miracles and healings

• Do I feel compassion for the sick?

Do I have confidence in the supernatural power of God?
Do I feel comfortable visiting, comforting and praying for the sick?
Are there times that miracles and healings have occurred in response to my prayers?
Is one of the greatest joys of my life when someone is healed or a miracle occurs in response to my prayer?

Miracles are events in which God intervenes in times of crisis where our resources are depleted. A miracle is an act that cannot be generally explained by natural laws, but that happens at the right time and in response to the prayer of Christians. Miracles happen to testify to the love and care that God has for humans. The gift of healing is the desire and ability to minister health to people's lives whether spiritual, emotional or physical. Healing sometimes happens in an instant, in other times gradually and often as a result of care and treatment provided to the patient.

### Responsibilities of the Christian with the gift of miraculous acts and healing:

- Engaging in worship with emphasis on prayer for the sick.
- Engaging in prayer vigils for the needs of the congregation or community.
- Keeping a notebook with people's prayer needs.
- Visiting, encouraging, and praying for the sick at their homes or in hospitals.
- In every case, giving the glory to God for the miracle and healing.

• Teaching others about this ministry.

#### Rosalino Santiago Pineda

A few years ago, Rosalino Santiago Pineda was a lay pastor in the Church of the Nazarene in Juchitan, Oaxaca. One of his daughters, Noemi, tells the following story:

Rosalino is a person of faith who prays for the sick and God heals them. His local church has grown partly due to the testimonies of healings. He has had a beautiful influence of faith on the lives of his grandchildren. They have learned to trust God for all their ailments, seeing the example of their grandfather. On countless occasions, when they were sick as children, they would pray with faith for healing and also they would pray when their pets were sick.

On one occasion, a car accidentally hit the children's dog named Lupo. When the children returned from school, they saw him injured and unable to walk. They cried and were very sad. Then, without saying a word, they knelt on the ground and prayed with great faith for their pet. To the surprise of the family and the adults present, their dog recovered and began to walk. It was an incredible healing.

This is a simple example of how children learn to pray with faith to God for healing. These children practice it whenever they have an opportunity to pray for others and healing happens.

### The Gift of Intercessory Prayer

In this section we will study about passionate prayer for the needs of others.

While praying for others is the responsibility of all Christians, some believers have the gift of intercession, which is evident by the desire and discipline to devote time to pray for the needs of others, beyond what Christians usually do.

### Responsibilities of an intercessor:

- Identifying the person to pray for and being immersed in their needs and sufferings (2 Corinthians 5:21).
- Intercession for others involves pleading, like a lawyer who pleads for the lives of others (Hebrews 7:25).
- Feeling deeply the pain of the Lord for these suffering people.
- Giving up pleasures and physical comforts to make time for prayer and fasting.
- Praying for the unsaved with a list of names.

Confirmation questions for the gift of intercessory prayer

Scriptures pertaining to the gift of healing

Mark 1:29-31

Do I feel motivated to find time alone to pray for others?
Is it natural for me to put the needs of others before my own when I pray?

• Do I want to identify with those who suffer, depriving myself from some comfort for a time, so I can better pray for them?

- Reaching out to those who are suffering in the church and community.
- Finding out about the needs of missionaries around the world.

#### **Rees Howells**

Rees Howells was born in Wales in 1879 and lived during the Second World War. Rees started praying intensely for months for a single person, until he received God's reply. Then he began to intercede for the nations of the world and for missionaries.

Howells learned to be guided by the voice of the Holy Spirit who showed him who he should pray for. Rees thought it was essential that while he prayed he should identify himself with that person. Once he spent four months praying for underprivileged children in India and did not eat bread, tea, or sugar. He only ate a plate of stew every two days and slept on the floor. He prayed all day starting at five o'clock in the morning. On another occasion he isolated himself for ten months and prayed about starting a seminary in Swansea, South Wales. He prayed from six in the morning until five in the afternoon and ate once a day.

Howells said about this ministry: "God is looking for intercessors, but He rarely finds them. This expression of sorrow can be seen in the exclamation made by Isaiah 59:16 and Ezekiel 22:30... Perhaps some believers describe intercession as a form of intense prayer. And it is. There is a lot of emphasis placed on the word 'intense' because there are three elements of intercession that are not in the ordinary prayer: identification, agony and authority" (Boyer, 1983).

### The Gift of Exhortation or Spiritual Counseling

#### In this section we will study the gift of exhortation.



The word that is translated from the Greek for exhortation is parakaleo, which means to beg, insist, encourage, inspire courage, ask, comfort, console. The gift of exhortation is the ability the Holy Spirit gives to some of His children to encourage, admonish, give advice, and comfort others or persuade people to do or not to do something.

### Responsibilities of people with the gift of exhortation:

- Encouraging those who are spiritually weak (Hebrews 3:13).
- Visiting and encouraging those who are absent from church services or activities (Hebrews 10:24-25).
- Encouraging those who doubt their commitment to Christ (1 Thessalonians 2:11-12).

Scriptures pertaining to the gift of intercessory prayer Daniel 6:11-12; 9:1-4 Luke 11:1-13 Colossians 4:12-13 1 Timothy 2: 1-4 James 5:15-18 Hebrews 8:1

- Comforting those who are sad and admonishing with love and gentleness.
- Advising about how to deal with difficult family problems or interpersonal relationship problems in the church.
- Providing guidance based on Biblical principles.
- Always trusting in the Holy Spirit's guidance throughout the process.

#### James Clayton Dobson

Dr. James C. Dobson was born in Louisiana, USA in 1936 and is a member of the Church of the Nazarene. From an early age "Jim" joined his parents in their journey throughout the country preaching the gospel. He gave his life to Jesus at 3 years of age after his father preached. He got married in 1960 and has two children, Danae and Ryan.

From a young age he knew that his calling and passion were to help families to live by Biblical principles, so he decided to become a Christian counselor. He studied psychology at Point Loma Nazarene University, and obtained a Ph.D. in Child Development at the University of Southern California in 1967. In 1977 he founded the organization Focus on the Family. This ministry has a radio program that airs in over a dozen languages, in more than 7,000 radio stations, reaching 220 million people in a total of 164 countries.

Dobson is a writer and lecturer. He has worked on many government committees speaking for the family, "traditional" marriage (male-female) values, the rights of women, motherhood and children, among others. He has received numerous awards and recognitions. The Christianity Today magazine recently named him "America's most influential evangelical leader."

### Confirmation questions for the gift of exhortation

• Have I been thanked for my words of encouragement and motivation?

• Do I find it natural to encourage and motivate others?

• Do people seek me out to

tell me of their problems? • Do I feel sorrow for the misery of my brothers and sisters and want to do something about it?

• Am I unafraid to confront someone when it is necessary?

• Do I have the ability to intercede when there is conflict between two or more people?

### WHAT DID WE LEARN?

In this lesson we studied the importance of the gifts of evangelism, faith, miracles, healing, intercessory prayer and exhortation.

These gifts are essential if the church is to make an impact in the world and lead sinners to salvation. The gift of exhortation is essential for those that serve as spiritual advisors.

### Activities



### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

In the following activity, all students can work together to solve a problem that could occur in a local church.

#### 1. The Situation:

Our church is planning to make an impact in the community through various evangelistic activities during Holy Week (the week before Easter Sunday). People with the gifts and ministries of evangelism, faith, miracles, healing, intercessory prayer and encouragement need to be organized in groups, so as to cover all the areas required for responsible evangelism, spiritual care and the incorporation of new believers in discipleship groups.

2. The design for this plan:

a) The plan must include all the gifts studied in this lesson.

b) For 5 minutes, the whole class will work to identify three to five general goals for these evangelistic activities. For example:

- 1. Visit 100 households in the community, making information cards with the information of those living in each house including their prayer requests.
- 2. Pray for 20 days for these people and their needs.
- 3. Visit each family again after 20 days to see how they are doing, to see if there has been a response to the prayer need, and to invite them to a special activity.
- 4. After the activity, follow up with the new disciples.
- 5. Follow up with others who have expressed interest.

c) For the next 5 minutes, the students are divided into work groups according to their gifts. Each group will make a list of their responsibilities and the tasks they will need to do to achieve these objectives.

*d)* Finally, each group will report on what they have accomplished with the rest of the class. Each group will choose a presenter who will have 1 minute to speak.



# GIFTS OF COMPASSION AND SERVICE

## Objectives

Define the gifts of compassion, help, hospitality, service and generosity.
Identify the responsibilities that these gifts involve.

Main Ideas

The gifts of compassion and service help the church fulfill its social responsibility.
 These gifts were essential in the ministry of Jesus and the Early Church.
 Those with these gifts serve others according to their needs.

### Introduction

Throughout the Bible, a Christian's responsibility to care for the suffering, for foreigners and the needy is obvious. Service to others as volunteers is one of the qualities of a healthy church that reflects the compassion of their Lord to the world. However, as discussed in this lesson, God places in the heart of some of His children a unique passion for helping those who are in need by giving gifts of compassion, service, support, hospitality and generosity.

### The Gift of Compassion

### In this section we will study the gift of compassion.



The gift of compassion can be seen in the desire and sensitivity to assist others, especially those who are facing crises or difficulties that they cannot resolve by themselves. People with this gift are actively involved in comforting, consoling and helping these people to regain their joy (Matthew 15:32, 18:33).

### Responsibilities of the person with the gift of compassion:

- Responding to perceived needs that believers and the community may have.
- Participating in work teams to assist in disasters or natural catastrophes.
- Giving to the Church of the Nazarene's fund for hunger relief and disaster relief in the world.
- Being actively involved in Nazarene Compassionate Ministries.
- Encouraging others to contribute their time, money and talents in compassionate projects in the local church.
- Teaching people in the church and the community how to improve hygiene, nutrition, safety, etc.

Scriptures pertaining to the gift of compassion Matthew 25:37-40 Luke 10:25-37 Acts 9:36-42 Romans 12:4-8 James 1:27, 2:14-17 • Identifying community needs and organizing a neighborhood work plan to meet them.

### Judy Marisol de Arenas

Judy Marisol de Arenas was born in 1965 in Panama and became a Christian as a teenager. While she was studying to be a pastor at the Nazarene Seminary of the Americas in Costa Rica, she received the vision from God of planting a church in the poorest place in Panama as part of her ministerial practice.

So in 2002, she began a mission in "El Vertedero" (the trash dump), located on the outskirts of the city of Chorrera. Large trucks arrive here to unload Panama City's garbage. It is not pleasant to breathe the air there, and there are many flies, rats, and vultures all around.

Marisol found families there living off what they could find in the mountains of waste: it is from this trash that they would find their food for the day. They lived in precarious homes built with materials from the dump, and tried to make a living by selling bits and pieces of rubbish. Their life was not easy, and they hardly had enough to eat each day. The children had no education and everyone was always exposed to diseases.

Marisol, with the help of other members of the church, took advantage of various resources to help and evangelize these families. The Evangecube, the Jesus Film, food supplies, lectures on nutrition and health, among others resources were used. Soon there were about 70 people attending church activities.

In a few years Marisol petitioned the government to help to build new homes and relocate these families to Playa Chiquita. Now they have a school for their children, clean water, electricity and also a Nazarene Church called "Luz de Esperanza" (Light of Hope) where 100 people gather to worship God.

### **Gifts of Service and Support**

### In this section we will learn about the gifts of service and support.

The gifts of service and support are similar. One focuses on people's needs, either of people or institutions, and the other supports leaders that serve in any ministry. They are distinguished by the desire and ability to identify the needs around them and meet them.

People with these gifts have a permanent attitude of service and wish to invest their time and talents in solving needs in the church and community. In all ministries, people with these gifts are needed. These people receive from God a special ability to use the available resources and provide a solution for the needs (Acts 6:1).

Examples of service ministries are varied: working with the elderly, orphans, widows, single mothers, providing child care for working mothers, among others.

Examples of the gift of support include these: cooking, transporting, hospitality, cleaning, maintenance, hosting, among others.

### Responsibility of Christians with the gift of service and support:

- Serving with love without complaining about the service provided.
- Being careful not to use service to earn admiration from others.
- Having a balance between service and devotional time (Luke 10:38-42).
- Avoiding falling into exhausting and pointless activism.
- Serving others without neglecting the needs of the family.
- Serving others as one would serve Jesus.

### Mother Theresa of Calcutta (1910-1997)

Agnes Gonscha Boyaxhiu, better known as Mother Theresa, was born in Albania, Yugoslavia in 1910. Missionaries told Agnes stories of the unhappiness of the people in India, and that moved her heart. At age 12 she knew she wanted to be a missionary in India.

At 18 years of age, she studied English and traveled to India as a missionary. There she worked in a Roman Catholic convent school where there were English and Indian children from wealthy families. Agnes devoted time to learning two local languages: Bengali and Hindi. While doing all of this, she taught poor children on the streets. At age 38, she left the convent where she had served for twenty years to assist the poor on the streets of the city of Calcutta, without any official support or money from her church.

After taking a short course of medicine in Patna, she started to wear a white sari (traditional dress of Indian women) with blue borders, rented a hut in a slum in Calcutta and began to teach poor children. She also bathed the children and sick people, and she shared food with them. Her Indian neighbors, seeing her efforts, gave her some furniture, medicines and school supplies. After two months, 56 children were already attending her school.

But she went further. She went into the poorest part of town, Tijalba, whose streets were full of lepers, abandoned by their families. She then began her fight to create a place where the terminally ill could die in peace. In the meanwhile, many volunteers joined her in her task. Finally, she got two large warehouses located near the temple of the goddess Kali, and she named it "The House of the Dying." There she served people of all religions. Soon the place was filled with children and the sick, so that space and resources became scarce. Mother Theresa sought help from everyone she could so as to continue to assist these people in their need.

Thanks to her example and influence, many centers have been founded in many cities of the world for AIDS patients and for people with other diseases. Mother Theresa received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1979. She died of a heart attack at 87 years of age. She said: "Every act of love, carried out with all the heart, always manages to bring people to God" (Pellini, Claudio 17/12/2009).

### The Gift of Hospitality

In this section we will learn what is included in the gift of hospitality.



The gift of hospitality is the ability to receive people, house them and make them feel welcome and comfortable, especially those with needs. People with the gift of hospitality find it easy to make friends, and through their testimony, they bring people to Christ. This is an indispensable gift for those who host meetings in their homes. Hospitality should be extended to friends (Proverbs 27:10), other Christians (Galatians 6:10) as well as non-Christian strangers (Leviticus 19:33-34).

### Responsibility of people with the gift of hospitality:

- Opening homes to provide shelter and food to people in need.
- Decorating and organizing the surroundings in a way that makes guests feel at home.
- Inviting others to have a meal or a cup of coffee.
- When it is not possible to invite people home, contributing financially to provide housing for those in need.
- Not investing so much in serving others that one's own family is neglected.
- Not confusing Christian hospitality with just being friendly and social.

### Frank and Barbara Eby

Missionaries Frank and Barbara Eby arrived in Vietnam as volunteers to teach English in the outskirts of Ho Chi Minch on June 12, 1994. However, their love for the people of Northeast Asia was born many years earlier working for years with thousands of Asian refugees, helping them to settle in the United States while they were members of the First Church of the Nazarene in Tampa, Florida.

While they worked with these Vietnamese families, they opened the doors of their home to receive them and make them feel comfortable. They shared with the immigrants not only their home, but also their money, their time and talents. In addition, Frank was able to start a Nazarene church with these immigrants.

Frank and Barbara sold their house and left everything behind, including their country of origin and their family and friends to make disciples in Vietnam.

I consider it a privilege and not a duty to give money for the work of the church.

When I see someone in need, I try to provide for the need.
When I give my tithe, I give more than the minimum and always try to give offerings for special needs. This passion was awakened in the heart of their daughter, Beverly Wood. She describes the generosity of her parents this way: "My parents would never be successful people in the eyes of the world because they see life through the eyes of Christ and do all they can to heal the wounded around them. Their trophies will never be the material things but the eternal." (Adapted from The Herald of Holiness, Vol. 5, No. 139, January-February, 1996).

### The Gift of Generosity

#### In this section we will learn about the gift of giving generously.



The gift of giving can be seen in the desire and ability to contribute with material goods for the needs of others or the work of the Lord. The gift of generosity can be observed in the special disposition to give not only material goods, but also time, talents, and even life itself to fulfill God's will, without expecting anything in return.

Generosity is a practice that has gradually been declining among Christians. In today's world, nobody wants to give something without making a personal profit. When someone gives something for nothing, we are inclined to think that there is an ulterior motive behind it. We have become used to not expecting someone to give us anything out of simple generosity, a desire to help or compassion. Christians with the gift of generosity should help the people of God to make a difference.

### Responsibilities of Christians with the gift of generosity

- Sharing generously your time, knowledge and material goods with others (Acts 4:32-37).
- Seeking opportunities to help without expecting anything in return.
- Organizing and motivating others to give generous gifts for missionary work, for projects of the local church, pastoral family, etc.
- Helping everyone equally, without preference.
- Giving generously, but wisely.

### Nina Griggs Gunter

Nina Griggs Gunter was born on September 4, 1937, in Bennettsville, South Carolina. She was called to the ministry of preaching at age 14. When she told her pastor about this, he asked her to preach in the next service. Since then she has never stopped preaching. She married Dwight Moody Gunter in 1956 with whom she has two children.

Nina was the first woman to receive an honorary Doctorate of Divinity from Trevecca Nazarene University in recognition of her creative and innovative ministry. In 2005, she was honored by the Nazarene Bible College as "Preacher of the Year." In February 2009, Trevecca awarded her the first Leadership Award in recognition of an exceptional Christian woman who is modeling service and leadership.

As an ordained minister, Nina served as a co-pastor alongside her husband and then as an administrator in the District Office when Dwight served as superintendent (1976-1986). She worked in the ministry of evangelization and as interim pastor of several congregations.

Nina showed her gift of generosity by serving for 35 years as the President of Nazarene Mission International (NMI), first in the District of South Carolina and then beginning in 1986 as the General Director of NMI. Her passionate effort to encourage local churches to have a better vision for missions has led to unprecedented interest and tremendous support. Through her motivation for twenty years, annual world mission offerings increased from \$30 million to \$62 million, with a total of one billion dollars given to missions.

Dr. Gunter was elected as a member of the General Board of Superintendents at the Twenty-sixth General Assembly in Indianapolis, Indiana, in June 2005. She is the first woman to be honored with that office. The presence of Dr. Gunter on the Board of General Superintendents and her example have enriched the church's global ministry. She was selected as a contributing editor in 2008 and 2009 for the Journal of Leadership of "Christianity Today" because she is one of the most admired church leaders for her faithfulness and the innovative way she has contributed to the mission of Christ in the world (www.nazarene.org/ministries/ superintendents/emeritu/gunter/display.html). # GIFTS RELATED TO CROSS-CULTURAL MINISTRY

### Objectives

List and define the gifts related to Cross-Cultural Ministry.
Identify the responsibilities of Christians with these gifts.
Read examples of Christians with these gifts.

Main Ideas

 Apostles fulfilled the purpose of guiding the church and leading its cultural and geographic expansion.
 Missionaries make disciples and fully develop the church in other cultures.

### Introduction

The gifts of apostleship, cross-cultural ministry, and language are very important for the extension of the Kingdom of God. Missionaries relate well cross-culturally and are like players on a sports team who have the skills to make points and score goals. They evangelize, plant churches, do social work and are leaders on the mission field. The apostle is someone who takes care of established churches, fulfilling the ministry of guiding the church leaders and missionaries in their work. Their task is similar to a coach on a sports team.

### The Gift of Apostleship

In our days, some evangelical churches use the term apostle

#### In this section we will study the gift of being an apostle.

Jesus taught that all believers share the apostolic mission of the church and have a message to proclaim (John 17:18, 20:21). The gift of "apostleship" is applied to someone sent by God on a mission to preach Christ to the world, plant churches and help them establish themselves; an apostle has special spiritual authority (2 Corinthians 8:23; Philippians 2:25).

The ministry of the apostle is one of the most mentioned in the New Testament. Paul had a special ministry of pastoral care to the spiritual leaders in new churches within the Roman Empire. God and the congregations who sent him to be an apostle gave him the authority to edify the church (2 Corinthians 13:10).

In our days we understand that the gift of apostleship is the desire and the ability to start new groups of Christians, whether in nearby communities, in the city and in rural areas or in other countries and cultures. It is related to the gifts of evangelist, pastor and leadership.

#### Responsibilities of a Christian with the gift of apostleship:

- Actively engaging with ministries of evangelism.
- Joining a team of church planters.
- Training at the highest level possible to be a good church planter

use this term.

- Learning languages that serve as tools for mission.
- Participating in volunteer missionary opportunities.

#### Louie Bustle

Louie Bustle was born in Mount Vernon, Kentucky in 1942. He surrendered to the Lord after the conversion of his father who was an alcoholic. He earned a master's degree in missions at Nazarene Theological Seminary in Kansas City (1982) and Trevecca Nazarene University granted him a Doctorate in Divinity (1987).

He married Ellen Phillips in 1968 and two years later, in 1970, began his missionary service in the Virgin Islands where he worked for four years. In 1975, he began work in the Dominican Republic. There his gift of apostle came to light allowing him to guide churches in tremendous growth up to the point that 61 new churches were organized in six years.

After serving in Peru for a year, in 1983, he was appointed Regional Director for South America. This region, under his leadership, grew from 18 to 40 districts, 375 to 618 organized churches and from 19,300 members to 35,900 in four years.

In 1994, when Dr. Bustle began as the Director of World Mission, the Nazarene Church was present in 104 countries. Since 2009, he has served as the Director of Global Mission for the Church. In 2008, the church already had more than 790 missionaries (in 40 world areas) and over 11,000 volunteers in mission. These missionaries were serving in 148 languages and 75 dialects. By 2009, the Church of the Nazarene was present in 155 countries and of these a third had been started under the ministry of Dr. Bustle.

In the 2010 General Board's report, Dr. Bustle stated: "Ten years ago, the total membership of the Church of the Nazarene was 1.3 million, but now just 10 years later, already well into the 21st century, the century for which God has raised us up, we have more than 600 thousand new members (half of which were received in the last three years), we are positioned to cross the mark of 2 million members at some point during the 2012 calendar year. We celebrate the vitality and strength that we enjoy because of the multitude of gifts that these new Nazarenes bring. The past ten years we have grown by 45%. Just imagine what will happen in the next ten."

### **Gifts for Missionary Service**

#### In this section we will learn about gifts for cross-cultural ministry.



The gift of cross-cultural ministry (missionary) is a special ability that God gives to some members of the Body of Christ so they can use their other gifts with people from other cultures. The missionary is willing to cross cultural and social barriers. Paul was an apostle, but he is also an example

#### Missionary

The missionary movement of the Church of the Nazarene is more than 100 years old. The doctrine of holiness and missions are at the heart of what it means to be a Nazarene. At the time of the union of holiness groups in Pilot Point, Texas in 1908, the founders had commissioned and sent a total of 21 missionaries to India, Cape Verde, Mexico and Japan. In September 2008, there were 794 missionaries and staff around the world supported by the World Evangelism Fund.

of a missionary. God called him specifically as a missionary to the Gentiles (Acts 9: 15-16).

Missionaries are indispensable for the organization of new churches. These are people who joyfully accept God's mission to reach the lost. This gift allows the continuation of evangelistic work through establishing churches in new geographical areas.

### Responsibilities of a Christian missionary:

- Being sure that there is a personal call from God to "go and serve in other cultures."
- Cultivating a good relationship with the Lord through a life of prayer.
- Being willing to sacrifice and give things up.
- Learning to distinguish and hear the voice of the Holy Spirit.
- Being familiar with the doctrines of the church.
- Receiving training on methods of communication and teaching techniques.
- Learning everything possible about the new culture the missionary is to enter.
- Learning the language of the people of that new culture.

### Lucía Carmen García

On November 21, 1919, when she was 15, Carmen Lucia Garcia was the first convert of the Argentine Church of the Nazarene (and probably South America). By the following year Lucia taught in the first Sunday School in Buenos Aires. After graduating as a teacher, she served as principal of the Joint Evangelical School (1923) which began with 23 children. In 1927, she received her certificate of Licensed Minister and began to carry out pioneer work in urban areas in the West of the capital city.

Lucia, assisted by Soledad Quintana, a student of the Bible Institute, started to evangelize along the Sarmiento railroad stations in Buenos Aires. The two got up early every day and went out to evangelize door to door, handing out tracts, and selling Bibles. They ate lunch of bread with cheese and bologna, sitting wherever they could. Lucia preached in crusades sometimes up to for 22 days. As a result of their work there, churches were founded in the cities of Merlo, Castelar, General Rodriguez, Moron, Moreno and other nearby towns, as far away as Lujan (70 km from the center of the capital).

In 1931, both were ordained as elders by Dr. J. B.Chapman. Lucia oversaw the new churches from 1926 until 1939. At the same time, she served as editor of the first Nazarene magazine in Argentina called "La Vía Más Excelente" (The Most Excellent Way) and translated books from English to Spanish. In 1950, while working as a professor at the Bible Institute, she got a Ph.D. in Philosophy.

In 1953, she and her husband Natalio Costa were appointed as the first missionary couple in Argentina with a task to plant churches in the interior provinces of the country. They founded several churches in Tucuman, Santiago del Estero and Salta. A year later, at the 1954 District Assembly, they reported that through personal evangelism and house to house visitation they had distributed 1,053 Bibles, 600 New Testaments, 8,000 portions of Scripture and 80,000 tracts in the city of Tucuman and its surroundings. They had visited hospitals, shops and even the Government Center. Again they shared the gospel along the train routes to reach the neighboring provinces. They started four church plants and trained Sunday school teachers. After a few years they moved to the western provinces where they founded churches in Mendoza and San Juan.

When she was well along in years, Lucia challenged students in the Bible Institute in Buenos Aires with the following words: "We did the job with very little, you have more, do something bigger."

### The Gift of Language

The gift of interpretation of a language is the ability and skill that the Holy Spirit gives to some Christians to learn a different language so they can use it to edify the church. Without the interpretation of language, we could not understand the sermons, read books or sing songs that were written in a language different from our own. When we understand a message, prayer, hymn or song in another language, it builds and blesses our lives.

Because the New Testament translates the word tongues as both languages and dialects, some Christian churches teach that these "languages" are an unknown language or a prayer language. These Christians interpret speaking in "tongues" as a sign that a person has been filled with the Holy Spirit, and they believe that all Christians should receive this gift. Another interpretation is that some people receive the gift of language to convey a message from God to the church, and in this case there must be another person with the gift of "interpretation of tongues" who can "translate" the message. A passage on which this is based is found in Acts 2:4-6. However, in this event, the purpose was that listeners received the message in their own language or dialect. In fact, as a result some 3,000 people joined the church that day (Acts 2:41).

The Church of the Nazarene has interpreted this gift differently from some of the sister evangelical traditions. Our understanding is that there is a gift of the Spirit that enables certain Christians to speak and interpret languages and dialects.

# Scriptures pertaining to the gift of language Genesis 11:1 Acts 2:1-13

### Confirmation questions for the gift of language

Is it easy for me to learn and speak in other languages?
Do I like to help people who speak different languages to communicate with each other?

Is it a blessing for me to contribute in the edification of the church?
Do I feel compassion for people who do not have a Bible and/or books in their own language? Nazarenes believe that the sign of a Holy Spirit filled Christian is the fruit of love as taught by the Apostle Paul in Galatians 5:22-23: "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law." It is the same holy love of God shown in various forms.

Paul doesn't mention "speaking in other languages" in his lists, although he was fluent in several languages. He grew up in Tarsus and knew the local dialect. An educated Roman citizen, Paul also spoke Greek. He studied at the Rabbinical School of Jerusalem and thus spoke Hebrew (Acts 22:3). As he traveled throughout the Mediterranean, he must have learned words in local languages while he lived in various cities for months. It is likely that he prayed and preached in several languages. Having said all this, we can say that Paul was a person with the gift of languages. He knew several languages and he used them for the benefit of the Body of Christ. In 1 Corinthians 14:18-19 Paul testifies: "I thank God that I speak in tongues (languages) more than all of you. But in the church I would rather speak five intelligible words to instruct others than ten thousand words in an unknown tongue."

### Responsibilities of Christians with the gift of language:

- Studying and learning to master more and more languages.
- Being available to act as an interpreter when required.
- For those who enjoy writing, improving writing techniques for correct expression and translations.
- Living a period of time in the country where the language is spoken so as to understand the culture.
- Teaching languages. This can be used as an evangelistic tool.

### Hilda's Navarro Testimony

Hilda Elena Garcia Navarro was born in a Nazarene family in Ensenada, Baja California, Mexico in 1969. At the age of seven she gave her life to the Lord and in children's camp, received the fullness of the Holy Spirit.

As a child, because of her father's job, she moved several times around the State of Baja California, which borders the United States. In the border cities, it is common for people to see and hear programs of the American media. As a result she grew up familiar with English but did not necessarily speak it fluently.

At 14, she began to study French and English, the second language (English) at the imposition of her mother. French became a passion for her so she stopped English after a while. The next summer she traveled with the French Alliance to the South of France for intensive courses and in five years she had mastered French. She practically had forgotten English. The Lord took her to San Diego, California, to attend Point Loma Nazarene University, where she studied journalism and had to learn the details of English grammar. While there she wanted to continue studying French but after taking a placement test, it was recommended that she study another language because she was already very competent in French. She took two years of German, and after graduating from college went to Germany to polish the language at the Goethe Institute in Bonn. When she returned to California, she studied Italian just for fun, but hardly practiced it.

What to her were isolated situations, turned out to be a plan woven by the Master. In 1993, she had the blessing of helping for the first time the international delegates to the General Assembly and Conventions of the Church of the Nazarene, translating for them when necessary. From that time on, she supported church events that required translation of documents and simultaneous interpretation. She has had the privilege of serving brothers and sisters throughout Latin America using the languages that God allowed her to learn.

# GIFTS OF CREATIVE ARTS AND COMMUNICATIONS

# Objectives

Define the gifts of writing, music, skilled labor, arts and communications.
Identify the responsibilities of Christians with these gifts.

Main Ideas

Musicians guide us in worship; communicators serve by connecting ministries and providing support.
Writers edify God's people and train leaders.
Artists serve others utilizing their hands to express God's love.

### Introduction

Christians with creative gifts remind us of the loving care that God used to create this world with a multitude of colors, sounds, flavors and textures. As will be shown in this lesson, the gifts of writing, music, skilled labor, arts and communications are fundamental to the ministry of the church.

### The Gift of Writing

#### The gift of writing is important in the church.



The gift of writing is the special ability that God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to help them formulate thoughts and ideas to communicate in ways that helps others to find direction, wisdom, knowledge and edification, among other things.

#### Responsibilities of Christians with the gift of writing:

- Learning to write well using proper grammar, writing and spelling.
- Continually reading and writing to practice these skills.
- Having a good knowledge of theology and Biblical studies.
- Working with the publications of the church or other ministries applying this gift.
- Assisting other leaders to review and edit their writings.

#### **Charles Van Engen**

Charles Van Engen was born in 1948 in San Cristobal de las Casas, Chiapas, Mexico. His parents were missionaries. He earned his Masters of Divinity from Fuller Theological Seminary and two doctorates in 1978 and 1981 (PhD) at the Free University of Amsterdam. He served as Youth Pastor in Pasadena, California and later as a missionary in the Presbyterian Seminary of Chiapas. There he developed curriculum and study guides. Among other ministries, he and his wife Jean evangelized in rural areas and they had ministries with university students, with women and they

developed leadership trainings. They also assisted many people when a volcano erupted in northern Chiapas (1981-82). From 1982 to 1985 they coordinated with the 80,000 Mayan refugees that crossed the border into Mexico to escape violence in Guatemala.

Since 1973, Van Engen has given his time to the ministry of education at several seminaries, specializing in missiology. He currently teaches Biblical Theology of Mission and since 1988 has been a member of the faculty of the Intercultural School of Studies at Fuller where he coordinates the doctoral program PRODOLA for Latin America.

Among many other ministries, Van Engen served as President of the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America from 1998 to 1999. He is also the founding president and CEO of Latin American Christian Ministries, Inc.

Since his university days (1966 to 1973), he has always been a passionate writer of books. He has written many books, articles and chapters, and always has a list of new issues on which he wants to write, particularly in the areas of missiology, Bible, mission theology and Latin American studies. He is one of the best-known and most influential missiologists in the church of our time.

His pattern has been:

1. Preach the ideas received from the Lord.

- 2. Teach these same ideas.
- 3. Organize the ideas into articles or books.

He never has "written only to write," but wants to share ideas with people whom he has never met. His passion is to call the church to commit to the missionary task.

### **The Gift of Music**

### In this section we will learn about the gift of music.

The gift of music is the ability to participate in using our voices or instruments in praise to God. Music is one way we express our worship to God. We use songs to worship privately as well as publicly. In the worship service, Christian music includes instrumentation, organization, administration and management; God has given certain brothers and sisters the ability to lead congregations in this special time of sharing together in worship.

Some people confuse worship with music, but they are not synonyms. Worship is more than music; it is a grateful response to a divine initiative. It is a lifestyle that includes recognition of the sufficiency of God and

dependence on him for our whole life. This is not something to be done only once per week on Sunday. Worship involves our entire life. Jack Hayford said, "Worship is a gift of God to us and is intended to bless and benefit us. God does not need it, we do."

### Confirmation questions for the gift of music

Do you express your worship to God through music?
When you sing to God do you feel you get "lost" in worship?
When you sing or pray, does your face reflect how you feel?
Do you have a good voice and correct pitch?

When you sing, do you internalize words of the song?
When you hear others sing, can you easily identify errors?

### Responsibilities of Christians with the gift of music:

- Living a lifestyle of worship.
- Having private times of worship that parallel the public ministry.
- Not giving more importance to music in the worship service than to the preaching.
- Not thinking of themselves as "stars."
- Taking music lessons and / or singing lessons to perfect the talent given by God.
- Joining a group of church musicians to develop and implement this gift.
- Sharing and teaching this music knowledge to others.
- Studying theology to choose the songs properly.
- Using a balance of styles and rhythms for church programs.

### **Charles Wesley**

Charles Wesley, brother of John Wesley, was born in Epworth, England in 1707. The gifts of the two brothers were complementary. Charles was born premature. His parents wrapped him in a woolen blanket and the baby miraculously survived. Both brothers studied at the University of Oxford. Charles was the one who started the Holy Club that his brother John led. Club members gathered for Bible study, prayer and to examine their spiritual lives; they also gave assistance to the sick, the poor and to prisoners.

Charles was the first of the brothers to experience the full assurance of his personal salvation, on May 21, 1738. The next morning, after meditating on Psalm 107, he composed a hymn of salvation. In 1749, he married Sarah Gwynne. She accompanied the Wesley brothers in their evangelistic journeys throughout Britain, until Charles' health forced them to settle in Bristol in 1765, after serving eighteen years as an evangelist. Charles and Sarah had eight children, but only three survived.

Until the time of the Wesley brothers, the churches sang portions of the Scripture. Charles wrote many hymns, most of which expressed the doctrines of salvation, which they preached and then put to music. His main task was to modernize and improve the old form of religious worship. In bed before his death, he shared his last hymn in 1788. Fifty-six volumes of his hymns were published. Some of the best-known hymns of Charles Wesley are "Jesus, Lover of My Soul," "Hark! the Herald Angels Sing," "O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing," " Love Divine, All Loves, Excelling," "Soldiers of Christ, Arise," " Christ the Lord Is Risen Today," "And I am Born to Die" (Soundtrack from the movie Cold Mountain). A placard in his home in Bristol says: "His hymns are the possession of the Christian Church."

### The Gifts of Skilled Labor and Arts

In this section we will learn about the gifts of skilled work and arts.



The gifts of skilled labor and arts consist of the ability to use different art forms for the work of ministry. There is an infinite range of possibilities from designing bookmarks to building and construction. It covers all types of specializations: drawing, video, crafts, decoration, animation, sewing, cooking, gardening, architecture, carpentry, and the list goes on and on.

### Responsibilities for the gifts of skilled labor and arts:

### **Margaret Douglas**

Mrs. Margaret Douglas was born in 1924. In 2009 when she was 85, she was a member of the Church of the Nazarene in Belle, West Virginia. In all Margaret participated in 19 Work and Witness trips. A friend commented on a trip she made to Costa Rica.

The 25 team members who traveled stayed in a small room at the Nazarene Seminary of the Americas and began working in the sanctuary of one of the churches in the area of San Jose. At the end of ten days, they were worshiping the Lord in the four walls they had built which replaced a tent. According to Margaret, the building process was difficult because the construction had to be earthquake-proof and all the concrete was mixed by hand.

Margaret's ministry in Costa Rica included cooking and laundry, and when time allowed her she was involved in the construction work. The cooking and the cleaning was a difficult job, starting early in the morning and finishing up after long after dinner. Among the many things she enjoyed were the evening services. After many years, she still remembers the baptism service in a creek and Sunday school classes under the trees.

Am I creative so as to convey a message in a new way?
Do I have drawing, designing or acting skills?
Do I like photography, drawing or graphic design?
Do I have skills to write

dramas and direct actors?

Mrs. Douglas has traveled to many places in her experience with Work and Witness such as Guatemala, Chile, Bolivia, Brazil, Kenya, Mozambique, Arizona (Indian Reservation), California (Casa Robles), and Hawaii (construction of a church). One of Mrs. Douglas' favorite trips was to Kenya, but unfortunately she became ill, possibly due to the malaria medication. For three days she could not work. "I was pretty bad physically, but I felt worse because I could not work so I decided that this trip would be the last as I wasn't able to help my team." When she shared this feeling with her team, her friend replied, "I think you will go on the next trip and will be working twice as hard!"

Mrs. Douglas subsequently took part in three more trips, completing her nineteenth trip. She encourages everyone to go on a Work and Witness trip at least once. "Go at once. If you have compassion inside you, you will be ready to go back again."

### **Gift of Communications**

#### In this section we will learn about the gifts related to communications.



The gift of communication consists of the ability to transmit a message effectively. It's not just being able to say something, but doing so in a way that it is received and understood.

Christians with these gifts also need to be able to manage one or more of the different media to communicate the message. These can include but are not limited to the printed page, radio, television and Internet. This gift is also related to the ability to use technology.

#### Responsibilities of Christians with the gift of communications:

- Striving for excellence in everything.
- Identifying the best way to communicate something and using the appropriate media to transmit the message.
- Being able to guide and advise others with kindness in your area of specialty.
- Working to support other ministries of the church.
- Always having an attitude of service to others.
- Engaging in planning to contribute to others' ideas.
- Staying on top of current technological advances.

#### **Carlos Juárez**

Carlos was born in Guatemala in a Nazarene home in July of 1981. He was raised in a village in the north of the country until the age of 10 when

the family moved to Guatemala City (capital) because his parents were responding to the call of the Lord. His primary and secondary studies were conducted at the Evangelical Institute America Latina. From a young age he showed a lot of interest in any electronic device that he found. He became interested in computers in 1987 when his family acquired one. From then on, he was interested more and more in learning everything about computers.

During a Christian camp in 1998, at the age of 17, Carlos felt a call in his heart, not to be a pastor or preacher, but to put his talents, gifts and knowledge in the service of God. For some years, in every activity at school, Carlos took photographs and filmed everything he could with a video camera, and then he watched the videos with his friends.

In late 1998, with a quest to put everything he had in the service of God, Carlos became involved as a volunteer in the new ministry of communications that existed in the Regional Office for Mexico and Central America of the Church of the Nazarene (Guatemala City). A missionary who was in charge of the ministry taught him about video production, which later would motivate him to continue in the audiovisual field.

During 1999 he completed a career in electronic engineering, and after that time he realized that his true passion was being behind a video camera. In 2000, he began his B.A. in Radio and Television Production and finished his degree in March 2006.

After several years of serving in the Communications ministry in Guatemala City, Carlos moved to San Jose, Costa Rica in January of 2009 to serve as a missionary where he coordinated the Communications ministry for the Mesoamerican Region.

In 2013, Carlos moved to Argentina with his wife to serve in the ministry of Communications for the South America Region for the Church of the Nazarene.

Carlos says: "I personally believe that God prepares us day by day and the things we do are part of His schooling to use our lives how He wants. God wants us to be happy and to have a full life. He has given gifts to each of us and wants us to use them for Him."

### WHAT DID WE LEARN?

The gifts of writing, music, skilled labor, arts and communications are very important in guiding the church in worship, for advancing of the gospel and the edification of the church in many varied and creative ways.

Objectives

Define my calling or passion.

Main Ideas

By identifying my gifts, call and work style, I will be able to better serve the Body of Christ.
In healthy churches, leaders look to each member to serve according to their calling, gifts and style.

### Introduction

The apostle Paul describes the Church as the visible Body of Christ in this world (1 Corinthians 12:12). The Body of Christ works properly when each Christian has a unique and special place of service. Just as in the human body where the organs help each other, the church's spiritual gifts complement each other.

Our calling and gifts are to enrich the ministry of the church so as to develop a meaningful place of service and in doing so to give glory to God and to serve others.

Also, just as the human body is healthy when all its organs and members work well, a healthy church is one where each member is fulfilling their function and building each other up in love (Romans 12).

The purposes for which we serve in the church are to glorify God and edify others. Both should happen together. When a Christian serves others, people can see the glory of God in action and can glorify God by the works He does through His children.

God expects every one of His children to be fulfilled and fruitful in a significant place of service. In addition to identifying your gifts, it is necessary to also identify your passion (call) and work style. A guide to this is included in this lesson.

### How To Find My Role in the Body of Christ?

The churches that develop ministries based on spiritual gifts are healthier and more apt to grow. My place of ministry depends on my gifts, my passion and my style.



To find out the place where God wants you to serve, you have to identify three things: your calling or passion, your gifts, and your personal work style.



School of Leadership - Discovering My Vocation in Christ

### What is a Call or a Passion?

#### God calls his children by giving them a special passion.

One Sunday, several church leaders were looking for James. Everyone needed him to meet different needs in their activities for each Saturday of the month. James went home very upset. Because he worked in security for a shopping center, he only had one Saturday off each month and had serious trouble deciding with whom to collaborate. He felt frustrated and guilty about not being able to serve in all those needs. Should he be on the church board because it was his responsibility? Should he support where he could use his artistic skills (decorating the church)? Should he serve doing something where he could feel satisfaction? Should he serve where he was most needed and do something that no one else could?

Have you ever felt like James? The truth is that we can decide to serve in various ministries, but it is much better when we specialize in the area where we have passion.

We can compare the church with an orchestra. In an orchestra there are many instruments: wind, strings, percussion, electronic instruments and several types in each of these categories. It is hard to imagine an orchestra with fifty instruments and six people running from side to side performing a symphony. Some servants of the Lord in the past attempted to do this, and were called "orchestra pastors" meaning they tried to play all the instruments alone.

Just as a symphony is weakened when it uses few instruments, the ministries of the church are weakened when only a few are using their gifts. A healthy and growing church develops many different ministries. The most important responsibility of the leaders according to Ephesians 4:11 is to place each member of the church in a meaningful place of service fulfilling their gifts and passion (call).

When members are serving according to their calling, they don't mind getting up early, they serve with more joy, they encourage others, they impact peoples' lives, and they are dedicated. They strive to do things with excellence, and they will invest their own money to enable them to achieve that task!

The apostle Paul discovered that the real purpose of his life was to preach the gospel to the Gentiles. His passion was such that he said: "...Woe to me if I do not preach the gospel" (1 Corinthians 9:16). His call was so powerful that if he did not do it, his life would be meaningless.

In the church we all have gifts and we all need to serve. Some people describe it as a "calling." There are those who discover it by a dream or a vision. The passion to invest in something that we consider valuable is a

necessity or inner motivation that God puts in us to guide and help us to fulfill His purpose.

# How Do I Identify My Passion (My Call)?

The thing that most motivates me is my passion.



To discover your passion, you must identify what motivates you. That depends on what you think is the most important issue that God calls you to devote your life to. A Christian can feel passion for people, for tasks or for a cause.

If what motivates you is people, you will feel inclined to work with a specific group of people: single mothers, children with disabilities, the terminally ill, adolescents, couples, the elderly, prisoners, hospitalized people, among others.

If what motivates you are tasks, then you will feel it important to perform a function that solves a problem or meets some need in the church. This could include being a preacher, administrator, counselor, teacher, writer, driver, missionary, cook, etc.

If you feel passionately about a cause, then you must identify it. Examples of causes include education for poor children, homes for people affected by natural disasters, enacting pro-life laws, dissemination of the Word by mass media, improvement of work conditions, etc.

Felicity was very concerned about the unhealthy ways in which mothers were feeding their children and the lack of exercise by children in her community. She had studied how to eat well and have a healthy life. She could talk for hours on this issue and seems not to tire of it. She has a collection of clips from magazines, many books on the subject and has read almost all there is on the topic. Often she prays that God would have mercy on these children. She recently discovered that she has the gift of teaching.

What is Felicity's passion? It is the health of children. So, she could join the ministry of Compassion in her local church. Her gift is teaching. She can serve by teaching parents, teachers and children about how to eat healthily and the importance of incorporating physical activity in their daily lives.

Charles has been a member of the church for 15 years. He has the gift of administration and has long served as treasurer of his local church. The needs of pastoral families in his district touch his heart. He often seeks the opportunity to discuss the needs of the pastoral families and the lack of concern that has been observed in the churches. Charles has a passion for a cause: improving living conditions for pastoral families. Charles could serve by helping churches to be more fair, responsible and generous to their pastors and to help churches practice good stewardship.

In the Activities section there is a test to identify your passion.



**Passion** is a God-given desire that is in the core of our being that prompts us to invest in a particular ministry. The call is for life. "for God's gifts and his call are irrevocable" (Romans 11:29).

# How Do I Identify My Personal Work Style?

### We all have different preferences as to how to work.



The personal work style is represented by the preferences that each one has in relating to others. Have you ever wondered: Why do I enjoy concentrating on one task, but not another? Why am I realistic and my friend is a dreamer? Why is it so hard to clean my room? Why do I like to chat more with my friends than do homework? Why do I prefer to run the sound system instead of welcoming visitors at the services?

The answer to all these questions is the same. We all have preferences about what we do and how we relate to people. It is very important to identify personal styles so we can serve in the church with more enthusiasm.

Henry has two tasks in Sunday school. He is responsible to purchase the materials, and he is also in charge of games with the children. Often when he shops for materials he can't concentrate well and almost always forgets something.

He wishes that someone else could take care of this. In contrast, when he is playing with children, time "flies." In fact, if it were up to him, he would spend every day with the children. Why is Henry not equally comfortable in both tasks? This is because he feels more comfortable working "with" the people rather than performing tasks "for" people.

Theresa is in charge of the decoration for special activities and she is also the church secretary. When finishing doing a decoration, Theresa feels at peace with herself because she has finished her work. When she has to update the membership list or the documents and files, she is discouraged to see the papers that accumulate on her desk constantly. Theresa dislikes routine tasks that seem never ending.

What happens to Theresa? Why doesn't she feel the same enthusiasm for both tasks? The answer is that Theresa feels comfortable with variety, doing those tasks in which she can be spontaneous, but she does not have the same desire for tasks where she has to follow an administrative process.

Henry and Theresa need to serve in tasks which correspond to their personal work style.

To identify the personal work style you must ask yourself these questions: What motivates me? Completing tasks for people or working directly with people? How do I organize? Am I structured or spontaneous? In the Activities section, there are exercises to identify your work style.

#### **Personal work style** is related to personality and temperament and is as unique as a fingerprint. God has created each person with these characteristics; therefore, we should not hide them. We should identify them so we can find the place where we can best serve others for the glory of the Lord.

Do not worry if your passion is not related to a ministry that already exists in your church. God can use you to start a new ministry.

# How Do I Get Started Serving in a Ministry?

Good leaders begin as apprentices.



The first thing needed is to find a possible field of service. This will depend on gifts, passion and work style.

Martha, Jonah and Vincent have the same gift of teaching. However, their passions and styles are different. Martha and Vincent are structured so they can serve in specific ministerial functions, which work within a team of a determined group of people (formal relations). Moreover, Jonah and Vincent served in tasks that involve working directly with people, where their relationships are spontaneous (ministering to people who are new to them). Martha and Vincent serve in a more structured and permanent ministry. Jonah is the only unstructured person and therefore can serve in generic functions to support the marriage ministry in his church.

When we place people to serve in a ministry for which they do not feel passion, the result is disinterest, reluctance, resignation, irresponsibility and lack of motivation. On the other hand, you can see the difference when people serve in a ministry they are passionate about. Roger, Mary and Pauline have the same passion for helping single mothers, but they have different gifts and styles. Roger and Pauline, who are more structured, serve in roles that require planning, organization and coordination. However, Mary serves in tasks that do not need too much advanced planning.

To start serving, the first step is to join a ministry team. The best leaders are those who start with the simplest tasks and over time increase responsibility. For example, a Christian called to teach could serve as an assistant teacher, and as he or she learns and receives training, he or she can be assigned more responsibilities. Then, with time and practice, this teacher can become the lead teacher of a class. Christian leadership includes the continual training of "apprentices."

# How Do I Prepare To Serve in a Ministry?

## Preparation is a key element for successful ministry.



The preparation for the service is very important. This training must be comprehensive. First, general knowledge that is common to all ministries must be learned, but equally important is the specific knowledge needed to serve on a church ministry team: Discipleship, Sunday School, Leadership, Compassion, Cross-cultural Missions, Evangelism, and Communications, among others.

Second, preparing to serve requires learning practical skills which are acquired "on the job": observing leaders, listening to testimonies or work reports, and performing a task. This is known as experiential learning (1 Timothy 4:15-16, 2 Timothy 1:6-7 and 2:15).

Third, it requires growing in Christian maturity, which is an indispensable quality to serve in a ministry. Christian maturity means growing into the image of Christ, being more like Jesus every day. We need to learn to think like Him, to love like Him, to live like Him, to serve like Him and to relate to others like Him. When we serve, we are models for others and share what God has given us. Growth as a servant implies growth in one's personal relationship with Christ.

The program of the School of Leadership is designed to help disciples to be trained for the ministry to which God has called them.

## What **D**ID We Learn?

To find the place of service in the body of Christ, we must identify our gifts, our passion and work style. My passion indicates where I can serve, and my personal work style indicates how I can serve. To serve we have to be trained, and we can start by joining a ministry team as an apprentice.

### The ministry in the church

is an endless chain of leaders who train others to lead. To begin, we learn from a mature Christian with more ministerial experience, and then we begin to train others with our example and experience.

If everyone were interested

in serving in the same ministries, there would be

many needs neglected.

Pastors and leaders can have a lot of passion for the lost and fill the year with activities, but they will get few results for that effort if they do not position people to serve according to their gifts, passion, and work style.
