We have no apology to make when we say that Northwest Nazarene College is the greatest institution of

We may not at the present time have as large a library, as complete a museum, as fine an equipment, as large a teaching force as some, but we have that which the average large college has not, we have God.

The greatness of a college is not to be measured by the learning within its walls, but by learning combined with spirituality.

God says: "The wisdom of the world is foolishness with God." He does not mean that learning is foolishness, for Moses and Paul were learned men, but He means that learning without God in it is foolishness. Northwest Nazarene College has both the learning and God.

If Northwest Nazarene College were a small affair, we would not lay claim to its being the greatest in this part of the country, for there are small schools in this section of the United States that are spiritual. But Northwest Nazarene College is now as large as some state universities, and within a few years will have o er 1000 students.


Last year 342 enrolled, and the outlook is for 500 or more next

fall. Truly then, Northwest Nazarene College is the GREATEST INSTI-TUTION OF LEARNING in the Northwest. And remember we have not passed our fifth birthday yet.

The College is located at Nampa, Idaho, a thriving city of 7,000 population on the O. S. L. railway that runs from Seattle to Granger, Wyo., there connecting with the Union Pacific railway that runs to Omaha. It is thus easily accessible from all parts of the Northwest quarter of the United States and from western Canada. Boise lies twenty miles to the northeast at the Boise mountains; to the south about 20 miles lies another range of mountains that point their snow-capped peaks to the God of the skies. Nampa is located between these two ranges, with a level stretch of irrigated farms and growing towns scattered throughout the width of forty miles and with a length of almost twice as great. Truly this vast garden has been aptly called "The Switzerland of America."

There are now five buildings partly completed on the college campus. Within two years we expect to have the ten buildings ready for occupancy, as illustrated on this page. The buildings now in use have been so built that they can be enlarged according to the original plan, and this will be done as quickly as money can be raised to meet the expense.

for work in distant lands. ac doubt be over 50 next fall enrolled. The past year there were 35. What a future! Think of such a band gathering together under one roof, all preparing themselves for work in distant lands! There will be no other center of learning anywhere that will compare with the opportunities offered at the Northwest Nazarene College for missionary preparation.

Motorwest Wazarene Conege for missionary preparation. On the first floor of the building will be a missionary parlor, a missionary museum, reading and lecture rooms, doctor's office and waiting room, interne's room, a nurses' demonstration room, and the examination room.

On the second floor will be a well equipped sanitarium, with operating rooms, nurses' and doctors' preparation rooms, sterilizing rooms, baths, toilets, linen and supply rooms, basin and storage and supply rooms, and wards for thirty beds. There will also be two large sun-decks for convalescents.

This Missionary Sanitarium will also be used to care for sick students, so that parents will be assured that their children will have the best of care when in need of medical attention.

Northwest In charge of the Missionary partly com-Sanitarium will be Dr. and Mrs. will finish T. E. Mangum, two of God's children, who are giving their lives to prepare missionaries for medical service. It would be almost impossible to find two people who are better fitted for such a task.

One of the features of the college is a dining hall where students may secure their meals at cost. This hall seats over 500 and can easily be enlarged when the capacity of the college requires. Good substantial meals are served here, and the saving to the students by such an arrangement will be a large item in the expenses of the year. By fall the boys dormitory and girls dor-

By fall the boys dormitory and girls dormitory will be equipped to care for several hundred students. On the front page may be seen these two buildings—the girls, the furthest building on the right hand side; the boys', the furthest on the left hand side. Between the two dormitories is the dining hall, which provides a comfortable arrangement in disagreeable weather.

It is the aim of our school to teach the children as thoroughly as do the public schools—all the essentials of book learning, and too we give them in addition the pure and unadulterated Word of God.

Old Satan lock'd within the pit of woe,





The Northwest Nazarene College has regular courses in business training, open to all who are looking for thorough and practical work in Bookkeeping, Typewriting, Shorthand and the common branches.

The course is not only designed for students preparing for positions in the business world, but aims also to furnish a practical knowledge of bookkeeping and business methods, for students preparing for other lines of work; especially does it seek to give an appreciation of the necessity of proper systems of accounting to students preparing for the ministry or for the foreign service.

The courses offered are as follows: (1) The Bookkeeping Course which includes all the subjects listed in the department except shorthand; (2) The Typewriting and Shorthand Course, which includes all the subjects listed below. Persons not wishing to take full courses may arrange subjects as desired.
