An Appeal for Northwest Nazarene College

We are anxious to reach the hearts and ears of every one of our Northwest Nazarene College constituency. We desire that every Nazarene minister and every Nazarene layman who reads this may realize more pointedly

thanyou have ever done, the very great necessity of having schools like Northwest Nazarene College.

Where can we secure our ministers, and our educated laity, unless we can have schools of our own in which to train them? The interdenominational school does not, and cannot meet our need. In spite of everything that can be said to the contrary, every one of the interdenominational schools leans a bit more strongly toward some one de-

nomination than to another, and every student will secure that bias, if he attends there. If there is really no denominational leaning, then it will be found, upon investigation, that they have embraced "come-out-ism", which

is, in practice, the formation of a church of their own. Every student that graduates from such an institution comes handicapped into the Nazarene field of activites.

The regular church schools, [other than

our own Nazarene schools] cannot equip students for the work that our Nazarene church has on its hands to do. Any careful investigation will reveal this. Our church requires certain vision, a certain emphasis on the doctrine of holiness as a second definite work of grace, a certain emphasis on personal experience, and a certain devotion for evangelism at home, and missionary effort abroad that cannot be found in any church

school in the land.

It is absolutely necessary that the Church of the Nazarene have, and maintain its own educational institutions. Out of them will [Continued on next page]



come the best of young people of the land, thoroughly educated under the most intense spiritual atmosphere. They will have the Nazarene vision. which, in brief, comprehends the idea of a burning, thrilling, blazing Nazarene church in every town, village, and country cross-road in America; they have the Nazarene emphasis on holiness, which is nothing less than the fact that every person must be sanctified wholly as a second definite work of grace, or they cannot see the Lord; they will have a genuine enthusiasm in their own personal experience, which means that there is actually burning in them the personal presence of the Holy Ghost, keeping them on the full fervent stretch for the whole will of God; they will have such a devotion to home evangelism as will send them on self-sacrificing errands to plant the cause of Jesus in every out-of-the-way place that they can pry open; they will have

such a love for missions, and such an information about missionary effort, as will make them ready by the tens and twenties to spend their lives in the lands beyond the sea, the moment the church can secure the available means to send them there— and this kind of an equipment cannot be had in any other school in America, except a Nazarene school, and just such a training, and just such a fiery equipment can be had at Northwest Nazarene College, at Nampa, Idaho.

Butwe earnestly desire our constituency to realize that such a program cannot be carried out without assistance. Our school cannot operate and turn out such finished products without everyone lending a hand. The first and greatest of our desires is that every earnest, sanctified, lover of the Church of the Nazarene, who reads these words, shall pray earnestly for Northwest Nazarene College. Pray regularly. Pray ear

estly. Pray believingly. We are sure that if you will really pray for us, that it will not be long before we will hear from you. The institution was founded by a few people obeying the vision put upon them by the Lord. It has been demonstrated through its thirteen years of existance to have been peculiarly under the blessing of God. He loves it. He abides with it. He fills its halls, and its class rooms with His presence. He wins almost a unanimous following from its students to His salvation and cause. We are sure, if you will pray for us, that it will soon be revealed to you what you can do for us.

Our second desire is that you will lay by a portion of your tithe for your College. Start a separate account at the bank and call it your "College Fund". Deposit something there every once in a while, with a great prayer for the success of the school. Or lay it away in a [Continued on Page 5]



How To Help Young People Through School

We are constantly in receipt of letters from young people who wish to come to school, but do not have sufficient money. Oftentimes if they had a little help, they could carry the rest of the expenses. While we have here in our city a limited number of opportunities for work, yet they are limited, and even so the expedient of working one's way through is not without many drawbacks. The student who works for his board and room, outside of the dormatory, loses much of the school life and the benefit recieved by association with his fellow students; if he had a little help, he might be in the dormatory sharing in all the activities of the school and giving his full time to study.

In view of the many appeals for help, we have thought of a plan whereby our young peoples' societies, Sunday Schools, churches,

and individuals might give us some assistance. The older and larger colleges always have listed a number of scholarships which they use in this way. These scholarships have been established by individuals through donation and the income is applied as the faculty of the college may see fit. As yet we have had only a little help along his line, and our people are not able as a whole to give large gifts that the income might remain; a perpetual factor for the benefit of deserving young people, but we can, on the other hand, give in a smaller way. If the various organizations in our churches would establish a scholarship fund by giving so much a month for ten months, it would be a great assistance in solving the problem. Some might be able to give ten dollars a month for ten months which would pay the tuition of some student through

school for a year; others might be able to give five dollars a month for ten months, which would pay the tuition for one semester, and again others might not be able to give more than two dollars and a half for ten months, but this might be just the amount that some student would need.

In giving these various scholarships, they could be listed in the name of the organization which donates them, and where a definite specification is made, could be given to individuals of the locality where the scholarship fund was raised. In time a large fund might be built up in this way, and many young people enabled to come to school who otherwise could not. Will you not think and pray about this and stir up any organization of which you may be a member to do somealong this line?
